AN ACT Relating to modifying miscellaneous provisions impacting department of fish and wildlife licensing requirements; amending RCW 77.08.010, 77.08.075, 77.32.090, 77.32.155, 77.32.470, 77.32.480, 77.32.520, and 79A.80.040; and adding a new section to chapter 77.32 RCW.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 Sec. 1. RCW 77.08.010 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 8 s 2 are each 8 amended to read as follows:

9 The definitions in this section apply throughout this title or 10 rules adopted under this title unless the context clearly requires 11 otherwise.

12 (1) "Angling gear" means a line attached to a rod and reel 13 capable of being held in hand while landing the fish or a handheld 14 line operated without rod or reel.

15 (2) "Bag limit" means the maximum number of game animals, game 16 birds, or game fish which may be taken, caught, killed, or possessed 17 by a person, as specified by rule of the commission for a particular 18 period of time, or as to size, sex, or species.

(3) "Building" means a private domicile, garage, barn, or publicor commercial building.

1 (4) "Closed area" means a place where the hunting of some or all species of wild animals or wild birds is prohibited. 2

3 (5) "Closed season" means all times, manners of taking, and places or waters other than those established by rule of the 4 commission as an open season. "Closed season" also means all hunting, 5 6 fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds, game 7 fish, food fish, or shellfish that do not conform to the special restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the 8 commission as an open season or that have not otherwise been deemed 9 legal to hunt, fish, take, harvest, or possess by rule of the 10 11 commission as an open season.

12 (6) "Closed waters" means all or part of a lake, river, stream, or other body of water, where fishing or harvesting is prohibited. 13

(7) "Commercial" means related to or connected with buying, 14 15 selling, or bartering.

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(8) "Commission" means the state fish and wildlife commission.

17 (9) "Concurrent waters of the Columbia river" means those waters of the Columbia river that coincide with the Washington-Oregon state 18 19 boundary.

(10) "Contraband" means any property that is unlawful to produce 20 21 or possess.

(11) "Covered animal species" means any species of elephant, 22 23 rhinoceros, tiger, lion, leopard, cheetah, pangolin, marine turtle, shark, or ray either: (a) Listed in appendix I or appendix II of the 24 25 convention on international trade in endangered species of wild flora and fauna; or (b) listed as critically endangered, endangered, or 26 vulnerable on the international union for conservation of nature and 27 natural resources red list of threatened species. 28

29 (12) "Covered animal species part or product" means any item that contains, or is wholly or partially made from, any covered animal 30 31 species.

32 (13) "Deleterious exotic wildlife" means species of the animal kingdom not native to Washington and designated as dangerous to the 33 environment or wildlife of the state. 34

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(14) "Department" means the department of fish and wildlife.

(15) "Director" means the director of fish and wildlife. 36

(16) "Distribute" or "distribution" means either a change in 37 possession for consideration or a change in legal ownership. 38

39 "Endangered species" means wildlife designated by the (17)40 commission as seriously threatened with extinction.

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(18) "Ex officio fish and wildlife officer" means:

(a) A commissioned officer of a municipal, county, or state
agency having as its primary function the enforcement of criminal
laws in general, while the officer is acting in the respective
jurisdiction of that agency;

6 (b) An officer or special agent commissioned by one of the 7 following: The national marine fisheries service; the Washington state parks and recreation commission; the United States fish and 8 Washington state department of natural 9 wildlife service; the resources; the United States forest service; or the United States 10 11 parks service, if the agent or officer is in the respective 12 jurisdiction of the primary commissioning agency and is acting under a mutual law enforcement assistance agreement between the department 13 14 and the primary commissioning agency;

15 (c) A commissioned fish and wildlife peace officer from another 16 state who meets the training standards set by the Washington state 17 criminal justice training commission pursuant to RCW 10.93.090, 18 43.101.080, and 43.101.200, and who is acting under a mutual law 19 enforcement assistance agreement between the department and the 20 primary commissioning agency; or

(d) A Washington state tribal police officer who successfully completes the requirements set forth under RCW 43.101.157, is employed by a tribal nation that has complied with RCW 10.92.020(2) (a) and (b), and is acting under a mutual law enforcement assistance agreement between the department and the tribal government.

