# S. 3624

To amend the national service laws to prioritize national service programs and projects that are directly related to the response to and recovery from the COVID–19 public health emergency, and for other purposes.

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## A BILL

To amend the national service laws to prioritize national service programs and projects that are directly related to the response to and recovery from the COVID–19 public health emergency, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Pandemic Response  
5 and Opportunity Through National Service Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

2 Congress finds the following:

3 (1) The United States has a strong history of  
4 citizen response to national calls to service in order  
5 to help the Nation recover in times of crisis.

6 (2) More than 80 years ago, the Nation rose to  
7 the challenge of the Great Depression with the cre-  
8 ation of citizen service programs like the Civilian  
9 Conservation Corps (referred to in this section as  
10 the “CCC”) and the Works Progress Administration  
11 (referred to in this section as the “WPA”).

12 (3) Millions of participants benefitted from paid  
13 employment and opportunities to develop their skills  
14 while constructing national parks and public lands  
15 infrastructure and producing cultural works still en-  
16 joyed today.

17 (4) Following decades of evolution, incor-  
18 porating policies of both political parties, today’s na-  
19 tional service programs carry on the legacy of the  
20 CCC and WPA.

21 (5) Founded in 1990, the Corporation for Na-  
22 tional and Community Service today coordinates na-  
23 tional service by individuals in the United States  
24 across every State and territory, partnering with  
25 State-level commissions and supporting locally driv-

1 en services in partnership with nongovernmental or-  
2 ganizations and State governments.

3 (6) National service programs provide public  
4 health, education, employment training, and nutri-  
5 tion services for which the Nation has a critical need  
6 in the current crisis.

7 (7) The signature programs of the Corporation  
8 for National and Community Service, which are the  
9 AmeriCorps State and National, AmeriCorps Na-  
10 tional Civilian Community Corps, AmeriCorps  
11 VISTA, and National Senior Service Corps pro-  
12 grams, can and should be expanded to meet current  
13 needs.

14 (8) The novel coronavirus pandemic has in-  
15 fected and killed individuals in every State and terri-  
16 tory, causing more than 1,000,000 cases and 65,000  
17 deaths so far.

18 (9) In response, States, tribal governments, and  
19 cities across the country have closed down busi-  
20 nesses, schools, and public events, leading to a dra-  
21 matic drop in economic activity and a sharp pro-  
22 jected decline in the United States economy.

23 (10) More than 30,000,000 applications for un-  
24 employment benefits have been filed in recent weeks,

1 with weekly filings repeatedly exceeding historic  
2 record levels.

3 (11) More than 1 in every 10 adults in the  
4 United States has applied for unemployment insur-  
5 ance since the crisis began.

6 (12) Public health leaders agree that to safely  
7 reopen the Nation and revive its economy, a massive  
8 effort to test millions of individuals in the United  
9 States and to trace contacts of those who are or may  
10 be infected is needed.

11 (13) To recover, the Nation also needs mean-  
12 ingful employment opportunities, as well as a signifi-  
13 cant expansion of the human capital working to ad-  
14 dress community needs around public health, behav-  
15 ioral health, hunger, education, and conservation.

16 (14) As the Nation works to respond to and re-  
17 cover from the current twin challenges of a public  
18 health pandemic and an economic crisis, national  
19 service presents a unique opportunity for flexible, lo-  
20 cally driven responses to meet State and local public  
21 health, employment, and recovery needs.

22 **SEC. 3. PURPOSES.**

23 The purposes of this Act are—

24 (1) to provide for 750,000 participants, over 3  
25 years, in national service programs, such as the

1 Public Land Corps (also known as the 21st Century  
2 Conservation Service Corps) programs and other  
3 AmeriCorps programs, that will provide services in  
4 response to the pandemic and economic crisis, in-  
5 cluding to help satisfy the projected need for as  
6 many as 300,000 additional public health workers;

7 (2) to ensure that participant allowances cover  
8 the reasonable cost of participation and provide par-  
9 ticipants with economic and educational opportunity;

10 (3) to stabilize such national service programs  
11 during economic crisis; and

12 (4) to support opportunities for all individuals  
13 in the United States to engage in service.

