Whereas, passenger rail service between Rutland and Burlington was halted in 1953, and in recent years, interest has existed in restoring this transportation service, and

Whereas, a prerequisite for Amtrak to extend the existing Ethan Allen train from its current terminus in Rutland north to Burlington is the installation of welded rail along the entire 67-mile distance, and

Whereas, the incremental progress towards implementing this infrastructure improvement has left only 11 miles of track updating to complete, and

Whereas, the projected cost to finish all required aspects of the project is \$26 million, including the construction of station platforms, and

Whereas, the Vermont Agency of Transportation applied for a \$12 million federal Transportation Infrastructure Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) grant to move the project towards conclusion, and

Whereas, in the fall of 2015, the U.S. Department of Transportation awarded Vermont a \$10 million TIGER grant, and

Whereas, although short of the requested sum, securing the \$10 million TIGER grant is a major step towards arranging for the balance of the needed monies, and

Whereas, the hope for completing the financing package includes utilizing \$3 million in federal highway funds to address road crossing problems and \$13 million in additional State funds, and

Whereas, although the inauguration of the extended Ethan Allen service is still several years in the future, State transportation officials and rail enthusiasts celebrated this important milestone in the restoration of intercity passenger rail service to Vermont's Queen City, now therefore be it
