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## A BILL

To require the Transportation Security Administration to streamline the enrollment processes for individuals applying for a Transportation Security Administration security threat assessment for certain programs, including the Transportation Worker Identification Credential and Hazardous Materials Endorsement Threat Assessment programs of the Administration, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2   *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3   **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       *This Act may be cited as the “Transportation Security*  
5   *Screening Modernization Act of 2024”.*

6   **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

7       *In this Act:*

8              (1)    *ADMINISTRATOR.—The term “Administrator” means the Administrator of the Transpor-*  
9              *tation Security Administration.*

11             (2)    *HAZMAT ENDORSEMENT.—The term “HAZMAT Endorsement” means the Hazardous Ma-*  
12             *terials Endorsement Threat Assessment program au-*  
13             *thorized under section 5103a of title 49, United States*  
14             *Code.*

16             (3)    *STATE.—The term “State” means each of the*  
17             *several States, the District of Columbia, and the terri-*  
18             *ties and possessions of the United States.*

19             (4)    *TSA.—The term “TSA” means the Trans-*  
20             *portation Security Administration.*

21             (5)    *TWIC.—The term “TWIC” means the Trans-*  
22             *portation Worker Identification Credential authorized*  
23             *under section 70105 of title 46, United States Code.*

**1 SEC. 3. STREAMLINING OF APPLICATIONS FOR CERTAIN SE-**

**2                    CURITY THREAT ASSESSMENT PROGRAMS OF**

**3                    THE TRANSPORTATION SECURITY ADMINIS-**

**4                    TRATION.**

### 5 (a) STREAMLINING.—

6                             (1) *IN GENERAL.*—Not later than 2 years after  
7                             the date of the enactment of this Act, the Adminis-  
8                             trator shall take such actions as are necessary, includ-  
9                             ing issuance of an interim final rule if needed, to  
10                          streamline the procedures for individuals applying for  
11                          or renewing enrollment in more than one TSA secu-  
12                          rity threat assessment program, in particular, the  
13                          TWIC and HAZMAT Endorsement programs, and  
14                          any other credentialing programs as determined by  
15                          the Administrator, by—

(B) permitting an individual to visit any  
TSA authorized enrollment center and enroll in  
more than one TSA security threat assessment  
program at the same time for a fee that is less

1       than the cumulative fee that would otherwise be  
2       incurred for each such program separately;

3           (C) permitting an individual to undergo a  
4       streamlined and expeditious renewal process;

5           (D) aligning the expiration of an individ-  
6       ual's successful, valid eligibility determination  
7       with the expiration of that individual's eligi-  
8       bility to participate in subsequent TSA security  
9       threat assessment programs to which the indi-  
10      vidual applies;

11           (E) providing to States the expiration dates  
12       for each individual's TSA security threat assess-  
13       ment to ensure a commercial driver's license of  
14       an individual who holds a HAZMAT Endorse-  
15       ment does not indicate the individual is author-  
16       ized to transport hazardous materials after the  
17       expiration date of the enrollment of the indi-  
18       vidual in the HAZMAT Endorsement security  
19       threat assessment program if such commercial  
20       driver's license has an expiration date that is  
21       different from the expiration date of such enroll-  
22       ment; and

23           (F) enrolling an individual in a subsequent  
24       TSA security threat assessment program at the  
25       minimum cost necessary for the TSA to cover

1           *printing, issuance, and case management costs,*  
2           *costs associated with the collection of any addi-*  
3           *tional biometric and biographic data in accord-*  
4           *ance with paragraph (3), and other costs that*  
5           *are not duplicative.*

6           (2) *STATE REQUIREMENTS FOR STREAM-*  
7           *LINING.—Not later than 6 months after the date of the*  
8           *enactment of this Act, the States shall carry out the*  
9           *responsibilities of the States pursuant to section*  
10          *5103a of title 49, United States Code.*

11          (3) *SPECIAL RULE.—If an individual under this*  
12          *subsection is at different times applying for or renew-*  
13          *ing enrollment in more than one TSA security threat*  
14          *assessment program, such individual may be required*  
15          *to revisit a TSA authorized enrollment center for the*  
16          *collection of additional data, such as biometrics, nec-*  
17          *essary for any such program that were not so collected*  
18          *in connection with any other such program.*

19          (b) *PUBLICATION.—The Administrator shall post on a*  
20          *publicly available website of the TSA information relating*  
21          *to the streamlining of the enrollment processes for individ-*  
22          *uals applying for more than one TSA security threat assess-*  
23          *ment program described in subsection (a).*

24          (c) *EXPEDITED RULEMAKING.—Notwithstanding sec-*  
25          *tions 551 through 559 of title 5, United States Code, noth-*

1     *ing in this section shall require notice and comment rule-*  
2     *making, and to the extent it is necessary to add additional*  
3     *requirements for which limited rulemaking may be advis-*  
4     *able, the Administrator shall implement such requirements*  
5     *through publication of an interim final rule.*

6         *(d) BRIEFING.—Not later than 180 days after the date*  
7     *of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator shall brief*  
8     *Congress on progress made toward the implementation of*  
9     *this section.*

10     **SEC. 4. ELIMINATING DUPLICATIVE COSTS.**

11         *(a) AUDIT.—Not later than 1 year after the date of*  
12     *the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of the*  
13     *United States shall audit the administration of the security*  
14     *threat assessment programs by the TSA and the States, in-*  
15     *cluding the TWIC and HAZMAT Endorsement programs.*

