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## A BILL

To amend the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act to provide for grants in support of training and education to teachers and other school employees, students, and the community about how to prevent, recognize, respond to, and report child sexual abuse among primary and secondary school students.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Jenna Quinn Law”.

1 SEC. 2. CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS FIELD INITI-  
2 ATED GRANTS.

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 105(a) of the Child Abuse  
4 Prevention and Treatment Act (42 U.S.C. 5106(a)) is  
5 amended by adding at the end the following:

6               “(8) CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS FIELD-  
7               INITIATED GRANTS.—

8                 “(A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may  
9 award grants under this subsection to entities,  
10 for periods of up to 5 years, in support of field-  
11 initiated innovation projects that advance, es-  
12 tablish, or implement comprehensive, innova-  
13 tive, evidence-based or evidence-informed child  
14 sexual abuse awareness and prevention pro-  
15 grams by—

16                             “(i) improving student awareness of  
17                             child sexual abuse in an age-appropriate  
18                             manner, including how to recognize, pre-  
19                             vent, and safely report child sexual abuse;

“(ii) training teachers, school employees, and other mandatory reporters and adults who work with children in a professional or volunteer capacity, including with respect to recognizing child sexual abuse and safely reporting child sexual abuse; or

1                         “(iii) providing information to parents  
2                         and guardians of students about child sex-  
3                         ual abuse awareness and prevention, in-  
4                         cluding how to prevent, recognize, respond  
5                         to, and report child sexual abuse and how  
6                         to discuss child sexual abuse with a child.

7                         “(B) REPORTING.—Each entity receiving a  
8                         grant under subparagraph (A) shall submit an  
9                         annual report to the Secretary, for the duration  
10                         of the grant period, on the projects carried out  
11                         using such grant, including the number of par-  
12                         ticipants, the services provided, and the out-  
13                         comes of the projects, including participant  
14                         evaluations.”.

15                         (b) REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF EXPENDI-  
16                         TURES.—Not later than 5 years after the date on which  
17                         the first grant is awarded under paragraph (8) of section  
18                         105(a) of the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act  
19                         (42 U.S.C. 5106(a)), as added by subsection (a), the  
20                         Comptroller General of the United States shall—

21                         (1) prepare a report that describes the projects  
22                         for which funds are expended under paragraph (8)  
23                         of such section 105(a)(8) and evaluates the effective-  
24                         ness of those projects; and

1                   (2) submit the report to the Committee on  
2                   Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of the Sen-  
3                   ate and the Committee on Education and the Work-  
4                   force of the House of Representatives.

5                   (c) REPORT ON DUPLICATIVE NATURE OF EXPENDI-  
6                   TURES.—Not later than 5 years after the date of enact-  
7                   ment of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United  
8                   States shall—

9                   (1) prepare a report that examines whether the  
10                  projects described in subsection (b) are duplicative  
11                  of other activities supported by Federal funds; and

12                  (2) submit the report to the Committee on  
13                  Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of the Sen-  
14                  ate and the Committee on Education and the Work-  
15                  force of the House of Representatives.

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
