# A BILL

To posthumously award a Congressional Gold Medal to Shirley Chisholm.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2   *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3   **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Shirley Chisholm Con-  
5   gressional Gold Medal Act”.

6   **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7       The Congress finds as follows:

8              (1) In 1968, Shirley Chisholm became the first  
9   African-American woman elected to Congress where  
10   she served until 1982.

11             (2) Shirley Chisholm inspired and led the  
12   march of political achievement by African Americans  
13   and women in the three decades since she ran for  
14   the Presidency of the United States.

15             (3) Her election to Congress and her candidacy  
16   for the Presidency raised the profile and aspirations  
17   of all African Americans and women in the field of  
18   politics.

19             (4) Shirley Chisholm was recognized for her ac-  
20   tivism, independence, and groundbreaking achieve-  
21   ments in politics during and after the civil rights  
22   era.

1                         (5) Shirley Chisholm was born in Brooklyn,  
2 New York, on November 30, 1924, attended Brook-  
3 lyn College, and earned a master's degree from Co-  
4 lumbia University.

5                         (6) Shirley Chisholm worked in education and  
6 social services before being elected to the New York  
7 State Assembly in 1964.

8                         (7) Shirley Chisholm established the Unity  
9 Democratic Club in 1960, which played a significant  
10 role in rallying Black and Hispanic voters in New  
11 York City.

12                         (8) In 1969, Shirley Chisholm began her service  
13 in the 91st Congress, representing Brooklyn's 12th  
14 Congressional District in the United States House of  
15 Representatives.

16                         (9) During her service in the House of Rep-  
17 resentatives, Shirley Chisholm promoted the employ-  
18 ment of women in Congress and was vocal in her  
19 support of civil rights, women's rights, and the poor,  
20 while fervently opposing the Vietnam War.

21                         (10) In 1972, Shirley Chisholm was the first  
22 African American to seek the nomination of a major  
23 party for President of the United States.

24                         (11) Shirley Chisholm was a co-founder of the  
25 National Organization for Women.

1                             (12) A historic figure in American political his-  
2                             tory, Shirley Chisholm died at the age of 80 in Or-  
3                             mond Beach, Florida, on New Year's Day 2005.

4     **SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.**

5                             (a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of  
6     the House of Representatives and the President pro tem-  
7     pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements  
8     for the posthumous presentation, on behalf of the Con-  
9     gress, of a gold medal of appropriate design in commemo-  
10   ration of Shirley Chisholm, in recognition of her activism,  
11   independence, and groundbreaking achievements in poli-  
12   tics, her election as the first African-American woman in  
13   the Congress, and her campaign to be the first African  
14   American to gain the nomination of a major political party  
15   for President of the United States.

16                             (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For purposes of the  
17     presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary  
18     of the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the “Sec-  
19     retary”) shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems,  
20     devices, and inscriptions, to be determined by the Sec-  
21     retary. The design shall bear an image of, and inscription  
22     of the name of, Shirley Chisholm.

23                             (c) SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION.—

24                             (1) IN GENERAL.—Following the award of the  
25     gold medal referred to in subsection (a), the gold

1       medal shall be given to the Smithsonian Institution,  
2       where it will be displayed as appropriate and made  
3       available for research.

4                     (2) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of  
5       Congress that the Smithsonian Institution should  
6       make the gold medal received under this Act avail-  
7       able for display elsewhere, particularly at other loca-  
8       tions and events associated with Shirley Chisholm.

9 **SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

10       The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in  
11      bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant to section 3, at  
12      a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, including labor,  
13      materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

14 **SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.**

15       (a) NATIONAL MEDALS.—The medals struck pursu-  
16      ant to this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter  
17      51 of title 31, United States Code.

18       (b) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of section  
19      5134 of title 31, United States Code, all medals struck  
20      under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.

21 **SEC. 6. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF  
22                     SALE.**

23       (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is  
24      authorized to be charged against the United States Mint  
25      Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-

1 essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck under  
2 this Act.

3 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the  
4 sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under section  
5 4 shall be deposited into the United States Mint Public  
6 Enterprise Fund.

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
