A BILL

To direct the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to establish education and watershed programs which advance environmental literacy, including preparedness and adaptability for the likely impacts of climate change in coastal watershed regions.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Bay-Watershed Edu-
- 5 cation and Training (B-WET) Regional Program and Na-
- 6 tional Environmental Literacy Grant Program Act".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

- (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:
- (1) The United States faces major challenges, such as mitigating and adapting to the impacts of climate change, stewarding critical coastal and ma-rine resources including fish and wildlife habitat while sustaining the commercial and recreational ac-tivities that depend on these resources, and improv-ing resilience to natural disasters, that collectively threaten human health, economic development, envi-ronmental quality, and national security.
 - (2) Communities in coastal watersheds are particularly vulnerable to these increasingly urgent, interconnected, and complex challenges and need support for teacher professional development and experiential learning among students of all ages.
 - (3) These challenges can be met with the help of comprehensive programs specifically targeted to engage coastal watershed communities, school-children, and the general public to develop engaged and environmentally literate citizens who are better able to understand complex environmental issues, assess risk, evaluate proposed plans, and understand how individual decisions affect the environment at local, regional, national, and global scales.

1	(b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to advance
2	environmental literacy, develop public awareness and ap-
3	preciation of the economic, social, and environmental ben-
4	efits of coastal watersheds, and emphasize stewardship of
5	critical coastal and marine resources, including an under-
6	standing of how climate change is impacting those re-
7	sources, through the establishment of—
8	(1) a National Environmental Literacy Grant
9	Program; and
10	(2) regional Bay-Watershed Education and
11	Training (B-WET) programs.
12	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
13	In this Act:
14	(1) Administrator.—The term "Adminis-
15	trator" means the Administrator of the National
16	Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.
17	(2) Environmental education.—The term
18	"environmental education" means interdisciplinary
19	formal and informal learning about the relevant
20	interrelationships between dynamic environmental
21	and human systems, and which results in increasing
22	the learner's capacity for decisionmaking and stew-
23	ardship regarding natural and community resources
24	(3) Environmental Literacy.—The term

"environmental literacy" means the capacity to per-

- ceive and interpret the relative health of environmental systems and the interrelationships between natural and social systems and technology, and to assess options and take appropriate action to maintain, restore, or improve the health of those systems.
- (4) Bay-watershed education" means environmental education focused on watersheds, with an emphasis on stewardship of critical coastal and marine resources, including an understanding of how climate change is impacting those resources.
- (5) ELIGIBLE ENTITY.—The term "eligible entity" means a State agency, local agency, school district, institution of higher education, or for-profit or non-profit nongovernmental organization, consortium, or other entity that the Administrator finds has demonstrated expertise and experience in the development of the institutional, intellectual, or policy resources to help environmental education become more effective and widely practiced.
- (6) High Leverage projects.—The term "high leverage projects" means projects supported by grants authorized under this Act that use Federal, State and nongovernmental financial, technical, and other resources in such a manner that the po-

1	tential beneficial outcomes are highly magnified or
2	enhanced.
3	(7) National Program.—The term "National
4	Program" means the National Environmental Lit-
5	eracy Grant Program established under section 4 of
6	this Act.
7	(8) REGIONAL PROGRAM.—The term "Regional
8	Program" means the regional Bay-Watershed Edu-
9	cation and Training (B-WET) program established
10	under section 5 of this Act.
11	(9) STATE.—The term "State" means each of
12	the several States of the United States, the District
13	of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the
14	Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Com-
15	monwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, any
16	other territory or possession of the United States
17	and any Indian tribe.
18	SEC. 4. NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL LITERACY GRANT
19	PROGRAM.
20	(a) In General.—The Administrator shall establish
21	a national competitive grant program under which the Ad-
22	ministrator shall provide, subject to the availability of ap-
23	propriations, financial assistance to—
24	(1) expand the adoption of coastal, ocean, and

