3 "Sec. 1. RCW 76.04.780 and 2019 c 77 s 1 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 (1) The commissioner shall convene a utility wildland fire 6 prevention ((task force)) advisory committee with electrical power 7 distribution utilities by ((July 1, 2019, and no less than quarterly 8 thereafter until December 1, 2020)) August 1, 2021. The duties of the 9 ((task force)) advisory committee are to advise the department on 10 issues including, but not limited to:

11 (a) ((Developing, for consideration by the department and 12 individual electric utilities, a model agreement for managing danger 13 trees and other vegetation that pose a risk of wildland fire and 14 associated utility liability due to the proximity to electrical 15 transmission wires and other utility equipment;

(d) Creating rosters of certified wildland fire investigation
 firms or persons and third-party qualified utility operations
 personnel who may be called upon by the parties as appropriate; and
 (e) Other issues brought forward by task force members.

28 (2) In consultation with the task force created in subsection (1)

- 29 of this section, the department must:
- 30 (a) Make available the form of communication protocols and 31 educational exchanges between the department and electric utilities;

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- 1 (b) With the assistance of the task force, distribute a voluntary 2 model danger tree management agreement to utilities for their 3 consideration for execution with the department;
- 4 (c) Publish the protocols and thresholds described in subsection
 5 (1) (c) of this section;
- 6 (d) Issue a roster of third-party certified wildland fire 7 investigators and qualified utility personnel that may assist the 8 department or utility in understanding and reducing risks and 9 liabilities from wildland fire. The department must update the roster 10 of third-party certified wildland fire investigators and qualified 11 utility personnel no less than every four years.
- (3) The department must submit, in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, 12 a preliminary report to the legislature by December 1, 2019, and a 13 final report to the legislature by December 1, 2020, on the results 14 15 of tasks identified in subsections (1) and (2) of this section and 16 identification of legislation, if any, necessary to implement the 17 recommendations of the task force)) Matters related to the ongoing implementation of the relevant recommendations of the electric 18 19 utility wildland fire prevention task force established in chapter 77, Laws of 2019, and by August 1, 2021: 20
- (i) Finalizing a model agreement for managing danger trees and other vegetation adjacent to utility rights-of-way on state uplands managed by the department;
- 24 <u>(ii) Implementing recommendations of the task force related to</u> 25 <u>communications and information exchanges between the department and</u> 26 <u>utilities;</u>
- 27 <u>(iii) Implementing recommendations of the task force related to</u> 28 protocols and thresholds when implementing provisions of RCW 29 76.04.015; and
- 30 <u>(iv)</u> Implementing recommendations of the task force related to 31 creating rosters of certified wildland fire investigator firms or 32 persons and qualified utility operations personnel who may be called 33 <u>upon as appropriate;</u>
- 34 (b) Providing a forum for electric utilities, the department, and 35 other fire suppression organizations of the state to identify and 36 develop solutions to issues of wildfire prevention and risk 37 mitigation specifically related to electric utilities transmission 38 and distribution networks, identification of best management 39 practices, electric utility infrastructure protection, and wildland 40 fire suppression and response;

11	(2) By August 1, 2021, the department must post on its website
12	and update quarterly as necessary:
13	(a) Communication protocols and educational exchanges between the
14	department and electric utilities;
15	(b) A voluntary model danger tree management agreement to
16	utilities for their consideration for execution with the department;
17	(c) Protocols and thresholds that may be utilized when the
18	department's investigation involves electric utility infrastructure
19	or potential electric utility liability; and
20	(d) A roster of third-party certified wildland fire investigators
21	and qualified utility personnel that may assist the department or
22	utility in understanding and reducing risks and liabilities from
23	wildland fire.
24	(3) Beginning July 1, 2022, and at the beginning of each
25	subsequent biennium thereafter, the department must submit, in
26	compliance with RCW 43.01.036, a report describing the prior biennium
27	proceedings of the advisory committee, including identification of
28	recommended legislation, if any, necessary to prevent wildfires
29	related to electric utilities.
30	(4) The commissioner or the commissioner's designee must chair
31	the ((task force)) <u>advisory committee</u> created in subsection (1) of
32	this section and must appoint ((task force)) <u>advisory committee</u>
33	members. ((Task force)) <u>Advisory committee</u> membership should include:
34	(a) Entities providing retail electric service, including:
35	(i) One person representing each investor-owned utility;
36	(ii) Two persons representing municipal utilities;
37	(iii) Two persons representing public utility districts;

3 (b) Other persons with expertise in wildland fire risk reduction 4 and prevention; and

5 <u>(c) No more than two other persons designated by the</u> 6 commissioner.

(5) <u>In addition to the advisory committee membership established</u>
 <u>in subsection (4) of this section, the commissioner shall designate</u>
 <u>two additional advisory committee members representing historically</u>
 <u>marginalized or underrepresented communities.</u>

11 (6) The commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall convene 12 the initial meeting of the ((task force)) advisory committee.

13 (((6))) <u>(7) The members of the advisory committee, or individuals</u> 14 <u>acting on their behalf, are immune from civil liability for official</u> 15 <u>acts performed in the course of their duties specifically related to</u> 16 <u>the advisory committee.</u>

17 <u>(8)</u> Participation on the ((task force)) advisory committee 18 created in subsection (1) of this section is strictly voluntary and 19 without compensation.

20 <u>(9) Any requirements in this section are subject to the</u> 21 <u>availability of amounts appropriated for the specific purposes</u> 22 described."

23 Correct the title.

EFFECT: Makes the following changes to the underlying bill:

1. Requires the Commissioner of Public Lands (Commissioner) to designate two members of the Utility Wildland Fire Prevention Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee) representing historically marginalized or underrepresented communities.

2. Reduces the number of other additional Advisory Committee members who may be designated by the Commissioner from four to two.
