Local Government

Enactment of this legislation could impact counties and municipalities should they choose to open and operate an overdose prevention site. These costs would vary between governmental entities depending on the scale and staffing plan of each overdose prevention site. It is estimated that annual costs would be \$178,200 on-going for cities of the 1st and 2nd class should they choose to implement an overdose prevention site. This assumes each municipality will need .5 FTE at \$18.00 an hour to meet the standards established in this legislation.

Individuals & Businesses

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct expenditures from tax or fee changes for Utah residents and businesses.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