(19) "Fish" includes all species classified as game fish or food fish by statute or rule, as well as all finfish not currently classified as food fish or game fish if such species exist in state waters. The term "fish" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts of fish species.

31 (20) "To fish" and its derivatives means an effort to kill,32 injure, harass, harvest, or capture a fish or shellfish.

33 (21) "Fish and wildlife officer" means a person appointed and 34 commissioned by the director, with authority to enforce this title 35 and rules adopted pursuant to this title, and other statutes as 36 prescribed by the legislature. Fish and wildlife officer includes a 37 person commissioned before June 11, 1998, as a wildlife agent or a 38 fisheries patrol officer. 1 (22) "Fish broker" means a person who facilitates the sale or 2 purchase of raw or frozen fish or shellfish on a fee or commission 3 basis, without assuming title to the fish or shellfish.

4 (23) "Fish dealer" means a person who engages in any activity 5 that triggers the need to obtain a fish dealer license under RCW 6 77.65.280.

7 (24) "Fishery" means the taking of one or more particular species
8 of fish or shellfish with particular gear in a particular
9 geographical area.

10 (25) "Food, food waste, or other substance" includes human and 11 pet food or other waste or garbage that could attract large wild 12 carnivores.

13 (26) "Fresh water" means all waters not defined as salt water 14 including, but not limited to, rivers upstream of the river mouth, 15 lakes, ponds, and reservoirs.

16 (27) "Fur-bearing animals" means game animals that shall not be 17 trapped except as authorized by the commission.

18 (28) "Fur dealer" means a person who purchases, receives, or 19 resells raw furs for commercial purposes.

20 (29) "Game animals" means wild animals that shall not be hunted 21 except as authorized by the commission.

(30) "Game birds" means wild birds that shall not be huntedexcept as authorized by the commission.

(31) "Game farm" means property on which wildlife is held,
 confined, propagated, hatched, fed, or otherwise raised for
 commercial purposes, trade, or gift. The term "game farm" does not
 include publicly owned facilities.

(32) "Game reserve" means a closed area where hunting for allwild animals and wild birds is prohibited.

30 (33) "To hunt" and its derivatives means an effort to kill, 31 injure, harass, harvest, or capture a wild animal or wild bird.

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(34) "Illegal items" means those items unlawful to be possessed.

33 (35)(a) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means 34 to purposefully or knowingly provide, leave, or place in, on, or 35 about any land or building any food, food waste, or other substance 36 that attracts or could attract large wild carnivores to that land or 37 building.

38 (b) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not 39 include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed 40 garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority
 to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

(36) "Large wild carnivore" includes wild bear, cougar, and wolf.

4 (37) "License year" means the period of time for which a 5 recreational license is valid. The license year begins April 1st, and 6 ends March 31st.

7 (38) "Limited-entry license" means a license subject to a license
8 limitation program established in chapter 77.70 RCW.

9 (39) "Limited fish seller" means a licensed commercial fisher who 10 sells his or her fish or shellfish to anyone other than a wholesale 11 fish buyer thereby triggering the need to obtain a limited fish 12 seller endorsement under RCW 77.65.510.

13 (40) "Money" means all currency, script, personal checks, money 14 orders, or other negotiable instruments.

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(41) "Natural person" means a human being.

(42) (a) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means to provide, leave, or place in, on, or about any land or building any food, food waste, or other substance that attracts or could attract large wild carnivores to that land or building, without the awareness that a reasonable person in the same situation would have with regard to the likelihood that the food, food waste, or other substance could attract large wild carnivores to the land or building.

(b) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

28 (43) "Nonresident" means a person who has not fulfilled the 29 qualifications of a resident.

30 (44) "Offshore waters" means marine waters of the Pacific Ocean 31 outside the territorial boundaries of the state, including the marine 32 waters of other states and countries.

