Mr. SANDERS (for himself and Ms. STABENOW) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

To provide for youth jobs, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Employ Young Ameri-
5 cans Now Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF EMPLOY YOUNG AMERICANS**

7 **FUND.**

8 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
9 Treasury of the United States an account that shall be
10 known as the Employ Young Americans Fund (referred
11 to in this Act as the “Fund”).

1 (b) DEPOSITS INTO THE FUND.—Out of any
2 amounts in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, there
3 is appropriated \$5,500,000,000 for fiscal year 2015,
4 which shall be paid to the Fund, to be used by the Sec-
5 retary of Labor to carry out this Act.

6 (c) AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS.—Of the amounts avail-
7 able to the Fund under subsection (b), the Secretary of
8 Labor shall—

9 (1) allot \$4,000,000,000 in accordance with
10 section 3 to provide summer and year-round employ-
11 ment opportunities to low-income youth; and

12 (2) award \$1,500,000,000 in allotments and
13 competitive grants in accordance with section 4 to
14 local entities to carry out work-based training and
15 other work-related and educational strategies and
16 activities of demonstrated effectiveness to unem-
17 ployed, low-income young adults and low-income
18 youth to provide the skills and assistance needed to
19 obtain employment.

20 (d) PERIOD OF AVAILABILITY.—The amounts appro-
21 priated under this Act shall be available for obligation by
22 the Secretary of Labor, and shall be available for expendi-
23 ture by grantees (including subgrantees), until expended.

1 **SEC. 3. SUMMER EMPLOYMENT AND YEAR-ROUND EMPLOY-**
2 **MENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR LOW-INCOME**
3 **YOUTH.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—From the funds available under
5 section 2(c)(1), the Secretary of Labor shall make an al-
6 lotment under subsection (c) to each State that has a
7 modification to a State plan approved under section 112
8 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
9 2822) (referred to in this section as a “State plan modi-
10 fication”) (or other State request for funds specified in
11 guidance under subsection (b)) approved under subsection
12 (d) and recipient under section 166(c) of the Workforce
13 Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2911(c)) (referred to
14 in this section as a “Native American grantee”) that
15 meets the requirements of this section, for the purpose of
16 providing summer employment and year-round employ-
17 ment opportunities to low-income youth.

18 (b) GUIDANCE AND APPLICATION OF REQUIRE-
19 MENTS.—

20 (1) GUIDANCE.—Not later than 20 days after
21 the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of
22 Labor shall issue guidance regarding the implemen-
23 tation of this section.

24 (2) PROCEDURES.—Such guidance shall, con-
25 sistent with this section, include procedures for—

1 (A) the submission and approval of State
2 plan modifications, for such other forms of re-
3 quests for funds by the State as may be identi-
4 fied in such guidance, for modifications to local
5 plans approved under section 118 of the Work-
6 force Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2833)
7 (referred to individually in this section as a
8 “local plan modification”), or for such other
9 forms of requests for funds by local areas as
10 may be identified in such guidance, that pro-
11 mote the expeditious and effective implemen-
12 tation of the activities authorized under this sec-
13 tion; and

14 (B) the allotment and allocation of funds,
15 including reallocation and reallocation of such
16 funds, that promote such implementation.

17 (3) REQUIREMENTS.—Except as otherwise pro-
18 vided in the guidance described in paragraph (1)
19 and in this section and other provisions of this Act,
20 the funds provided for activities under this section
21 shall be administered in accordance with the provi-
22 sions of subtitles B and E of title I of the Workforce
23 Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2811 et seq.,
24 2911 et seq.) relating to youth activities.

25 (c) STATE ALLOTMENTS.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—Using the funds described in
2 subsection (a), the Secretary of Labor shall allot to
3 each State the total of the amounts assigned to the
4 State under subparagraphs (A) and (B) of para-
5 graph (2).

6 (2) ASSIGNMENTS TO STATES.—

7 (A) MINIMUM AMOUNTS.—Using funds de-
8 scribed in subsection (a), the Secretary of
9 Labor shall assign to each State an amount
10 equal to $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 percent of such funds.

