8	LONG TITLE
9	General Description:
10	This concurrent resolution of the Legislature and the Governor urges prescribers,
11	dispensers, manufacturers of drugs, health insurers, and government agencies generally
12	to take specific steps to improve patient- and safety-centered prescription labels.
13	Highlighted Provisions:
14	This resolution:
15	 urges individuals to assume primary responsibility for the proper and safe use,
16	storage, and disposal of any drug prescribed to them, and to encourage their
17	dispensers to provide adequate instruction on how to fulfill those responsibilities;
18	 urges the Utah Pharmacy Board, the Utah Pharmacists Association, and other
19	related groups to meet regularly during 2011 to develop a prescription label format
20	that is patient- and safety-centered;
21	 urges the Utah Pharmacy Board and the Utah Pharmacists Association to provide
22	project updates and present the improved prescription label format to the
23	Legislature's Health and Human Services Interim Committee; and
24	 urges federal, state, and local agencies to continue working to reduce prescription
25	drug misuse, addiction, and drug-related death, to develop campaigns to educate the
26	public about the dangers of prescription drug misuse, to promote the proper disposal
27	of partially used or expired prescriptions, to continue developing drop-off sites and
28	other secure and environmentally friendly methods for disposing of unused
29	prescription drugs, and to continue promoting the availability and use of programs

that treat prescription drug addiction.
Special Clauses:
None
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Utah, the Governor concurring therein:
WHEREAS, the misuse of prescription drugs increases the likelihood of a negative
physical reaction, dependency, addiction, overdose, and death;
WHEREAS, individuals, as consumers of prescription drugs, should assume the
primary responsibility for the proper and safe use, storage, and disposal of any drug prescribed
to them;
WHEREAS, dispensers of prescription drugs should provide adequate instructions to
consumers on how to fulfill their responsibilities regarding the safe use, storage, and disposal
of prescription drugs;
WHEREAS, patient- and safety-centered prescription labels decrease the chance for
misuse of prescribed drugs;
WHEREAS, patient- and safety-centered labels should include improved directions for
use with wording that is easily understood by a non-medical professional or individual;
WHEREAS, properly and safely storing prescription medications reduces the potential
for misuse, abuse, and theft;
WHEREAS, properly disposing of unused medications, by the expiration date, reduces
the potential for misuse, abuse, and theft; and
WHEREAS, prescribers, dispensers, manufacturers, health insurers, and government
agencies are each in a position to improve prescription drug patient safety:
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah, the
Governor concurring therein, urge individuals, as consumers of prescription drugs, to assume
the primary responsibility for the proper and safe use, storage, and disposal of any drug
prescribed to them, and to encourage their prescription drug dispensers to provide adequate
instructions on how to fulfill those responsibilities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature and the Governor urge the Utah Pharmacy Board, the Utah Pharmacists Association, and other related parties to meet during 2011 to design a prescription label that is patient-centered and contains directions for safe use, including the purpose of the medication, that employ simple and clear terms that can be easily understood by non-medical professionals or individuals and improved font types and sizes to meet the needs of those who are visually impaired. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature and the Governor urge the Utah Pharmacy Board and the Utah Pharmacists Association to provide updates on the progress of this project and present the improved prescription label format to the Health and Human Services Interim Committee by November 2011. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature and the Governor urge federal, state, and local agencies, as entities created to protect the public, to continue working, on their own and through multi-agency projects like the Utah Prescription Pain Medication Management and Education Program and the Utah Pharmaceutical Drug Crime Project, to reduce prescription drug misuse, addiction, and death, to continue developing campaigns such as "Use Only as Directed" and "Clean Out the Cabinet," to educate the public about the dangers of prescription drug misuse, the importance of reading the prescription drug label and using only as directed, to promote the disposal of partially used or expired prescriptions, to continue developing drop-off sites and other secure and environmentally friendly methods for disposing of unused prescription drugs, and to continue promoting the availability and use of programs that treat prescription drug addiction. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of the resolution be sent to the Utah Pharmacy Board, the Utah Pharmacists Association, the Utah Medical Association, the Utah Nurse Practitioners Association, the Utah Food Industry Association, the Utah Retail Merchants Association, the Utah Health Insurance Association, the Employers Council, the ERISA Industry Committee, the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, the National Federation of Independent Business, the Health and Human Services Interim Committee, the Division of Occupational and Professional Licensing, the Utah Department of Health, the Utah
