A BILL

- To establish a commission to make recommendations on the appropriate size of membership of the House of Representatives and the method by which Members are elected.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Congress 2014 Com-

5 mission Act".

1 SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT.

2 There is established a commission to be known as the
3 "Congress 2014 Commission" (hereafter in this Act re4 ferred to as the "Commission").

5 SEC. 3. DUTIES OF COMMISSION.

6 The Commission shall—

7 (1) analyze the current size of the membership
8 of the House of Representatives considering the re9 quirement for the institution to carry out its respon10 sibilities in an effective manner under the challenges
11 of the new century;

(2) examine alternatives to the current method
by which Representatives are elected (including cumulative voting and proportional representation) to
determine if such alternatives would make the House
of Representatives a more representative body;

17 (3) provide consideration to the continuing dis18 solution of adherence to the platforms and can19 didates of the Nation's two major political parties as
20 well as to the reduction in electoral participation by
21 the citizenry;

(4) consider whether alternative methods of
electing House Members might include more citizens
in the electoral process;

1	people of the District of Columbia, the Common-
2	wealth of Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the
3	Northern Mariana Islands, and the United States
4	Virgin Islands;
5	(6) to the extent necessary, formulate proposals
6	for changes in the size of the membership of, and
7	the method of electing Representatives to, the House
8	of Representatives; and
9	(7) not later than the end of the One Hundred
10	Twelfth Congress, submit to the President and the
11	Congress a report of the work of the Commission,
12	together with a draft of legislation (including tech-
13	nical and conforming provisions) to implement the
14	proposals referred to in paragraph (6).
15	SEC. 4. MEMBERSHIP.
16	(a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
17	shall be composed of 17 members as follows:
18	(1) 3 members appointed by the President.
19	(2) 10 members appointed by the House of
20	Representatives, of whom 5 shall be appointed by
21	the Speaker and 5 shall be appointed by the minor-
22	ity leader.
23	(3) 4 members appointed by the Senate, of
24	whom 2 shall be appointed by the majority leader
25	and 2 shall be appointed by the minority leader.

1 (b) QUALIFICATIONS.—In making appointments 2 under this section, the appointing authorities shall make 3 a special effort to appoint individuals who are particularly 4 qualified to perform the functions of the Commission, by 5 reason of either practical experience or academic expertise 6 in politics or government.

7 (c) TERMS AND VACANCIES.—Each member shall be
8 appointed for the life of the Commission. A vacancy in
9 the Commission shall be filled in the manner in which the
10 original appointment was made.

(d) PAY AND TRAVEL.—Each member of the Commission, other than a full-time officer or employee of the
United States—

(1) shall be paid the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay payable for level V of the Executive Schedule for each day (including travel time)
during which the member is engaged in the actual performance of duties vested in the Commission; and
(2) shall receive travel expenses, including per

diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with applicable provisions under subchapter I of chapter 57 of
title 5, United States Code.

(e) QUORUM.—Nine members of the Commission
shall constitute a quorum, but a lesser number may hold
hearings.

(f) CHAIRMAN.—The Chairman of the Commission
 shall be elected by the members.

3 (g) MEETINGS.—The Commission shall meet at the4 call of the Chairman or a majority of its members.

5 SEC. 5. STAFF.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—With the approval of the Commis-7 sion, the Chairman may appoint and fix the pay of not 8 more than six individuals for the staff of the Commission. 9 Such individuals may be appointed without regard to the 10 provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and may be paid 11 12 without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and sub-13 chapter III of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule pay rates, except that an indi-14 15 vidual so appointed may not receive pay in excess of the maximum annual rate of basic pay payable for grade GS-16 15 of the General Schedule under section 5332 of title 17 5, United States Code. 18

(b) EXPERTS AND CONSULTANTS.—With the approval of the Commission, the Chairman may procure temporary and intermittent services in the manner prescribed
in section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, but at
rates for individuals not to exceed the daily equivalent of
the maximum annual rate of basic pay payable for grade

GS-15 of the General Schedule under section 5332 of title
 5, United States Code.

3 (c) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon request 4 of the Commission, the head of any Federal department 5 or agency may detail, on a reimbursable basis, any of the 6 personnel of that department or agency to the Commission 7 to assist it in carrying out its duties under this Act.

8 SEC. 6. POWERS OF COMMISSION.

9 (a) HEARINGS.—The Commission may, for the pur-10 pose of carrying out this Act, hold hearings, sit and act 11 at times and places, take testimony, and receive evidence 12 as the Commission considers appropriate.

(b) MEMBERS AND AGENTS.—Any member or agent
of the Commission may, if authorized by the Commission,
take any action which the Commission is authorized to
take by this section.

17 (c) MAILS.—The Commission may use the United 18 States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as departments and agencies of the United States. 19 20(d) Administrative Support Services.—Upon 21 the request of the Commission, the Administrator of Gen-22 eral Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reim-23 bursable basis, the administrative support services nec-24 essary for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities under this Act. 25

1 SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2 There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
3 this Act \$5,000,000, to remain available until expended.
4 SEC. 8. TERMINATION.

5 The Commission shall cease to exist on the last day
6 of the month in which its report is submitted under section
7 3.

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
