A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of State to issue up to 10,500 E-3 visas per year to Irish nationals.

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Irish Immigration Rec-
- 5 ognition and Encouragement Act of 2011" or the "IRE
- 6 Act".
- 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 8 Congress makes the following findings:

- (1) Immigration from the Republic of Ireland
 has been an important part of the history, identity,
 and culture of the United States.
- 4 (2) Approximately 40,000,000 people in the
 5 United States identify themselves as Irish-Ameri6 cans.
- 7 (3) The Immigration and Nationality Act of 8 1965 (Public Law 89–236) created significant bar-9 riers for legal Irish immigration to the United 10 States.
- 11 (4) The Republic of Ireland continues to be an 12 important strategic ally and friend to the United 13 States.
