Ms. HAHN introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Homeland Security

A BILL

To require the submission of a plan to ensure the placement of sufficient U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers at each of the ten international airports in the United States with the largest volume of international travelers to effectively combat security threats and vulnerabilities, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. PLAN TO ENSURE AIRPORT SECURITY.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
5 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Home-
6 land Security, acting through U.S. Customs and Border

1 Protection, shall submit to the Committee on Homeland
2 Security of the House of Representatives and the Com-
3 mittee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs
4 of the Senate a comprehensive plan for ensuring the place-
5 ment of sufficient U.S. Customs and Border Protection
6 officers at each of the ten international airports in the
7 United States with the largest volume of international
8 travelers.

9 (b) ELEMENTS.—The plan required under subsection
10 (a) shall include the following:

11 (1) An assessment of existing personnel em-
12 ployed at the airports identified in such plan.

13 (2) An assessment of the existing security
14 threats and vulnerabilities of such airports.

15 (3) An estimate of the personnel needs for each
16 such airport that is required in order to effectively
17 combat such security threats and vulnerabilities.

18 (4) An assessment of how increases in inter-
19 national travel may impact current U.S. Customs
20 and Border Protection security functions.

21 (5) An identification of any obstacles that may
22 impede such a plan from being fully implemented.

23 (6) A detailed estimate of all costs associated
24 with the implementation of such a plan.

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
