| 18 | In recognition of the importance that sports can play in the personal lives of |
| 19 | Vermonters and in the economic well-being of the state, the general assembly |

| 1 | (1) Because of Vermonter Jake Burton Carpenter, Vermont is widely |

| 8 | snowboarding was born, and for 27 years it has hosted the U.S. Open |
