A BILL

 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Reduce Iranian Cyber-
 - 5 Suppression Act".
 - 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 In this Act:

1	(1) Executive agency.—The term "executive
2	agency" has the meaning given that term in section
3	4 of the Office of Federal Procurement Policy Act
4	(41 U.S.C. 403).
5	(2) Sensitive technology.—The term "sen-
6	sitive technology" means hardware, software, tele-
7	communications equipment, or any other technology
8	that the President determines may be used by the
9	Government of Iran—
10	(A) to restrict the free flow of unbiased in-
11	formation in Iran; or
12	(B) to disrupt, monitor, or otherwise re-
13	strict speech by the people of Iran.
14	SEC. 3. PROHIBITION ON PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS WITH
15	PERSONS THAT EXPORT SENSITIVE TECH-
16	NOLOGY TO IRAN.
17	(a) In General.—Notwithstanding any other provi-
18	sion of law, the head of an executive agency may not enter
19	into or renew a contract for the procurement of goods or
20	services with a person that exports sensitive technology to
21	Iran.
22	(b) Waiver.—The President may waive the applica-
23	tion of the prohibition under subsection (a) if the Presi-
24	dent—

1	(1) determines that such a waiver is in the na-
2	tional interest of the United States; and
3	(2) submits to Congress a report describing the
4	reasons for the determination.

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
