Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation could cost business selling certain types of new boats approximately \$100 for the purchase and installation of carbon monoxide detectors. The cumulative impact on the industry is \$10,000 per year, starting in FY 2020. It is possible that these costs would be passed on to the consumers.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation could result in a small increase in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
