#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "South Texas Veterans
- 5 Health Care Expansion Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) The current and future health care needs of9 veterans residing in the Far South Texas area are

3 (2) The Department of Veterans Affairs esti4 mates that more than 117,000 veterans reside in
5 Far South Texas.

6 (3)The 2010 census identified Far South 7 Texas as the fastest growing region in the State of Texas. According to figures obtained from the 8 9 United States Army Accessions Command, Texas is 10 the number one source of military recruits among all 11 States. Texas is also the largest provider of National 12 Guard and Reserve members to current overseas 13 military deployments. These factors make it a cer-14 tainty that the veteran population in Far South 15 Texas will increase substantially in the coming 16 years.

(4) In its Capital Asset Realignment for Enhanced Services study, the Department of Veterans
Affairs found that fewer than three percent of its
enrollees in the Valley-Coastal Bend Market of Veterans Integrated Service Network 17 reside within
its acute hospital access standards.

(5) Travel times for veterans from the market
referred to in paragraph (3) can exceed six hours
from their residences to the nearest Department of

Veterans Affairs hospital for acute inpatient health
 care.

3 (6) Even with the significant travel times, vet4 erans from Far South Texas demonstrate a high de5 mand for health care services from the Department
6 of Veterans Affairs.

7 (7) Current deployments involving members of
8 the Texas National Guard and Reservists from
9 Texas will continue to increase demand for medical
10 services provided by the Department of Veterans Af11 fairs.

12SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF CONSTRUCTION OF DEPART-13MENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS MAJOR MED-

#### ICAL FACILITY IN FAR SOUTH TEXAS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans Affairs

(4) The capability to provide caregiver support
 services, including an adult day care providing care giver respite.

4 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 180 days after the date 5 of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Veterans 6 Affairs shall submit to the Committees on Veterans' Af-7 fairs of the Senate and House of Representatives a report 8 identifying and outlining the detailed estimate of the cost 9 of and time necessary for completion of the project author-10 ized under subsection (a).

(c) DEFINITION.—For purposes of this Act, the term
"Far South Texas" means the following counties of the
State of Texas: Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Calhoun, Cameron,
DeWitt, Dimmit, Duval, Goliad, Hidalgo, Jackson, Jim
Hogg, Jim Wells, Kennedy, Kleberg, Nueces, Refugio, San
Patricio, Starr, Victoria, Webb, Willacy, and Zapata.