14 **SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.**

15 (a) NCSA.—Section 101 of the National and Com-  
16 munity Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12511) is amend-  
17 ed—

18 (1) by redesignating paragraphs (13) through  
19 (35) and paragraphs (36) through (49) as para-  
20 graphs (14) through (36) and (38) through (51), re-  
21 spectively;

22 (2) by inserting after paragraph (12) the fol-  
23 lowing:

24 “(13) COVID–19 DEFINITIONS.—

1           “(A) COVID–19 EMERGENCY RESPONSE  
2           AND RECOVERY PERIOD.—The term ‘COVID–  
3           19 emergency response and recovery period’  
4           means the period beginning on the first day of  
5           the COVID–19 public health emergency and  
6           ending at the end of fiscal year 2023.

7           “(B) COVID–19 PUBLIC HEALTH EMER-  
8           GENCY.—The term ‘COVID–19 public health  
9           emergency’ means the public health emergency  
10          declared by the Secretary of Health and  
11          Human Services under section 319 of the Pub-  
12          lic Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247d) on  
13          January 31, 2020, with respect to COVID–  
14          19.”; and

15          (3) by inserting after paragraph (36), as so re-  
16          designated, the following:

17          “(37) PUBLIC LAND CORPS.—The term ‘Public  
18          Lands Corps’ means the Corps established in section  
19          204 of the Public Lands Corps Act of 1993 (16  
20          U.S.C. 1723).”.

21          (b) DVSA.—Section 421 of the Domestic Volunteer  
22          Service Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C. 5061) is amended—

23                  (1) in paragraph (19), by striking “and” after  
24                  the semicolon;

1 (2) in paragraph (20), by striking the period at  
2 the end and inserting a semicolon; and

3 (3) by adding at the end the following:

4 “(21)(A) the term ‘COVID–19 emergency re-  
5 sponse and recovery period’ means the period begin-  
6 ning on the first day of the COVID–19 public health  
7 emergency and ending at the end of fiscal year  
8 2023; and

9 “(B) the term ‘COVID–19 public health emer-  
10 gency’ means the public health emergency declared  
11 by the Secretary of Health and Human Services  
12 under section 319 of the Public Health Service Act  
13 (42 U.S.C. 247d) on January 31, 2020, with respect  
14 to COVID–19; and

15 “(22) the term ‘Public Lands Corps’ means the  
16 Corps established in section 204 of the Public Lands  
17 Corps Act of 1993 (16 U.S.C. 1723).”.

18 **SEC. 5. PRIORITIZING RESPONSE SERVICES.**

19 (a) AMERICORPS STATE AND NATIONAL.—

20 (1) NATIONAL SERVICE PRIORITIES.—Section  
21 122(f) of the National and Community Service Act  
22 of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12572(f)) is amended—

23 (A) in paragraph (1)—

24 (i) in subparagraph (A), by adding at  
25 the end the following: “For fiscal years

1           2020 through 2023, the Corporation shall  
2           include, in the national service priorities,  
3           the priorities described in paragraph (5).”;  
4           and

5                   (ii) in subparagraph (B), by adding at  
6           the end the following: “For fiscal years  
7           2020 through 2023, each State shall in-  
8           clude, in the State priorities, the priorities  
9           described in section (5).”; and

10           (B) by adding at the end the following:

11                   “(5) EMERGENCY PRIORITIES.—For fiscal years  
12           2020 through 2023, the priorities established under  
13           paragraph (1) for national service programs shall  
14           provide that the Corporation and the States, as ap-  
15           propriate, shall give priority to entities submitting  
16           applications—

17                           “(A) that propose activities directly related  
18           to the response to and recovery from the  
19           COVID–19 public health emergency, such as  
20           the provision of—

21                                   “(i) public health services, including  
22                                   contact tracing and support for isolation  
23                                   and quarantine activities;