11 (B) FORMULA AMOUNTS.—The Secretary
12 of Labor shall assign the remainder of the
13 funds described in subsection (a) among the
14 States by assigning—

15 (i) $33\frac{1}{3}$ percent on the basis of the
16 relative number of individuals in the civil-
17 ian labor force who are not younger than
18 16 but younger than 25 in each State,
19 compared to the total number of individ-
20 uals in the civilian labor force who are not
21 younger than 16 but younger than 25 in
22 all States;

23 (ii) $33\frac{1}{3}$ percent on the basis of the
24 relative number of unemployed individuals
25 in each State, compared to the total num-

1 ber of unemployed individuals in all States;
2 and

3 (iii) 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ on the basis of the relative
4 number of disadvantaged young adults and
5 youth in each State, compared to the total
6 number of disadvantaged young adults and
7 youth in all States.

8 (3) REALLOTMENT.—If the Governor of a State
9 does not submit a State plan modification or other
10 State request for funds specified in guidance under
11 subsection (b) by the date specified in subsection
12 (d)(2)(A), or a State does not receive approval of
13 such State plan modification or request, the amount
14 the State would have been eligible to receive pursu-
15 ant to paragraph (2) shall be transferred within the
16 Fund and added to the amounts available for com-
17 petitive grants under sections 2(c)(2) and 4(b)(2).

18 (4) DEFINITIONS.—For purposes of paragraph
19 (2), the term “disadvantaged young adult or youth”
20 means an individual who is not younger than 16 but
21 is younger than 25 who received an income, or is a
22 member of a family that received a total family in-
23 come, that, in relation to family size, does not exceed
24 the higher of—

25 (A) the poverty line; or

(B) 70 percent of the lower living standard income level.

(d) STATE PLAN MODIFICATION.—

(B) a description of the requirements the State will apply relating to the eligibility of low-income youth, consistent with section 2(4), for summer employment opportunities and year-round employment opportunities, which requirements may include criteria to target assistance to particular categories of such low-income

1 youth, such as youth with disabilities, con-
2 sistent with subsection (f);

3 (C) a description of the performance out-
4 comes to be achieved by the State through the
5 activities carried out under this section and the
6 processes the State will use to track perform-
7 ance, consistent with guidance provided by the
8 Secretary of Labor regarding such outcomes
9 and processes and with section 5(b);

10 (D) a description of the timelines for im-
11 plementation of the strategies and activities de-
12 scribed in subparagraph (A), and the number of
13 low-income youth expected to be placed in sum-
14 mer employment opportunities, and year-round
15 employment opportunities, respectively, by
16 quarter;

17 (E) assurances that the State will report
18 such information, relating to fiscal, perform-
19 ance, and other matters, as the Secretary may
20 require and as the Secretary determines is nec-
21 essary to effectively monitor the activities car-
22 ried out under this section;

23 (F) assurances that the State will ensure
24 compliance with the requirements, restrictions,

1 labor standards, and other provisions described
2 in section 5(a); and

3 (G) if a local board and chief elected offi-
4 cial in the State will provide employment oppor-
5 tunities with the link to training and edu-
6 cational activities described in subsection
7 (f)(2)(B), a description of how the training and
8 educational activities will lead to the industry-
9 recognized credential involved.

10 (2) SUBMISSION AND APPROVAL OF STATE
11 PLAN MODIFICATION OR REQUEST.—

12 (A) SUBMISSION.—

13 (i) IN GENERAL.—The Governor shall
14 submit the State plan modification or
15 other State request for funds specified in
16 guidance under subsection (b) to the Sec-
17 retary of Labor not later than 30 days
18 after the issuance of such guidance.

19 (ii) PROCESS.—The Secretary shall—

20 (I) make copies of the State plan
21 modification or request available to
22 the public on the Web site of the De-
23 partment of Labor and through other
24 electronic means, on the date on
25 which the Governor submits the State

1 plan modification or request under
2 this section;

3 (II) allow members of the public,
4 including representatives of business,
5 representatives of labor organizations,
6 and representatives of educational in-
7 stitutions, to submit to the Secretary
8 comments on the State plan modifica-
9 tion or request, during a comment pe-
10 riod beginning on the submission date
11 and ending 60 days after the submis-
12 sion date; and

13 (III) include with the notification
14 of approval or disapproval of the
15 State plan modification or request,
16 submitted to the Governor under sub-
17 paragraph (B), any such comments
18 that represent disagreement with the
19 plan modification or request.

