Enactment of this legislation likely will not materially impact state revenue.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Public Safety \$3,000,000 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2025, which is appropriated in this legislation, to provide grants for law enforcement canines. Enactment could also cost the Department of Public Safety \$8,000 ongoing from the General Fund beginning in FY 2025 to administer the grant program; the department indicates it can absorb this cost.

Local government law enforcement agencies may qualify for a grant to purchase, train, handle, and insure law enforcement canines.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct expenditures from tax or fee changes for Utah residents and businesses.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

This bill does not create a new program or significantly expand an existing program.

Notes on Notes

Fiscal notes estimate the direct costs or revenues of enacting a bill. The Legislature uses them to balance the budget. They do not measure a bill's benefits or non-fiscal impacts like opportunity costs, wait times, or inconvenience. A fiscal note is not an appropriation. The Legislature decides appropriations separately.