(45) "Open season" means those times, manners of taking, and 33 places or waters established by rule of the commission for the lawful 34 hunting, fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds, 35 game fish, food fish, or shellfish that conform to the special 36 restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the 37 commission or that have otherwise been deemed legal to hunt, fish, 38 take, or possess by rule of the commission. "Open season" includes 39 the first and last days of the established time. 40

(46) "Owner" means the person in whom is vested the ownership
 dominion, or title of the property.

3 (47) "Person" means and includes an individual; a corporation; a 4 public or private entity or organization; a local, state, or federal 5 agency; all business organizations, including corporations and 6 partnerships; or a group of two or more individuals acting with a 7 common purpose whether acting in an individual, representative, or 8 official capacity.

9 (48) "Personal property" or "property" includes both corporeal 10 and incorporeal personal property and includes, among other property, 11 contraband and money.

(49) "Personal use" means for the private use of the individualtaking the fish or shellfish and not for sale or barter.

14 (50) "Predatory birds" means wild birds that may be hunted 15 throughout the year as authorized by the commission.

16 (51) "To process" and its derivatives mean preparing or 17 preserving fish, wildlife, or shellfish.

18 (52) "Protected wildlife" means wildlife designated by the 19 commission that shall not be hunted or fished.

(53) "Raffle" means an activity in which tickets bearing an individual number are sold for not more than ((twenty-five dollars)) <u>\$25</u> each and in which a permit or permits are awarded to hunt or for access to hunt big game animals or wild turkeys on the basis of a drawing from the tickets by the person or persons conducting the raffle.

26 (54) "Resident" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 77.08.075.

27 (55) "Salt water" means those marine waters seaward of river 28 mouths.

(56) "Seaweed" means marine aquatic plant species that are dependent upon the marine aquatic or tidal environment, and exist in either an attached or free floating form, and includes but is not limited to marine aquatic plants in the classes Chlorophyta, Phaeophyta, and Rhodophyta.

34 (57) "Senior" means a person ((seventy)) <u>70</u> years old or older.

35 (58) "Shark fin" means a raw, dried, or otherwise processed 36 detached fin or tail of a shark.

37 (59)(a) "Shark fin derivative product" means any product intended 38 for use by humans or animals that is derived in whole or in part from 39 shark fins or shark fin cartilage.

1 (b) "Shark fin derivative product" does not include a drug 2 approved by the United States food and drug administration and 3 available by prescription only or medical device or vaccine approved 4 by the United States food and drug administration.

5 (60) "Shellfish" means those species of marine and freshwater 6 invertebrates that have been classified and that shall not be taken 7 or possessed except as authorized by rule of the commission. The term 8 "shellfish" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts 9 of shellfish species.

10 (61) "State waters" means all marine waters and fresh waters 11 within ordinary high water lines and within the territorial 12 boundaries of the state.

13 (62) "To take" and its derivatives means to kill, injure, 14 harvest, or capture a fish, shellfish, wild animal, bird, or seaweed.

15 (63) "Taxidermist" means a person who, for commercial purposes, 16 creates lifelike representations of fish and wildlife using fish and 17 wildlife parts and various supporting structures.

18 (64) "Trafficking" means offering, attempting to engage, or 19 engaging in sale, barter, or purchase of fish, shellfish, wildlife, 20 or deleterious exotic wildlife.

21 (65) "To trap" and its derivatives means a method of hunting 22 using devices to capture wild animals or wild birds.

(66) "Unclaimed" means that no owner of the property has been identified or has requested, in writing, the release of the property to themselves nor has the owner of the property designated an individual to receive the property or paid the required postage to effect delivery of the property.

(67) "Unclassified wildlife" means wildlife existing in
 Washington in a wild state that have not been classified as big game,
 game animals, game birds, predatory birds, protected wildlife,
 endangered wildlife, or deleterious exotic wildlife.