24                                   “(ii) emergency logistics;



1           “(iii) work that furthers the capacity  
2 of State (including territorial), tribal, and  
3 local health departments and the rec-  
4 ommendations of the Director of the Cen-  
5 ters for Disease Control and Prevention;

6           “(iv) workforce investment activities  
7 and reemployment services;

8           “(v) education, including enrichment  
9 and adult education and literacy activities;

10          “(vi) jobs for youth in preserving and  
11 restoring nature; and

12          “(vii) services to address food insecu-  
13 rity;

14          “(B) who—

15           “(i) are current (as of the date of the  
16 application submission) or former recipi-  
17 ents of financial assistance under the pro-  
18 gram for which the application is sub-  
19 mitted; and

20           “(ii) are able to provide services di-  
21 rectly related to the response and recovery  
22 described in subparagraph (A);

23          “(C) to the maximum extent practicable, if  
24 the entities are proposing programs that serve,  
25 or proposing to give priority for positions to ap-

1 applicants from, underserved populations, such as  
2 economically disadvantaged individuals, minor-  
3 ity individuals, individuals who have had con-  
4 tact with the juvenile justice system, Indians,  
5 veterans, and individuals whose abilities are not  
6 typical, such as individuals with intellectual or  
7 developmental disabilities; and

8 “(D) that propose to give priority for posi-  
9 tions to applicants who—

10 “(i) were serving outside of the  
11 United States in the Peace Corps, the J.  
12 William Fulbright Educational Exchange  
13 Program referenced in section 112 of the  
14 Mutual Educational and Cultural Ex-  
15 change Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2460), or  
16 the program under this subtitle, subtitle E,  
17 or part A of title I of the Domestic Volun-  
18 teer Service Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C. 4951  
19 et seq.); but

20 “(ii) ended their terms of service  
21 early, or returned to the United States be-  
22 fore the end of their terms of service, due  
23 to the COVID–19 public health emer-  
24 gency.”.

1 (b) AMERICORPS NCCC.—Section 157 of the Na-  
2 tional and Community Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C.  
3 12617) is amended—

4 (1) in subsection (b)(1), by adding at the end  
5 the following:

6 “(C) SURGE CAPACITY AND PRIORITY  
7 PROJECTS.—

8 “(i) SURGE CAPACITY PROJECTS.—

9 The Corporation and the Director of the  
10 Centers for Disease Control and Preven-  
11 tion shall develop, and the Corporation  
12 shall approve, a proposal for public health  
13 surge capacity projects. In carrying out the  
14 projects, the Corporation and the Director  
15 shall develop and deploy public health  
16 surge capacity teams.

17 “(ii) PRIORITY PROJECTS.—For fiscal  
18 years 2020 through 2023, the Corporation  
19 shall give priority to entities submitting  
20 applications for projects under this subtitle  
21 in the same manner as the Corporation  
22 gives priority to entities submitting appli-  
23 cations for national service programs  
24 under section 122(f)(5).”; and

25 (2) in subsection (c)—

1 (A) in paragraph (1), by striking “The  
2 campus” and inserting “Except as provided in  
3 paragraph (3), the campus”; and

4 (B) by adding at the end the following:

5 “(3) SURGE CAPACITY AND PRIORITY  
6 PROJECTS.—The Corporation shall assign the  
7 projects described in clauses (i) and (ii) of sub-  
8 section (b)(1)(C) to specified Corps campuses.”.

9 (c) AMERICORPS VISTA.—Section 109 of the Do-  
10 mestic Volunteer Service Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C. 4960)  
11 is amended by adding at the end the following: “For fiscal  
12 years 2020 through 2023, the Corporation shall give pri-  
13 ority to entities submitting applications for projects or  
14 programs under this part in the same manner as the Cor-  
15 poration gives priority to entities submitting applications  
16 for national service programs under section 122(f)(5) of  
17 the National and Community Service Act of 1990 (42  
18 U.S.C. 12572(f)(5)).”.