20 (B) APPROVAL.—The Secretary of Labor
21 shall approve the State plan modification or re-
22 quest submitted under subparagraph (A) not
23 later than 90 days after the submission date,
24 unless the Secretary determines that the plan
25 or request is inconsistent with the requirements

1 of this section. If the Secretary has not made
2 a determination with that 90-day period, the
3 plan or request shall be considered to be ap-
4 proved. If the plan or request is disapproved,
5 the Secretary may provide a reasonable period
6 of time in which the plan or request may be
7 amended and resubmitted for approval. If the
8 plan or request is approved, the Secretary shall
9 allot funds to the State under subsection (c)
10 within 90 days after such approval.

11 (3) MODIFICATIONS TO STATE PLAN OR RE-
12 QUEST.—The Governor may submit further modi-
13 fications to a State plan modification or other State
14 request for funds specified under subsection (b),
15 consistent with the requirements of this section.

16 (e) WITHIN-STATE ALLOCATION AND ADMINISTRA-
17 TION.—

18 (1) IN GENERAL.—Of the funds allotted to the
19 State under subsection (c), the Governor—

20 (A) may reserve not more than 5 percent
21 of the funds for administration and technical
22 assistance; and

23 (B) shall allocate the remainder of the
24 funds among local areas within the State in ac-
25 cordance with clauses (i), (ii), and (iii) of sub-

1 section (c)(2)(B), except that for purposes of
2 such allocation references to a State in sub-
3 section (c)(2)(B) shall be deemed to be ref-
4 erences to a local area and references to all
5 States shall be deemed to be references to all
6 local areas in the State involved.

7 (2) LOCAL PLAN.—

8 (A) SUBMISSION.—In order to receive an
9 allocation under paragraph (1)(B), the local
10 board, in partnership with the chief elected offi-
11 cial for the local area involved, shall submit to
12 the Governor a local plan modification, or such
13 other request for funds by local areas as may
14 be specified in guidance under subsection (b),
15 not later than 30 days after the submission by
16 the State of the State plan modification or
17 other State request for funds specified in guid-
18 ance under subsection (b), describing the strat-
19 egies and activities to be carried out under this
20 section.

21 (B) APPROVAL.—The Governor shall ap-
22 prove the local plan modification or other local
23 request for funds submitted under subpara-
24 graph (A) not later than 30 days after the sub-
25 mission date, unless the Governor determines

1 that the plan or request is inconsistent with re-
2 quirements of this section. If the Governor has
3 not made a determination within that 30-day
4 period, the plan shall be considered to be ap-
5 proved. If the plan or request is disapproved,
6 the Governor may provide a reasonable period
7 of time in which the plan or request may be
8 amended and resubmitted for approval. If the
9 plan or request is approved, the Governor shall
10 allocate funds to the local area within 30 days
11 after such approval.

12 (3) REALLOCATION.—If a local board and chief
13 elected official do not submit a local plan modifica-
14 tion (or other local request for funds specified in
15 guidance under subsection (b)) by the date specified
16 in paragraph (2), or the Governor disapproves a
17 local plan, the amount the local area would have
18 been eligible to receive pursuant to the formula
19 under paragraph (1)(B) shall be allocated to local
20 areas that receive approval of their local plan modi-
21 fications or local requests for funds under paragraph
22 (2). Each such local area shall receive a share of the
23 total amount available for reallocation under this
24 paragraph, in accordance with the area's share of

1 the total amount allocated under paragraph (1)(B)
2 to such local areas.

3 (f) USE OF FUNDS.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—The funds made available
5 under this section shall be used—

6 (A) to provide summer employment oppor-
7 tunities for low-income youth, with direct link-
8 ages to academic and occupational learning,
9 and may be used to provide supportive services,
10 such as transportation or child care, that is
11 necessary to enable the participation of such
12 youth in the opportunities; and

13 (B) to provide year-round employment op-
14 portunities, which may be combined with other
15 activities authorized under section 129 of the
16 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
17 2854), to low-income youth.

18 (2) PROGRAM PRIORITIES.—In administering
19 the funds under this section, the local board and
20 chief elected official shall give priority to—

21 (A) identifying employment opportunities
22 that are—

23 (i) in emerging or in-demand occupa-
24 tions in the local area; or

9 (3) ADMINISTRATION.—Not more than 5 per-
10 cent of the funds allocated to a local area under this
11 section may be used for the costs of administration
12 of this section.