32 (68) "To waste" or "to be wasted" means to allow any edible portion of any game bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big 33 game animal other than cougar to be rendered unfit for human 34 consumption, or to fail to retrieve edible portions of such a game 35 36 bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big game animal other than cougar from the field. For purposes of this chapter, edible portions 37 of game birds must include, at a minimum, the breast meat of those 38 birds. Entrails, including the heart and liver, of any wildlife 39 species are not considered edible. 40

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1 (69) "Wholesale fish buyer" means a person who engages in any 2 fish buying or selling activity that triggers the need to obtain a 3 wholesale fish buyer endorsement under RCW 77.65.340.

4 (70) "Wild animals" means those species of the class Mammalia 5 whose members exist in Washington in a wild state. The term "wild 6 animal" does not include feral domestic mammals or old world rats and 7 mice of the family Muridae of the order Rodentia.

8 (71) "Wild birds" means those species of the class Aves whose 9 members exist in Washington in a wild state.

(72) "Wildlife" means all species of the animal kingdom whose 10 members exist in Washington in a wild state. This includes but is not 11 12 limited to mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, and invertebrates. The term "wildlife" does not include feral domestic 13 14 mammals, old world rats and mice of the family Muridae of the order 15 Rodentia, or those fish, shellfish, and marine invertebrates 16 classified as food fish or shellfish by the director. The term 17 "wildlife" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts of wildlife members. 18

19 (73) "Wildlife meat cutter" means a person who packs, cuts, 20 processes, or stores wildlife for consumption for another for 21 commercial purposes.

(74) "Youth" means a person ((fifteen years old for fishing and))
under ((sixteen)) 16 years old for fishing and hunting.

24 Sec. 2. RCW 77.08.075 and 2014 c 48 s 2 are each amended to read 25 as follows:

26 (1) For the purposes of this title or rules adopted under this 27 title, "resident" means((\div

(1) A)) <u>a</u> natural person who has maintained a permanent place of abode within the state for at least ((ninety)) <u>90</u> days immediately preceding an application for a license, has established by formal evidence an intent to continue residing within the state, is not licensed to hunt or fish as a resident in another state or country, and is not receiving resident benefits of another state or country.

34 (((a))) <u>(2)</u> For purposes of this section, "permanent place of 35 abode" means a residence in this state that a person maintains for 36 personal use.

37 (((b))) <u>(a)</u> A natural person can demonstrate that the person has 38 maintained a permanent place of abode in Washington by showing that 39 the person: (i) Uses a Washington state address for federal income tax or
 state tax purposes;

3 (ii) Designates this state as the person's residence for 4 obtaining eligibility to hold a public office or for judicial 5 actions;

6 (iii) Is a registered voter in the state of Washington; or

7 (iv) Is a custodial parent with a child attending 8 prekindergarten, kindergarten, elementary school, middle school, or 9 high school in this state.

10 (((c))) <u>(b)</u> A natural person can demonstrate the intent to 11 continue residing within the state by showing that he or she:

(i) Has a valid Washington state driver's license; or

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13 (ii) Has a valid Washington state identification card, if the 14 person is not eligible for a Washington state driver's license; and

15 (iii) Has registered the person's vehicle or vehicles in 16 Washington state((;

17 (2) The spouse of a member of the United States armed forces if 18 the member qualifies as a resident under subsection (1), (3), or (4) 19 of this section, or a natural person age eighteen or younger who does 20 not qualify as a resident under subsection (1) of this section, but 21 who has a parent or legal guardian who qualifies as a resident under 22 subsection (1), (3), or (4) of this section;

23 (3) A member of the United States armed forces temporarily 24 stationed in Washington state on predeployment orders. A copy of the 25 person's military orders is required to meet this condition;

26 (4) An active duty, nonretired member of the United States armed 27 forces who is permanently stationed in Washington or who designates 28 Washington on his or her military "state of legal residence 29 certificate" or enlistment or reenlistment documents. A copy of the 30 person's "state of legal residence certificate" or enlistment or 31 reenlistment documents is required to meet the conditions of this 32 subsection)).

