Mrs. HINSON (for herself, Mr. FLEISCHMANN, Mr. RUTHERFORD, and Mr. PALAZZO) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

RESOLUTION

Of inquiry directing the Secretary of Homeland Security to provide certain information relating to enforcement and removal operations.

1 *Resolved*, That the Secretary of Homeland Security
2 is directed, to the extent that such information is in the
3 possession of the Secretary, to transmit to the House of
4 Representatives copies of documents, emails, charts, or ta-
5 bles, not later than 14 days after date on which this reso-
6 lution is agreed to, for fiscal year 2021, which refer or
7 relate to the following:

8 (1) Information on custody and case manage-
9 ment, including Enforcement and Removal Oper-

1 ations of the U.S. Immigration and Customs En-
2 forcement non-detained cases, including—

3 (A) the number of aliens enrolled in the
4 Alternatives to Detention program by tech-
5 nology type; and

6 (B) the absconder rates for aliens enrolled
7 in the Alternatives to Detention program.

8 (2) Information on administrative and criminal
9 arrests, including—

10 (A) the number of administrative and
11 criminal arrests by the Enforcement and Re-
12 moval Operations of the U.S. Immigration and
13 Customs Enforcement, including the number of
14 individuals arrested by U.S. Immigration and
15 Customs Enforcement with criminal convictions
16 or pending criminal charges, disaggregated by
17 the type of crime based on the U.S. Immigra-
18 tion and Customs Enforcement system of
19 record by the Federal Bureau of Investigation
20 National Crime Information Center offense
21 codes; and

22 (B) the number of Enforcement and Re-
23 moval Operations activities that resulted in
24 criminal arrests and convictions.

1 (3) Information on U.S. Immigration and Cus-
2 toms Enforcement detainers, including—

3 (A) the number of detainers issues by U.S.
4 Immigration and Customs Enforcement; and

5 (B) the number of individuals subject to
6 detainers with a history of—

7 (i) homicide;

8 (ii) kidnapping;

9 (iii) robberies;

10 (iv) assaults;

11 (v) sex crimes; and

12 (vi) crimes against children.

13 (4) Information on removals, including—

14 (A) the number of removals conducted by
15 Enforcement and Removal Operations of U.S.
16 Immigration and Customs Enforcement;

17 (B) the percentage of individuals removed
18 who had criminal convictions or pending crimi-
19 nal charges;

20 (C) the number of air charter removals
21 under section 362 of the Public Health Service
22 Act (42 U.S.C. 265 (commonly known as “title
23 42 expulsions”)) conducted by the Enforcement
24 and Removal Operations of U.S. Immigration

1 and Customs Enforcement and U.S. Customs
2 and Border Protection; and

3 (D) the number of individuals removed per
4 month.

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