21 SEC. 4. WORK-BASED EMPLOYMENT STRATEGIES AND AC-
22 TIVITIES OF DEMONSTRATED EFFECTIVE-
23 NESS.

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—From the funds available under
25 section 2(c)(2), the Secretary of Labor shall make allot-

1 ments to States, and award grants to eligible entities,
2 under subsection (b) to carry out work-based strategies
3 and activities of demonstrated effectiveness.

4 (b) ALLOTMENTS AND GRANTS.—

5 (1) ALLOTMENTS TO STATES FOR GRANTS.—

6 (A) ALLOTMENTS.—Using funds described
7 in subsection (a), the Secretary of Labor shall
8 allot to each State an amount equal to ½ of 1
9 percent of such funds.

10 (B) GRANTS TO ELIGIBLE ENTITIES.—The
11 State shall use the funds to award grants, on
12 a competitive basis, to eligible entities in the
13 State.

14 (2) DIRECT GRANTS TO ELIGIBLE ENTITIES.—
15 Using the funds described in subsection (a) that are
16 not allotted under paragraph (1), the Secretary of
17 Labor shall award grants on a competitive basis to
18 eligible entities.

19 (c) ELIGIBLE ENTITY.—To be eligible to receive a
20 grant under this section, an entity—

21 (1) shall include—

22 (A) a partnership involving a chief elected
23 official and the local board for the local area in-
24 volved (which may include a partnership with
25 such elected officials and boards and State

1 elected officials and State boards (as defined in
2 section 101 of the Workforce Investment Act of
3 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2801)) in the region and in
4 the State); or

5 (B) an entity eligible to apply for a grant,
6 contract, or agreement under section 166 of the
7 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
8 2911); and

9 (2) may include, in combination with a partner-
10 ship or entity described in paragraph (1)—

11 (A) employers or employer associations;
12 (B) adult education providers or postsec-
13 ondary educational institutions, including com-
14 munity colleges;

15 (C) community-based organizations;
16 (D) joint labor-management committees;
17 (E) work-related intermediaries;
18 (F) labor organizations that sponsor train-
19 ing or employment upgrade programs; and

20 (G) other appropriate organizations.

21 (d) APPLICATION.—To be eligible to receive a grant
22 under this section, an entity shall submit to the Secretary
23 of Labor (or to the State, if applying for a grant under
24 subsection (b)(1)(B)) an application at such time, in such

1 manner, and containing such information as the Secretary
2 may require. At a minimum, the application shall—

3 (1) describe the strategies and activities of dem-
4 onstrated effectiveness that the eligible entity will
5 carry out to provide unemployed, low-income young
6 adults and low-income youth with skills that will
7 lead to employment upon completion of participation
8 in such activities;

9 (2) describe the requirements that will apply re-
10 lating to the eligibility of unemployed, low-income
11 young adults and low-income youth, consistent with
12 section 2, for activities carried out under this sec-
13 tion, which requirements may include criteria to tar-
14 get assistance to particular categories of such adults
15 and youth, such as individuals with disabilities or in-
16 dividuals who have exhausted all rights to unemploy-
17 ment compensation;

18 (3) describe how the strategies and activities
19 will address the needs of the target populations iden-
20 tified in paragraph (2) and the needs of employers
21 in the local area;

22 (4) describe the expected outcomes to be
23 achieved by implementing the strategies and activi-
24 ties;

1 (5) provide evidence that the funds provided
2 through the grant will be expended expeditiously and
3 efficiently to implement the strategies and activities;

4 (6) describe how the strategies and activities
5 will be coordinated with other Federal, State and
6 local programs providing employment, education and
7 supportive activities;

8 (7) provide evidence of employer commitment to
9 participate in the activities funded under this sec-
10 tion, including identification of anticipated occupa-
11 tional and skill needs;

12 (8) provide assurances that the eligible entity
13 will report such information relating to fiscal, per-
14 formance, and other matters, as the Secretary of
15 Labor may require and as the Secretary determines
16 is necessary to effectively monitor the activities car-
17 ried out under this section;

18 (9) provide assurances that the eligible entity
19 will ensure compliance with the requirements, re-
20 strictions, labor standards, and other provisions de-
21 scribed in section 5(a); and

22 (10) if the entity will provide activities de-
23 scribed in subsection (f)(4), a description of how the
24 activities will lead to the industry-recognized creden-
25 tials involved.