33 Sec. 3. RCW 77.32.090 and 2022 c 20 s 1 are each amended to read 34 as follows:

The commission may adopt rules pertaining to the form, period of validity, use, possession, and display of licenses, permits, tags, stamps, and raffle tickets required by this chapter. This authority extends to the issuance of electronic licenses, permits, tags, stamps, and catch record cards, as well as their use, possession, display, and presentation to agency staff. Whenever a person presents a portable electronic device pursuant to rules adopted under this section, that person assumes all liability for any damage to the portable electronic device.

5 Sec. 4. RCW 77.32.155 and 2017 c 255 s 1 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) (a) ((When purchasing any hunting license, persons under the age of eighteen)) All persons purchasing any hunting license for the 8 first time, if born on or after January 1, 1972, shall present 9 certification of completion of a course of instruction ((of at least 10 ten hours)) in the safe handling of firearms, safety, conservation, 11 and sporting/hunting behavior. ((All persons purchasing any hunting 12 license for the first time, if born after January 1, 1972, shall 13 present such certification.)) Any person who completes a course of 14 instruction as required by this section that is offered in person 15 16 must certify that they have completed at least 10 hours of 17 instruction.

(b) (i) The director may establish a program for training persons in the safe handling of firearms, conservation, and sporting/hunting behavior and shall prescribe the type of instruction and the qualifications of the instructors. The director shall, as part of establishing the training program, exempt the following individuals from the firearms skills portion of any instruction course completed over the internet:

25 (A) ((Members)) Current or retired members of the United States
26 military;

27 (B) Current or retired general authority Washington peace 28 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020;

(C) Current or retired limited authority Washington peace
 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly
 authorized by his or her employer to carry a concealed pistol;

32 (D) Current or retired specially commissioned Washington peace 33 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly 34 authorized by his or her commissioning agency to carry a concealed 35 pistol; ((and))

36 (E) Current or retired Washington peace officers as defined in 37 RCW 43.101.010 who have met the requirements of RCW 43.101.095 or 38 43.101.157 and whose certification is in good standing or has not 39 been revoked<u>; and</u> (F) Current or retired federal peace officers as defined in RCW
 10.93.020.

3 (ii) The director may cooperate with the national rifle 4 association, organized sports/outdoor enthusiasts' groups, or other 5 public or private organizations when establishing the training 6 program.

7 (c) Upon the successful completion of a course established under 8 this section, the trainee shall receive a hunter education 9 certificate signed by an authorized instructor. The certificate is 10 evidence of compliance with this section.

(d) The director may accept certificates from other states that persons have successfully completed firearm safety, hunter education, or similar courses as evidence of compliance with this section.

(2) (a) The director may authorize a once in a lifetime, one license year deferral of hunter education training for individuals who are accompanied, while hunting, by a nondeferred Washingtonlicensed hunter who ((has held a Washington hunting license for the prior three years and is over eighteen)) is at least 18 years of age. The commission shall adopt rules for the administration of this subsection to avoid potential fraud and abuse.

(b) The director is authorized to collect an application fee, not to exceed ((twenty dollars)) <u>\$20</u>, for obtaining the once in a lifetime, one license year deferral of hunter education training from the department. This fee must be deposited into the fish and wildlife enforcement reward account and must be used exclusively to administer the deferral program created in this subsection.

(c) For the purposes of this subsection, "accompanied" means to go along with another person while staying within a range of the other person that permits continual unaided visual and auditory communication.

31 (3) To encourage the participation of an adequate number of 32 instructors for the training program, the commission shall develop 33 nonmonetary incentives available to individuals who commit to serving 34 as an instructor. The incentives may include additional hunting 35 opportunities for instructors.

36 <u>(4) The commission is authorized to adopt rules to offer a one-</u> 37 <u>time discount of up to \$20 on a hunting license purchase to first-</u> 38 <u>time resident hunters who have completed the Washington hunter</u> 39 <u>education training program.</u> 1 Sec. 5. RCW 77.32.470 and 2020 c 148 s 20 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 (1) A personal use saltwater, freshwater, combination, or
4 temporary((, or family fishing weekend)) license is required for all
5 persons ((fifteen)) <u>16</u> years of age or older to fish for or possess
6 fish taken for personal use from state waters or offshore waters.

