To amend the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 to authorize a grant program to support students who have epilepsy or a seizure disorder.

Mr. NORCROSS (for himself, Mr. COSTA, Mr. BACON, Ms. NORTON, Mr. TONKO, and Mr. FITZPATRICK) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce

A BILL

To amend the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 to authorize a grant program to support students who have epilepsy or a seizure disorder.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the “Seizure Awareness and
5 Preparedness Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. GRANT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT STUDENTS WHO**
2 **HAVE EPILEPSY OR A SEIZURE DISORDER.**

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title IV of the Elementary and
4 Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7101 et
5 seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:

6 **"PART G—GRANT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT STU-**
7 **DENTS WHO HAVE EPILEPSY OR A SEIZURE**
8 **DISORDER**

9 **"SEC. 4701. GRANT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT STUDENTS WHO**
10 **HAVE EPILEPSY OR A SEIZURE DISORDER.**

11 "(a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

12 "(1) INDIVIDUALIZED EMERGENCY HEALTH
13 CARE PLAN.—The term ‘individualized emergency
14 health care plan’ means a document developed by a
15 student’s health care provider, in consultation with
16 the parent of a student with epilepsy or a seizure
17 disorder, other appropriate medical professionals
18 who may be providing epilepsy or seizure disorder
19 care to the student, and the school nurse or special-
20 ized instructional support personnel, which outlines
21 a set of procedural guidelines that provide specific
22 directions about what to do in a particular emer-
23 gency situation and is signed by the health care pro-
24 vider, the parent, and the school nurse or specialized
25 instructional support personnel.

1 “(2) INDIVIDUALIZED HEALTH CARE PLAN.—

2 The term ‘individualized health care plan’ means a
3 document developed by a student’s health care pro-
4 vider, in consultation with the parent of a student
5 with epilepsy or a seizure disorder, other appropriate
6 medical professionals who may be providing epilepsy
7 or seizure disorder care to the student, and the
8 school nurse or specialized instructional support per-
9 sonnel, which is consistent with the recomme-
10 dations of the student’s health care provider and which
11 sets out the health services needed by the student at
12 school and is signed by the health care provider, the
13 parent, and the school nurse or specialized instruc-
14 tional support personnel.

15 “(b) AUTHORIZATION OF GRANT PROGRAM.—The
16 Secretary shall award grants to States, on a competitive
17 basis, to enable the States to award subgrants to local
18 educational agencies to carry out a program that supports
19 students with epilepsy and seizure disorders in schools.

20 “(c) APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.—A State that de-
21 sires to receive a grant under this section shall submit an
22 application to the Secretary at such time, in such manner,
23 and accompanied by such information as the Secretary
24 may require.

25 “(d) SUBGRANTS AUTHORIZED.—

1 “(1) IN GENERAL.—A State that receives a
2 grant under this section shall use the grant funds to
3 award subgrants to local educational agencies to en-
4 able the local educational agencies to carry out a
5 program that funds training of school personnel on
6 seizure awareness and preparedness that covers indi-
7 vidualized health care plans and individualized emer-
8 gency health care plans for students who have epi-
9 lepsy or a seizure disorder.

10 “(2) APPLICATIONS FOR SUBGRANTS.—A local
11 educational agency that desires to receive a subgrant
12 under this subsection shall submit an application to
13 the State at such time, in such manner, and accom-
14 panied by such information as the State may re-
15 quire.

16 “(3) USE OF SUBGRANT FUNDS.—

17 “(A) IN GENERAL.—

18 “(i) REQUIRED USE.—A local edu-
19 cational agency that receives a subgrant
20 under this subsection shall use the
21 subgrant funds to carry out a program in
22 the elementary schools and secondary
23 schools served by such agency to fund
24 training of school personnel on seizure
25 awareness and preparedness that covers in-

1 dividualized health care plans and individual-
2 ized emergency health care plans for
3 students who have epilepsy or a seizure
4 disorder.

5 “(ii) PERMISSIVE USES.—A local edu-
6 cational agency that receives a subgrant
7 under this subsection may use the
8 subgrant funds for—

9 “(I) training of school personnel
10 to administer or assist with the ad-
11 ministration of seizure medications;

12 “(II) training and education of
13 students on seizure awareness and
14 preparedness;

15 “(III) recruiting, hiring, and re-
16 taining dedicated compliance staff
17 who are responsible for ensuring that
18 all training and program requirements
19 related to seizure awareness, pre-
20 paredness, and management are con-
21 sistently met; and

22 “(IV) other activities or pro-
23 grams determined appropriate by the
24 Secretary.