watershed environmental education within main-

- stream formal and informal educational systems and
 other appropriate media;
 - (2) build administrative and technical capacity with coastal, ocean, and watershed communities and stakeholder groups to enhance their effectiveness;
 - (3) encourage water-dependent and outdoor recreation, experiential learning, and hands-on involvement with coastal and watershed resources as a method of promoting stewardship of those resources; and
- 11 (4) develop and implement new approaches to 12 advance coastal, ocean, and watershed education and 13 environmental literacy at national, regional, and 14 local levels.
- (b) PRIORITIES.—In awarding grants under this section, the Administrator shall give priority consideration to innovative, strategic, high-leverage projects that demonstrate strong potential for being sustained in the future by a grant recipient beyond the time period in which activities are carried out with the grant.
- 21 (c) GUIDELINES.—No later than 180 days after the 22 date of enactment of this Act and after consultation with 23 appropriate stakeholders, the Administrator shall publish 24 in the Federal Register guidelines regarding the imple-25 mentation of this grant program, including publication of

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- 1 criteria for eligible entities, identification of national prior-
- 2 ities, establishment of performance measures to evaluate
- 3 program effectiveness, information regarding sources of
- 4 non-Federal matching funds or in-kind contributions, and
- 5 reporting requirements for grant award recipients.
- 6 (d) Limitation on Use of Funds by Adminis-
- 7 TRATOR.—Of the amounts made available to implement
- 8 this section—
- 9 (1) no less than 80 percent shall be used for
- 10 competitive grants or cooperative agreements;
- 11 (2) no more than 10 percent may be used by
- the Administrator to implement the grant program;
- 13 and
- 14 (3) no less than 10 percent of the annual funds
- appropriated for the program authorized under this
- section shall be used to fund contracts or cooperative
- agreements to conduct strategic planning, promote
- 18 communications among grant recipients and within
- communities, coordinate grant activities to foster an
- 20 integrated program, and oversee national evaluation
- efforts.
- 22 SEC. 5. BAY-WATERSHED EDUCATION AND TRAINING (B-
- WET) REGIONAL PROGRAMS.
- 24 (a) Establishment.—The Administrator shall es-
- 25 tablish the Bay-Watershed Education and Training (B-

2	carried out through regional program offices, as follows:
3	(1) The B-WET Mid-Atlantic Program Office,
4	which shall include the States of Pennsylvania, Dela-

- which shall include the States of Kentucky, Kansas,
- Oklahoma, Tennessee, Missouri, and Arkansas.
- 17 (b) New and Modified Regional Programs.—
- 18 The Administrator may create and modify the Bay-Water-
- 19 shed Education Programs based on need, interest, and
- 20 available resources.
- 21 (c) REGIONAL PROGRAM MANAGEMENT.—The Ad-
- 22 ministrator shall appoint and select a Regional Program
- 23 Manager for each regional program office, who shall reside
- 24 in the region, be responsible for managing and admin-
- 25 istering the regional program, and demonstrate com-

petence and expertise in bay-watershed education and
training.
(d) Functions.—Each regional program office
shall—
(1) administer the Bay-Watershed Education
and Training Program in accordance with this Act;
(2) determine the most appropriate commu-
nities within the region to be served by the Bay-Wa-
tershed Education and Training Program;
(3) encourage water-dependent and outdoor
recreation, experiential learning experiences for stu-
dents, and hands-on involvement with coastal and
watershed resources as a method of promoting stew-
ardship of those resources and complementing core
classroom curriculum;
(4) support communication and collaboration
among educators, natural resource planners and
managers, and governmental and nongovernmental
stakeholders;
(5) share and distribute information regarding
educational plans, strategies, learning activities, and
curricula to all stakeholders within its region;
(6) provide financial and technical assistance
pursuant to the guidelines developed by the Adminis-

trator under this section; and

1	(7) perform any additional duties as necessary
2	to carry out the functions of the program.