1 (e) PRIORITY IN AWARDS.—In awarding grants
2 under this section, the Secretary of Labor (or a State,
3 under subsection (b)(1)(B)) shall give priority to applica-
4 tions submitted by eligible entities from areas of high pov-
5 erty and high unemployment, as defined by the Secretary,
6 such as Public Use Microdata Areas designated by the Bu-
7 reau of the Census.

8 (f) USE OF FUNDS.—An entity that receives a grant
9 under this section shall use the funds made available
10 through the grant to support work-based strategies and
11 activities of demonstrated effectiveness that are designed
12 to provide unemployed, low-income young adults and low-
13 income youth with skills that will lead to employment as
14 part of or upon completion of participation in such activi-
15 ties. Such strategies and activities may include—

16 (1) on-the-job training, registered apprenticeship
17 programs, or other programs that combine work
18 with skills development;

19 (2) sector-based training programs that have
20 been designed to meet the specific requirements of
21 an employer or group of employers in that sector
22 and for which employers are committed to hiring in-
23 dividuals upon successful completion of the training;

24 (3) training that supports an industry sector or
25 an employer-based or labor-management committee

1 industry partnership and that includes a significant
2 work-experience component;

3 (4) activities that lead to the acquisition of in-
4 dustry-recognized credentials in a field identified by
5 the State or local area as a growth sector or in-de-
6 mand industry in which there are likely to be signifi-
7 cant job opportunities in the short-term;

8 (5) activities that provide connections to imme-
9 diate work opportunities, including subsidized em-
10 ployment opportunities, or summer employment op-
11 portunities for youth, that include concurrent skills
12 training and other supports;

13 (6) activities offered through career academies
14 that provide students with the academic preparation
15 and training, such as paid internships and concur-
16 rent enrollment in community colleges or other post-
17 secondary institutions, needed to pursue a career
18 pathway that leads to postsecondary credentials and
19 in-demand jobs; and

20 (7) adult basic education and integrated basic
21 education and training for low-skilled individuals
22 who are not younger than 16 but are younger than
23 25, hosted at community colleges or at other sites,
24 to prepare individuals for jobs that are in demand
25 in a local area.

1 (g) COORDINATION OF FEDERAL ADMINISTRA-
2 TION.—The Secretary of Labor shall administer this sec-
3 tion in coordination with the Secretary of Education, the
4 Secretary of Health and Human Services, and other ap-
5 propriate agency heads, to ensure the effective implemen-
6 tation of this section.

7 **SEC. 5. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS.**

8 (a) LABOR STANDARDS AND PROTECTIONS.—Activi-
9 ties provided with funds made available under this Act
10 shall be subject to the requirements and restrictions, in-
11 cluding the labor standards, described in section 181 of
12 the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2931)
13 and the nondiscrimination provisions of section 188 of
14 such Act (29 U.S.C. 2938), in addition to other applicable
15 Federal laws.

16 (b) REPORTING.—The Secretary of Labor may re-
17 quire the reporting of information relating to fiscal, per-
18 formance and other matters that the Secretary determines
19 is necessary to effectively monitor the activities carried out
20 with funds provided under this Act. At a minimum, recipi-
21 ents of grants (including recipients of subgrants) under
22 this Act shall provide information relating to—

23 (1) the number of individuals participating in
24 activities with funds provided under this Act and the

1 number of such individuals who have completed such
2 participation;

3 (2) the expenditures of funds provided under
4 this Act;

5 (3) the number of jobs created pursuant to the
6 activities carried out under this Act;

7 (4) the demographic characteristics of individ-
8 uals participating in activities under this Act; and

9 (5) the performance outcomes for individuals
10 participating in activities under this Act, including—

11 (A) for low-income youth participating in
12 summer employment activities under sections 3
13 and 4, performance on indicators consisting
14 of—

15 (i) work readiness skill attainment
16 using an employer validated checklist; and

17 (ii) placement in or return to sec-
18 ondary or postsecondary education or
19 training, or entry into unsubsidized em-
20 ployment;

21 (B) for low-income youth participating in
22 year-round employment activities under section
23 3 or in activities under section 4, performance
24 on indicators consisting of—

- 1 (i) placement in or return to postsec-
- 2 ondary education;
- 3 (ii) attainment of a secondary school
- 4 diploma or its recognized equivalent;
- 5 (iii) attainment of an industry-recog-
- 6 nized credential; and
- 7 (iv) entry into, retention in, and earn-
- 8 ings in, unsubsidized employment; and
- 9 (C) for unemployed, low-income young
- 10 adults participating in activities under section
- 11 4, performance on indicators consisting of—
- 12 (i) entry into, retention in, and earn-
- 13 ings in, unsubsidized employment; and
- 14 (ii) attainment of an industry-recog-
- 15 nized credential.