19 **SEC. 6. STRENGTHENING OPPORTUNITY.**

20 (a) ALLOWANCES.—

21 (1) DOMESTIC VOLUNTEER SERVICE ACT OF  
22 1973.—Section 105(b) of the Domestic Volunteer  
23 Service Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C. 4955(b)) is amend-  
24 ed—

25 (A) in paragraph (2)—

1 (i) in subparagraph (A), by striking  
2 “95 percent” and inserting “175 percent”;  
3 and

4 (ii) in subparagraph (B), by striking  
5 “105 percent” and inserting “185 per-  
6 cent”; and

7 (B) by adding at the end the following:

8 “(4)(A) A stipend or allowance under this sec-  
9 tion or an allowance under section 140 of the Na-  
10 tional and Community Service Act of 1990 (42  
11 U.S.C. 12594) shall not be increased as a result of  
12 amendments made by the Pandemic Response and  
13 Opportunity Through National Service Act, or any  
14 other amendment made to this section or that sec-  
15 tion 140, respectively, unless the funds appropriated  
16 for carrying out this part or subtitle C of the Na-  
17 tional and Community Service Act of 1990 (42  
18 U.S.C. 12571 et seq.), respectively, are sufficient to  
19 maintain for the fiscal year involved a number of  
20 participants to serve under this part or that subtitle  
21 C, respectively, that is at least equal to the number  
22 of such participants so serving during the preceding  
23 fiscal year.

24 “(B) In the event that sufficient appropriations  
25 for any fiscal year (consistent with subparagraph

1 (A) are not available to increase any stipend or al-  
 2 lowance under this section or allowance under sec-  
 3 tion 140 of the National and Community Service Act  
 4 of 1990 to the minimum amount specified in this  
 5 section or under that section 140, respectively, the  
 6 Director shall increase the stipend or allowance in-  
 7 volved to such amount as appropriations for such  
 8 year permit consistent with subparagraph (A).”.

9 (2) NATIONAL AND COMMUNITY SERVICE ACT  
 10 OF 1990.—Section 158(b) of the National and Com-  
 11 munity Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12618(b)) is  
 12 amended—

13 (A) by striking “The Director” the first  
 14 place it appears and inserting the following:

15 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director”; and

16 (B) by striking “100 percent” and insert-  
 17 ing “175 percent”.

18 (b) NATIONAL SERVICE EDUCATIONAL AWARDS.—  
 19 Section 147(a) of the National and Community Service  
 20 Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12603(a)) is amended—

21 (1) by striking “Except as provided” and in-  
 22 serting the following:

23 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided”;

24 (2) by striking “shall receive a national service  
 25 educational award” and all that follows through “ap-

1       propriations)” and inserting “shall be entitled to a  
2       national service educational award equal to the  
3       award amount specified in paragraph (2)”;

4               (3) by adding at the end the following:

5               “(2) AWARD AMOUNT.—The award referred to  
6       in paragraph (1), payable to an individual described  
7       in such paragraph, shall be in an amount that is  
8       equal to twice the amount of the national average of  
9       the cost for in-State tuition and fees at public, 4-  
10      year institutions of higher education, for the award  
11      year for which the national service position is ap-  
12      proved by the Corporation.

13              “(3) DEFINITION.—In this subsection, the term  
14      ‘institution of higher education’ has the meaning  
15      given the term in section 148(h).”.

16      (c) TAX PROVISIONS.—

17              (1) INCOME TAX EXCLUSION FOR LIVING AL-  
18      LOWANCE.—

19              (A) IN GENERAL.—Part III of subchapter  
20      B of chapter 1 of the Internal Revenue Code of  
21      1986 is amended by inserting after section  
22      139H the following new section:

1 **“SEC. 139I. LIVING ALLOWANCE FOR NATIONAL SERVICE**  
 2 **PARTICIPANTS.**

3 “Gross income does not include the amount of any  
 4 living allowance provided under section 105(b) of the Do-  
 5 mestic Volunteer Service Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C. 4955(b))  
 6 or section 140(a) or 158(b) of the National and Commu-  
 7 nity Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12594(a),  
 8 12618(b)).”.

