Mr. WELCH introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

A BILL

To require the Comptroller General of the United States to conduct an audit of the expenditures of the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “FEMA Operational
5 Transparency Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. AUDIT.**

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
8 date of enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General
9 of the United States shall conduct an audit on the expend-
10 itures of the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

1 (b) CONTENTS.—The audit conducted under sub-
2 section (a) shall—

3 (1) detail payments made by the Federal Emer-
4 gency Management Agency for—

5 (A) individual assistance under section 408
6 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and
7 Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5174);

8 (B) the Public Assistance Program of the
9 Federal Emergency Management Agency;

10 (C) hazard mitigation under section 404 of
11 the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and
12 Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5170c);
13 and

14 (D) Federal agency mission assignments in
15 anticipation of, or in response to, a major dis-
16 aster or emergency declared under section 401
17 or 501, respectively, of the Robert T. Stafford
18 Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act
19 (42 U.S.C. 5170, 5191);

20 (2) compare the payments for the programs de-
21 scribed in paragraph (1) to the administrative cost
22 of those programs;

23 (3) describe the role of personnel hired to ad-
24 minister each program described in paragraph (1);

1 (4) describe the amount of the Disaster Relief
2 Fund of the Federal Emergency Management Agen-
3 cy that is spent on administrative costs for the pro-
4 grams described in paragraph (1);

5 (5) detail how workforce shortages the Federal
6 Emergency Management Agency has been experi-
7 encing since 2020 have impacted the administrative
8 costs described in paragraph (4); and

9 (6) include recommendations for reducing
10 amounts spent on administrative costs and ensuring
11 that disaster survivors, especially in rural commu-
12 nities, receive the most relief possible.

13 (c) SUBMISSION.—With respect to the audit con-
14 ducted under subsection (a), the Comptroller General of
15 the United States shall—

16 (1) submit to Congress the audit; and
17 (2) make the audit publicly available.
