Enactment of this legislation likely will not materially impact state revenue.

Enactment of this bill could cost the Department of Environmental Quality a total of \$517,800 in FY2020 and \$40,400 in FY2021. The costs breakdown is as follows: an estimated \$254,700 in Air Quality monitoring costs in FY 2020 (\$40,400 ongoing for monitoring and \$214,300 one-time for equipment), \$183,100 one time in FY 2020 for Water Quality monitoring, and \$80,000 one-time in FY 2020 for Light and Sound monitoring. The Department of Environmental Quality can absorb an estimated \$34,800 of ongoing and \$1,800 one-time costs to Air Quality. The Department of Environmental Quality can absorb an estimated \$20,000 in one-time costs for Water Quality.