9 (B) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of  
 10 sections for part III of subchapter B of chapter  
 11 1 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 is  
 12 amended by inserting after the item relating to  
 13 section 139H the following new item:

“Sec. 139I. Living allowance for national service participants.”.

14 (C) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments  
 15 made by this paragraph shall apply to taxable  
 16 years beginning after the date of the enactment  
 17 of this Act.

18 (2) EXCLUSION FROM GROSS INCOME OF NA-  
 19 TIONAL SERVICE EDUCATIONAL AWARDS.—

20 (A) IN GENERAL.—Section 117 of the In-  
 21 ternal Revenue Code of 1986 (relating to quali-  
 22 fied scholarships) is amended by adding at the  
 23 end the following new subsection:

24 “(e) NATIONAL SERVICE EDUCATIONAL AWARDS.—  
 25 Gross income shall not include any payments from the Na-



1 tional Service Trust established under section 145 of the  
2 National and Community Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C.  
3 12601), including the national service educational award  
4 described in subtitle D of title I of such Act (42 U.S.C.  
5 12601 et seq.).”.

6 (B) EXCLUSION OF DISCHARGE OF STU-  
7 DENT LOAN DEBT.—Subsection (f) of section  
8 108 of such Code is amended by adding at the  
9 end the following new paragraph:

10 “(6) PAYMENTS UNDER NATIONAL SERVICE  
11 EDUCATIONAL AWARD PROGRAMS.—In the case of  
12 an individual, gross income shall not include any  
13 amount received as a national service educational  
14 award under subtitle D of title I of the National and  
15 Community Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12601  
16 et seq.).”.

17 (C) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments  
18 made by this paragraph shall apply to taxable  
19 years ending after the date of the enactment of  
20 this Act.

21 **SEC. 7. INVITING PARTICIPATION.**

22 (a) COORDINATION WITH OTHER YOUTH PRO-  
23 GRAMS.—Section 193A of the National and Community  
24 Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12651d) is amended by  
25 adding at the end the following:

1       “(j) COORDINATION WITH OTHER YOUTH PRO-  
2 GRAMS.—

3               “(1) COVERED PROGRAMS.—The term ‘covered  
4 program’ means—

5                       “(A) the YouthBuild program carried out  
6 by the Secretary of Labor under section 171 of  
7 the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act  
8 (29 U.S.C. 3226);

9                       “(B) the program of the Indian Youth  
10 Service Corps under section 210 of the Public  
11 Lands Corps Act of 1993 (16 U.S.C. 1727b);

12                      “(C) a youth conservation corps program  
13 under title I of the Act entitled ‘An Act to es-  
14 tablish a pilot program in the Departments of  
15 the Interior and Agriculture designated as the  
16 Youth Conservation Corps, and for other pur-  
17 poses’, approved August 13, 1970 (commonly  
18 known as the ‘Youth Conservation Corps Act of  
19 1970’; 16 U.S.C. 1701 et seq.); and

20                      “(D) the National Guard Youth Challenge  
21 Program under section 509 of title 32, United  
22 States Code.

23               “(2) COORDINATION.—The Chief Executive Of-  
24 ficer, in coordination with the Federal agency rep-  
25 resentatives for covered programs, shall develop a

1 plan and make recommendations in the plan to im-  
2 prove coordination between covered programs and  
3 programs of the Corporation to meet the needs of  
4 underserved youth, such as economically disadvan-  
5 taged youth, minority youth, youth who left school  
6 without a secondary school diploma, formerly incar-  
7 cerated or court-involved youth, youth who are chil-  
8 dren of an incarcerated parent, youth in foster care  
9 (including youth aging out of foster care), migrant  
10 youth, and other youth who are neither enrolled in  
11 secondary or postsecondary school or participating in  
12 the labor market.”.

