## A BILL

To require the Director for Homeland Security Investigations of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to conduct annual assessments on threats posed to the United States by transnational criminal organizations, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Transnational Crimi-  
5 nal Organization Threat Assessment Act”.

1   **SEC. 2. ANNUAL ASSESSMENTS ON THREATS POSED TO THE**  
2                   **UNITED STATES BY TRANSNATIONAL CRIMI-**  
3                   **NAL ORGANIZATIONS.**

4       (a) REQUIREMENT.—Not later than 180 days after  
5   the date of the enactment of this Act and annually there-  
6   after, the Director for Homeland Security Investigations  
7   of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement of the De-  
8   partment of Homeland Security, in consultation with the  
9   Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection of  
10   the Department, the Commandant of the United States  
11   Coast Guard, and the heads of other relevant Federal de-  
12   partments or agencies the Director determines appro-  
13   priate, shall submit to the appropriate congressional com-  
14   mittees assessments of threats posed to the United States  
15   by transnational criminal organizations (TCOs).

16       (b) CONTENTS.—Each assessment under subsection  
17   (a) shall address the following:

18               (1) The most significant TCOs active in and  
19   outside of the United States, including along the  
20   southwest and northern borders, and including the  
21   organizational structure, characteristics, and areas  
22   of influence within the United States of each such  
23   TCO.

24               (2) The drug smuggling trends used by TCOs  
25   to transport illicit drugs entering the United States,

1       including information on seizures, investigations,  
2       and drug purity and potency levels.

3                 (3) The role organized violent gangs have working  
4       with TCOs in domestic drug trafficking.

5                 (4) The money laundering activities used by  
6       TCOs to generate proceeds through the sale of illicit  
7       drugs in the United States.

8                 (5) Information about the most widely trafficked drugs in the United States, including illicit  
9       opioids, heroin, methamphetamine, and new  
10      psychoactive substances, including regarding their  
11      availability, consumption, and overdose related  
12      deaths, production and cultivation, transportation,  
13      and distribution.

15                 (6) A predictive outlook regarding drug trafficking and drug-related trends and activities by  
16       TCOs.

18                 (7) Any other matters the Director for Homeland Security Investigations determines relevant.

20       (c) FORM.—Each assessment under subsection (a)  
21      shall be submitted in unclassified form, but may include  
22      a classified annex only for the protection of intelligence  
23      sources and methods relating to the matters contained in  
24      each such assessment. The Director for Homeland Security Investigations shall post on a publicly available

1 website of Homeland Security Investigations the unclassi-  
2 fied portion of each such assessment.

3 (d) BRIEFING.—

4 (1) BRIEFING.—The Director for Homeland Se-  
5 curity Investigations shall annually brief the appro-  
6 priate congressional committees regarding each as-  
7 sessment under subsection (a). The head of any  
8 other relevant Federal department or agency shall  
9 accompany the Director for any such briefing if any  
10 such committee, in consultation with the Director,  
11 determines such is appropriate.

12 (e) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES.—

13 In this section, the term “appropriate congressional com-  
14 mittees” means the Committee on Homeland Security and  
15 the Committee on Judiciary of the House of Representa-  
16 tives and the Committee on Homeland Security and Gov-  
17 ernmental Affairs and the Committee on the Judiciary of  
18 the Senate.
