Enactment of this legislation would create a new scholarship program that would be administered on each campus within the system. This bill appropriates \$30,000,000, one-time from the Education Fund to the Board of Regents to fund the Access Utah Promise Scholarship Program. Implementation of this program would require each of the 8 Utah System of Higher Education institutions to hire one full-time employee to administer the new scholarship. Institutions estimate that the cost per new employee would be \$70,000 ongoing, including salary and benefits for a total of \$560,000 ongoing, beginning in FY 2020. These personnel expenses would be funded through each school's allocation of scholarship funding. This legislation also phases out several scholarship programs. As they are phased out, those funds will be made available for the Access Utah Promise Scholarship Program. The funding to be transferred from these programs to the new scholarship will vary each fiscal year as existing student awards are utilized and/or student eligibility expires.