- 3 (e) Program Guidelines.—No later than 180 days
- 4 after the date of enactment of this Act and after consulta-
- 5 tion with appropriate stakeholders, the Administrator
- 6 shall publish in the Federal Register guidelines regarding
- 7 the implementation of this program, including:
- 8 (1) Contracts.—The Administrator shall cre-9 ate guidelines through which each regional program 10 may enter into contracts to support projects to de-11 sign, demonstrate, evaluate, or disseminate prac-12 tices, methods, or techniques related to Bay-water-13 shed education and training.
 - (2) Grant making and cooperative agreements.—
 - (A) The Administrator shall create guidelines through which each regional program may provide financial assistance in the form of a grant or cooperative agreement to support projects which advance the goals and objectives of this bill, and which shall include criteria for eligible entities, identification of national priorities, establishment of performance measures to evaluate program effectiveness, and reporting requirements for grant award recipients.

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1	(B) In making grants pursuant to this sec-
2	tion, the regional programs shall give priority to
3	those projects which will—
4	(i) promote bay-watershed education
5	throughout the region;
6	(ii) advance strategic initiatives to in-
7	corporate bay-watershed education into
8	formal and informal education systems;
9	(iii) build capacity within bay-water-
10	shed education communities and stake-
11	holder groups for expanding and strength-
12	ening their work;
13	(iv) build bay-watershed education
14	into professional development or training
15	activities for educators; and
16	(v) broadly replicate existing, proven
17	bay-watershed education programs.
18	(f) Non-Federal Share.—
19	(1) In general.—In awarding grants under
20	this section, the Administrator may give priority
21	consideration to projects in which the Federal share
22	does not exceed 75 percent of the aggregate cost of
23	such project.
24	(2) In-kind contribution.—The non-Federal
25	share of the costs of any project supported by an

- award of grant funding under this section may be
 cash or the fair market value of services, equipment,
 donations, or any other form of in-kind contribution.
 - (3) WAIVER OF REQUIREMENT.—The Administrator may grant a waiver of paragraph (1) for any underserved community, for any community that has an inability to draw on other sources of funding because of the small population or low income of the community, or for any other person for any other reason the Administrator considers appropriate and consistent with the purposes of the program.
- 12 (g) REGIONAL PROGRAM COORDINATION.—Within
- 13 the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,
- 14 the Office of Education shall work with Regional Program
- 15 Managers on the following regional B-WET functions:
- 16 (1) Strategic planning efforts.
- 17 (2) Integration and coordination of programs.
- 18 (3) Coordination of national evaluation efforts.
- 19 (4) Promotion of network wide communications.
- (5) Selection of new Regional Program Managers.
- (6) Management, tracking, and oversight of the
 B-WET program.

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(h) Limitation on Use of Funds by Adminis-1 2 TRATOR.—Of the amounts made available to implement this section— 3 (1) no less than 80 percent shall be used for 4 5 implementation of regional program activities, in-6 cluding the award of grants; and 7 (2) no more than 20 percent may be used by 8 the Administrator to implement the regional pro-9 grams and regional program coordination. 10 SEC. 6. BIENNIAL REPORT. 11 Not later than December 31, 2011, and biennially thereafter, the Administrator shall submit to Congress a 12 13 report on the grant programs authorized under this Act. Each such report shall include a description of the eligible 14 15 activities carried out with grants awarded under the Act during the previous two fiscal years, an assessment of the 16 17 success and impact of such activities, and a description 18 of the type of programs carried out with such grant, 19 disaggregated by State. 20 SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS. 21 (a) In General.—There is authorized to be appro-22 priated to the Administrator to carry out this Act— 23 (1) \$40,000,000 for fiscal year 2011; 24 (2) \$45,000,000 for fiscal year 2012;

(3) \$50,000,000 for fiscal year 2013;

- 1 (4) \$50,000,000 for fiscal year 2014; and
- 2 (5) \$50,000,000 for fiscal year 2015.
- 3 (b) Allocation.—The amount authorized for each
- 4 fiscal year under subsection (a) shall be divided equally
- 5 to carry out sections 4 and section 5.

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