13 (b) PLATFORM FOR NATIONAL SENIOR SERVICE  
14 CORPS.—Title IV of the Domestic Volunteer Service Act  
15 of 1973 is amended—

16 (1) by redesignating section 421 (42 U.S.C.  
17 5061), amended by section 4(b), as section 401;

18 (2) by moving that section 401 so as to follow  
19 the title heading for title IV; and

20 (3) by inserting after section 420 (42 U.S.C.  
21 5059) the following:

22 **“SEC. 421. ONLINE SERVICE PLATFORM.**

23 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Chief Executive Officer  
24 of the Corporation shall establish an online service plat-  
25 form with a gateway to connect volunteers in the National

1 Senior Service Corps with service projects and enable the  
2 volunteers to carry out distance volunteer services. The  
3 platform shall be linked to and placed prominently on the  
4 website of the Corporation. The Corporation may enter  
5 into a contract with a public entity to create the platform.

6 “(b) TRAINING RESOURCES AND INFORMATION.—

7 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Corporation shall pro-  
8 vide training resources, information, and guidance  
9 for the volunteers on the platform.

10 “(2) INFORMATION.—The Corporation shall  
11 provide information to regional offices of the Cor-  
12 poration about how to get volunteers in the National  
13 Senior Service Corps connected to the platform  
14 through the gateway.

15 “(3) GUIDANCE.—The Corporation shall issue  
16 guidance for the regional offices about how to trans-  
17 fer the programs of the National Senior Service  
18 Corps to the platform.

19 “(4) OUTREACH.—The Corporation shall pro-  
20 vide outreach services to promote the platform in-  
21 cluding outreach to institutions of higher education,  
22 the Department of Veterans Affairs for mentorship  
23 projects, and State and local governments for com-  
24 munity engagement projects.”.

1           (c) OUTREACH AND PROMOTION CAMPAIGN.—Sec-  
2 tion 193A(g) of such Act is amended by adding at the  
3 end the following:

4           “(4) OUTREACH AND PROMOTION CAMPAIGN.—

5                   “(A) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out public  
6 awareness functions under this subsection, the  
7 Corporation shall carry out an outreach and  
8 promotion campaign to promote programs  
9 under the national service laws with opportuni-  
10 ties to respond to the COVID–19 public health  
11 emergency, with the goal of maximizing aware-  
12 ness of those programs among individuals ages  
13 17 through 30.

14                   “(B) REPORT.—The Corporation shall pre-  
15 pare and submit to Congress a report that—

16                           “(i) evaluates the outreach and pro-  
17 motion campaign; and

18                           “(ii) contains—

19                                   “(I) an analysis of the measures  
20 and resources that would be required  
21 for the Corporation effectively to no-  
22 tify individuals who are ages 17  
23 through 30 every 2 years of opportu-  
24 nities under the national service laws

1 and steps to take to apply for those  
2 opportunities;

3 “(II) a description of how the  
4 Corporation would ensure those meas-  
5 ures would enable the Corporation to  
6 provide that notification to targeted  
7 individuals from diverse geographic  
8 areas, including individuals who are  
9 ages 17 through 30 living in rural  
10 areas and on Indian lands (as defined  
11 in section 3 of the Native American  
12 Business Development, Trade Pro-  
13 motion, and Tourism Act of 2000 (25  
14 U.S.C. 4302)); and

15 “(III) a recommendation regard-  
16 ing whether the Corporation should  
17 make the notifications described in  
18 subclause (I).”.

19 (d) VOLUNTEER GENERATION FUND.—Section  
20 198P(d)(2) of the National and Community Service Act  
21 of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12653p(d)(2)) is amended by adding  
22 at the end the following: “With respect to grants made  
23 with funds appropriated as an additional amount under  
24 section 501(a)(4)(F), the minimum grant amount shall be  
25 not less than \$250,000.”.

1 **SEC. 8. ENSURING AGILITY.**

2 (a) **WAIVER OF MATCHING FUNDS REQUIRE-**