7 (2) The fees for annual personal use saltwater, freshwater, or8 combination licenses are as follows:

9 (a) A combination license allows the holder to fish for or 10 possess fish, shellfish, and seaweed from state waters or offshore 11 waters. The fee for this license is ((forty-five dollars)) <u>\$45</u> for 12 residents((, one hundred eight dollars)) and \$108 for nonresidents((, 13 and five dollars for youth)). There is an additional ((fifty-cent)) 14 <u>50 cent</u> surcharge for this license, to be deposited in the rockfish 15 research account created in RCW 77.12.702.

(b) A saltwater license allows the holder to fish for or possess fish taken from saltwater areas. The fee for this license is ((twenty-five dollars)) <u>\$25</u> for residents, ((fifty-two dollars)) <u>\$52</u> for nonresidents, and five dollars for resident seniors. There is an additional ((fifty-cent)) <u>50 cent</u> surcharge for this license, to be deposited in the rockfish research account created in RCW 77.12.702.

(c) A freshwater license allows the holder to fish for, take, or possess food fish or game fish species in all freshwater areas. The fee for this license is ((twenty-five dollars)) <u>\$25</u> for residents, ((seventy-five dollars)) <u>\$75</u> for nonresidents, and five dollars for resident seniors.

(3) (a) A temporary combination fishing license is valid for one to three consecutive days and allows the holder to fish for or possess fish, shellfish, and seaweed taken from state waters or offshore waters. The fee for this temporary fishing license is:

31 (i) One day - ((Eight dollars)) <u>\$8</u> for residents and ((sixteen 32 dollars)) <u>\$16</u> for nonresidents;

33 (ii) Two days - ((Twelve dollars)) <u>\$12</u> for residents and 34 ((twenty-four dollars)) <u>\$24</u> for nonresidents; and

35 (iii) Three days - ((Fifteen dollars)) <u>\$15</u> for residents and 36 ((thirty dollars)) <u>\$30</u> for nonresidents.

(b) The fee for a charter stamp is eight dollars for a one-day temporary combination fishing license for residents and nonresidents for use on a charter boat as defined in RCW 77.65.150. 1 (c) ((Except for active duty military personnel serving in any 2 branch of the United States armed forces, the temporary combination 3 fishing license is not valid on game fish species for an eight-4 consecutive-day period beginning on the opening day of the lowland 5 lake fishing season as defined by rule of the commission.

6 (d))) The temporary combination fishing license fee for active 7 duty military personnel serving in any branch of the United States 8 armed forces is the resident rate ((as set forth in (a) of this 9 subsection)). Active duty military personnel must provide a valid 10 military identification card at the time of purchase of the temporary 11 license to qualify for the resident rate.

12 (((c))) <u>(d)</u> There is an additional ((fifty-cent)) <u>50 cent</u> 13 surcharge on the temporary combination fishing license and the 14 associated charter stamp, to be deposited in the rockfish research 15 account created in RCW 77.12.702.

(4) ((A family fishing weekend license allows for a maximum of six anglers: One resident and five youth; two residents and four youth; or one resident, one nonresident, and four youth. This license allows the holders to fish for or possess fish taken from state waters or offshore waters. The fee for this license is twenty dollars. This license is only valid during periods as specified by rule of the department.

23 (5) The commission may adopt rules to create and sell combination 24 licenses for all hunting and fishing activities at or below a fee 25 equal to the total cost of the individual license contained within 26 any combination.

(6))) The commission may adopt rules to allow the use of two 27 28 fishing poles ((per fishing license holder for use)) on selected state waters. If authorized by the commission, license holders 16 29 years of age or older must purchase a two-pole stamp to use a second 30 31 pole. The proceeds from the sale of the two-pole stamp must be 32 deposited into the limited fish and wildlife account created in RCW 33 77.12.170(1) and used for the operation and maintenance of stateowned fish hatcheries. The fee for a two-pole stamp is ((thirteen 34 dollars)) \$13 for residents and nonresidents, and five dollars for 35 36 seniors.

(2) A razor clam license allows a person to harvest only razor
 clams for personal use from state waters, including national park