16 (c) ACTIVITIES REQUIRED TO BE ADDITIONAL.—
17 Funds provided under this Act shall only be used for ac-
18 tivities that are in addition to activities that would other-
19 wise be available in the State or local area in the absence
20 of such funds.

21 (d) ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS.—The Secretary of
22 Labor may establish such additional requirements as the
23 Secretary determines may be necessary to ensure fiscal in-
24 tegrity, effective monitoring, and the appropriate and
25 prompt implementation of the activities under this Act.

1 (e) REPORT OF INFORMATION AND EVALUATIONS TO
2 CONGRESS AND THE PUBLIC.—The Secretary of Labor
3 shall provide to the appropriate committees of Congress
4 and make available to the public the information reported
5 pursuant to subsection (b).

6 **SEC. 6. DEFINITIONS.**

7 In this Act:

8 (1) CHIEF ELECTED OFFICIAL.—The term
9 “chief elected official” means the chief elected execu-
10 tive officer of a unit of local government in a local
11 area or in the case in which such an area includes
12 more than one unit of general government, the indi-
13 viduals designated under an agreement described in
14 section 117(c)(1)(B) of the Workforce Investment
15 Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C. 2832(c)(1)(B)).

16 (2) LOCAL AREA.—The term “local area”
17 means an area designated under section 116 of the
18 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
19 2831).

20 (3) LOCAL BOARD.—The term “local board”
21 means a board established under section 117 of the
22 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
23 2832).

24 (4) LOW-INCOME YOUTH.—The term “low-in-
25 come youth” means an individual who—

- 1 (A) is not younger than 16 but is younger
2 than 25;
- 3 (B) meets the definition of a low-income
4 individual provided in section 101(25) of the
5 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
6 2801(25)), except that—
7 (i) States and local areas, subject to
8 approval in the applicable State plans and
9 local plans, may increase the income level
10 specified in subparagraph (B)(i) of such
11 section to an amount not in excess of 200
12 percent of the poverty line for purposes of
13 determining eligibility for participation in
14 activities under section 3; and
15 (ii) eligible entities described in sec-
16 tion 4(c), subject to approval in the appli-
17 cable applications for funds, may make
18 such an increase for purposes of deter-
19 mining eligibility for participation in activi-
20 ties under section 4; and
21 (C) is in one or more of the categories
22 specified in section 101(13)(C) of the Work-
23 force Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
24 2801(13)(C)).

1 (5) POVERTY LINE.—The term “poverty line”
2 means a poverty line as defined in section 673 of the
3 Community Services Block Grant Act (42 U.S.C.
4 9902), applicable to a family of the size involved.

5 (6) REGISTERED APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM.—
6 The term “registered apprenticeship program”
7 means an apprenticeship program registered under
8 the Act of August 16, 1937 (commonly known as
9 the “National Apprenticeship Act”; 50 Stat. 664,
10 chapter 663; 29 U.S.C. 50 et seq.).

11 (7) STATE.—The term “State” means each of
12 the several States of the United States, and the Dis-
13 trict of Columbia.

14 (8) UNEMPLOYED, LOW-INCOME YOUNG
15 ADULT.—The term “unemployed, low-income young
16 adult” means an individual who—

17 (A) is not younger than 18 but is younger
18 than 35;

19 (B) is without employment and is seeking
20 assistance under this Act to obtain employment;
21 and

22 (C) meets the definition of a low-income
23 individual specified in section 101(25) of the
24 Workforce Investment Act of 1998 (29 U.S.C.
25 2801(25)), except that eligible entities described

1 in section 4(c), subject to approval in the appli-
2 cable applications for funds, may increase the
3 income level specified in subparagraph (B)(i) of
4 such section to an amount not in excess of 200
5 percent of the poverty line for purposes of de-
6 termining eligibility for participation in activi-
7 ties under section 4.