16         *(b) ELEMENTS.—*

17             *(1) TSA AUDIT.—In conducting the audit of the*  
18     *TSA required by subsection (a), the Comptroller Gen-*  
19     *eral shall—*

20                 *(A) identify any redundancies and dupli-*  
21     *cations in costs and administration of security*  
22     *threat assessment programs that if eliminated*  
23     *would not impact national security and any*  
24     *benefits of eliminating such redundancies and*  
25     *duplications and improving the experiences for*

1           *individuals applying for or renewing enrollment  
2           in more than one TSA security threat assessment  
3           program;*

4           *(B) review the impacts of the implementa-  
5           tion by the TSA of recommendations from pre-  
6           vious studies conducted by the Comptroller Gen-  
7           eral, including GAO-07-756 and GAO-17-182, on  
8           increasing the efficiency and effectiveness, and  
9           reducing costs, of processing applications for en-  
10          rollment and renewal in TSA security threat as-  
11          essment programs;*

12          *(C) review the findings of the assessment re-  
13          quired by section 1(b) of the Act entitled “An Act  
14          to require the Secretary of Homeland Security to  
15          prepare a comprehensive security assessment of  
16          the transportation security card program, and  
17          for other purposes”, approved December 16, 2016  
18          (46 U.S.C. 70105 note; Public Law 114–278)  
19          and determine whether the TSA has implemented  
20          any remedies to redundancies and duplication  
21          identified by that assessment and whether such  
22          implementation impacted national security;*

23          *(D) determine whether there are unique  
24          challenges rural applicants have with accessing  
25          TSA security threat assessment programs;*

1                   (E) assess the numbers and locations of enrollment centers for meeting the needs of such programs, including determining the access provided to rural applicants;

5                   (F) identify potential opportunities that exist to improve the enrollment center operations of and customer experience with such programs;

8                   (G) identify potential opportunities to harmonize the enrollment, vetting, and renewal processes of such programs in which similar information is collected for similar security threat assessment processes for different vetted credentials while not impacting national security;

14                  (H) identify other ways the TSA can reduce the costs of the TSA security threat assessment programs while not impacting national security; and

18                  (I) review the vetting, application, and enrollment processes of each TSA security threat assessment program.

21                  (2) STATE AUDIT.—In conducting the audit of the States required by subsection (a), the Comptroller General shall review—

24                  (A) the administration of the HAZMAT Endorsement program by the States;

1                   (B) methods by which the States could  
2                   streamline the HAZMAT Endorsement program;  
3                   and

4                   (C) any potential barriers States face ad-  
5                   ministering TSA security threat assessment pro-  
6                   grams for individuals applying to TWIC and the  
7                   HAZMAT Endorsement program or individuals  
8                   that already have a TWIC credential.

9                   (c) REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS.—Not later than  
10    180 days after the date of the completion of the audit re-  
11    quired by subsection (a), the Comptroller General of the  
12    United States shall submit to the Administrator, the Com-  
13    mittee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the  
14    Senate, and the Committee on Homeland Security of the  
15    House of Representatives a report that includes—

16                   (1) a summary and analysis of the costs associ-  
17                   ated with the operation and administration of each  
18                   individual TSA security threat assessment program;

19                   (2) a summary and analysis of the application  
20                   and enrollment costs associated with providing an in-  
21                   dividual multiple credentials under TSA security  
22                   threat assessment programs;

23                   (3) an identification of any potential duplicative  
24                   processes associated with an applicant applying for,  
25                   or the vetting or enrollment by the TSA of an indi-

1       *vidual in, a subsequent or multiple TSA security*  
2       *threat assessment programs;*

3           (4) *a breakdown of costs borne by applicants for*  
4       *current enrollment and renewal processes of such pro-*  
5       *grams;*

6           (5) *ways to improve access to such programs, in-*  
7       *cluding for rural applicants;*

8           (6) *any potential recommendations to the TSA*  
9       *for reducing costs and streamlining the administra-*  
10      *tion and operation of each TSA security threat assess-*  
11      *ment program while not impacting national security;*

12           (7) *any potential recommendations for the TSA*  
13       *to administer such programs in a way that would*  
14       *improve national security; and*

15           (8) *any potential recommendations for ways*  
16       *States can improve their role in administering the*  
17       *HAZMAT Endorsement program and streamline the*  
18       *application process or reduce costs for individuals*  
19       *seeking multiple transportation security credentials.*

20       *(d) IMPLEMENTATION.—*

21           *(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after*  
22       *the date of the receipt of the report required by sub-*  
23       *section (c), the Administrator shall—*

24           *(A) implement the recommendations from*  
25       *such report;*

1                             (B) provide to the Committee on Commerce,  
2                             Science, and Transportation of the Senate and  
3                             the Committee on Homeland Security of the  
4                             House of Representatives a written notification  
5                             detailing—

6                                 (i) the timeline for implementation of  
7                             each recommendation from the report;

8                                 (ii) justifications for any implementa-  
9                             tion timeline lasting longer than 2 years;  
10                             and

11                                 (iii) justifications for recommendations  
12                             that the Administrator has declined to pur-  
13                             sue or implement.

14                             (2) BRIEFINGS.—Not later than 60 days after  
15                             the date of the receipt of the report required by sub-  
16                             section (c), and annually thereafter until the date  
17                             that the TSA has implemented each recommendation  
18                             made in such report, the Administrator shall brief the  
19                             Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transpor-  
20                             tation of the Senate and the Committee on Homeland  
21                             Security of the House of Representatives on the imple-  
22                             mentation of recommendations from the report.