1 “(B) INFORMATION INCLUDED.—It is rec-
2 ommended that each individualized health care
3 plan and each individualized emergency health
4 care plan include the following information:

5 “(i) Written orders from the student’s
6 physician or advanced practice nurse out-
7 lining the epilepsy or seizure disorder care.

8 “(ii) The symptoms of the epilepsy or
9 seizure disorder for that particular student
10 and recommended care.

11 “(iii) Full participation in exercise
12 and sports, and any contraindications to
13 exercise, or accommodations that shall be
14 made for that particular student.

15 “(iv) Accommodations for school trips,
16 after-school activities, class parties, and
17 other school-related activities.

18 “(v) Education of all school personnel
19 about epilepsy and seizure disorders, how
20 to recognize and provide care for epilepsy
21 and seizure disorders, and when to call for
22 assistance.

23 “(vi) Medical and treatment issues
24 that may affect the educational process of

1 the student with epilepsy or the seizure
2 disorder.

3 “(vii) The student’s ability to manage,
4 and the student’s level of understanding of,
5 the student’s epilepsy or seizure disorder.

6 “(viii) How to maintain communica-
7 tion with the student, the student’s parent
8 and health care team, the educational
9 staff, and the school nurse or specialized
10 instructional support personnel.

11 “(C) TRAINING REQUIRED.—

12 “(i) IN GENERAL.—Each local edu-
13 cational agency carrying out a program
14 supported with subgrant funds shall ensure
15 that the school nurse or specialized in-
16 structional support personnel assigned to a
17 particular elementary school or secondary
18 school supported by the program—

19 “(I) coordinates the provision of
20 epilepsy and seizure disorder care at
21 such school; and

22 “(II) ensures that all staff are
23 trained not less often than every 2
24 years in the care of students with epi-
25 lepsy and seizure disorders, including

1 staff working with school-sponsored
2 programs outside of the regular school
3 day, as provided in individualized
4 health care plans and individualized
5 emergency health care plans.

6 “(ii) INSTRUCTION.—The training re-
7 quired under clause (i) shall include a De-
8 partment of Education-approved on-line or
9 in-person course of instruction provided by
10 1 or more nonprofit national organizations
11 that support the welfare of individuals with
12 epilepsy and seizure disorders.

13 “(D) SCHOOL BUS DRIVERS.—Each local
14 educational agency carrying out a program sup-
15 ported with subgrant funds shall ensure that
16 each school bus driver who transports a student
17 with epilepsy or a seizure disorder receives no-
18 tice of the student’s condition, information on
19 how to provide care for epilepsy or the seizure
20 disorder, emergency contact information, epi-
21 lepsy and seizure disorder recognition and first
22 aid training, and parent contact information.

23 “(E) RELEASE.—Each local educational
24 agency carrying out a program supported with
25 subgrant funds shall ensure that the school

1 nurse or specialized instructional support per-
2 sonnel assigned to a particular elementary
3 school or secondary school supported by the
4 program obtains a release from each parent of
5 a student with epilepsy or a seizure disorder
6 who requests an individualized health care plan
7 or an individualized emergency health care plan,
8 to authorize the sharing of medical information
9 between the student's physician or advanced
10 practice nurse and other health care providers.

11 “(F) NO LIABILITY.—No school employee,
12 including a school nurse or specialized instruc-
13 tional support personnel, a school bus driver, a
14 school bus aide, or any other officer or agent of
15 a local educational agency, shall be held liable
16 for any good faith act or omission consistent
17 with the provisions of this section. Good faith
18 shall not include willful misconduct, gross neg-
19 ligence, or recklessness.

20 “(e) SUPPLEMENT; NOT SUPPLANT.—Grant and
21 subgrant funds provided under this section shall be used
22 to supplement, not supplant, other Federal or State funds
23 available to carry out activities described in this section.

24 “(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
25 is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section

1 \$34,500,000 for the period of fiscal years 2024 through
2 2028.”.

3 (b) TABLE OF CONTENTS.—The table of contents in
4 section 2 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act
5 of 1965 is amended by inserting after the item relating
6 to section 4644 the following new items:

“PART G—GRANT PROGRAM TO SUPPORT STUDENTS WHO HAVE EPILEPSY
OR A SEIZURE DISORDER

“Sec. 4701. Grant program to support students who have epilepsy or a seizure disorder.”.
