AN ACT Relating to creating a civil protection order to prevent impaired driving; amending RCW 7.105.010, 7.105.100, 7.105.115, 7.105.225, 7.105.300, 7.105.405, 7.105.550, 46.20.720, 46.20.720, 36.28A.300, 36.28A.330, 36.28A.390, and 7.105.105; reenacting and amending RCW 7.105.310; adding new sections to chapter 7.105 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 43.101 RCW; prescribing penalties; providing an effective date; and providing an expiration date.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

9 Sec. 1. RCW 7.105.010 and 2024 c 298 s 9 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

11 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter 12 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(1) "Abandonment" means action or inaction by a person or entity with a duty of care for a vulnerable adult that leaves the vulnerable adult without the means or ability to obtain necessary food, clothing, shelter, or health care.

17 (2) "Abuse," for the purposes of a vulnerable adult protection 18 order, means intentional, willful, or reckless action or inaction 19 that inflicts injury, unreasonable confinement, intimidation, or 20 punishment on a vulnerable adult. In instances of abuse of a 21 vulnerable adult who is unable to express or demonstrate physical harm, pain, or mental anguish, the abuse is presumed to cause physical harm, pain, or mental anguish. "Abuse" includes sexual abuse, mental abuse, physical abuse, personal exploitation, and improper use of restraint against a vulnerable adult, which have the following meanings:

6 (a) "Improper use of restraint" means the inappropriate use of 7 chemical, physical, or mechanical restraints for convenience or 8 discipline, or in a manner that: (i) Is inconsistent with federal or 9 state licensing or certification requirements for facilities, 10 hospitals, or programs authorized under chapter 71A.12 RCW; (ii) is 11 not medically authorized; or (iii) otherwise constitutes abuse under 12 this section.

(b) "Mental abuse" means an intentional, willful, or reckless verbal or nonverbal action that threatens, humiliates, harasses, coerces, intimidates, isolates, unreasonably confines, or punishes a vulnerable adult. "Mental abuse" may include ridiculing, yelling, swearing, or withholding or tampering with prescribed medications or their dosage.

(c) "Personal exploitation" means an act of forcing, compelling, or exerting undue influence over a vulnerable adult causing the vulnerable adult to act in a way that is inconsistent with relevant past behavior, or causing the vulnerable adult to perform services for the benefit of another.

(d) "Physical abuse" means the intentional, willful, or reckless
action of inflicting bodily injury or physical mistreatment.
"Physical abuse" includes, but is not limited to, striking with or
without an object, slapping, pinching, strangulation, suffocation,
kicking, shoving, or prodding.

(e) "Sexual abuse" means any form of nonconsensual sexual conduct 29 including, but not limited to, unwanted or inappropriate touching, 30 31 rape, molestation, indecent liberties, sexual coercion, sexually 32 explicit photographing or recording, voyeurism, indecent exposure, and sexual harassment. "Sexual abuse" also includes any sexual 33 conduct between a staff person, who is not also a resident or client, 34 of a facility or a staff person of a program authorized under chapter 35 71A.12 RCW, and a vulnerable adult living in that facility or 36 receiving service from a program authorized under chapter 71A.12 RCW, 37 whether or not the sexual conduct is consensual. 38

39 (3) "Chemical restraint" means the administration of any drug to 40 manage a vulnerable adult's behavior in a way that reduces the safety

1 risk to the vulnerable adult or others, has the temporary effect of 2 restricting the vulnerable adult's freedom of movement, and is not 3 standard treatment for the vulnerable adult's medical or psychiatric 4 condition.

(4) (a) "Coercive control" means a pattern of behavior that is 5 6 used to cause another to suffer physical, emotional, or psychological 7 harm, and in purpose or effect unreasonably interferes with a person's free will and personal liberty. In determining whether the 8 interference is unreasonable, the court shall consider the context 9 and impact of the pattern of behavior from the perspective of a 10 11 similarly situated person. Examples of coercive control include, but are not limited to, engaging in any of the following: 12

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(i) Intimidation or controlling or compelling conduct by:

14 (A) Damaging, destroying, or threatening to damage or destroy, or 15 forcing the other party to relinquish, goods, property, or items of 16 special value;

(B) Using technology to threaten, humiliate, harass, stalk, intimidate, exert undue influence over, or abuse the other party, including by engaging in cyberstalking, monitoring, surveillance, impersonation, manipulation of electronic media, or distribution of or threats to distribute actual or fabricated intimate images;

(C) Carrying, exhibiting, displaying, drawing, or threatening to use, any firearm or any other weapon apparently capable of producing bodily harm, in a manner, under circumstances, and at a time and place that either manifests an intent to intimidate the other party or that warrants alarm by the other party for their safety or the safety of other persons;

(D) Driving recklessly with the other party or minor children inthe vehicle;

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(E) Communicating, directly or indirectly, the intent to:

31 (I) Harm the other party's children, family members, friends, or 32 pets, including by use of physical forms of violence;

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(II) Harm the other party's career;

34 (III) Attempt suicide or other acts of self-harm; or

35 (IV) Contact local or federal agencies based on actual or 36 suspected immigration status;

37 (F) Exerting control over the other party's identity documents;

(G) Making, or threatening to make, private information public,including the other party's sexual orientation or gender identity,

1 medical or behavioral health information, or other confidential 2 information that jeopardizes safety; or

(H) Engaging in sexual or reproductive coercion;

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4 (ii) Causing dependence, confinement, or isolation of the other
5 party from friends, relatives, or other sources of support, including
6 schooling and employment, or subjecting the other party to physical
7 confinement or restraint;

8 (iii) Depriving the other party of basic necessities or 9 committing other forms of financial exploitation;

10 (iv) Controlling, exerting undue influence over, interfering 11 with, regulating, or monitoring the other party's movements, 12 communications, daily behavior, finances, economic resources, or 13 employment, including but not limited to interference with or 14 attempting to limit access to services for children of the other 15 party, such as health care, medication, child care, or school-based 16 extracurricular activities;

(v) Engaging in vexatious litigation or abusive litigation as defined in RCW 26.51.020 against the other party to harass, coerce, or control the other party, to diminish or exhaust the other party's financial resources, or to compromise the other party's employment or housing; or

(vi) Engaging in psychological aggression, including inflictingfear, humiliating, degrading, or punishing the other party.

(b) "Coercive control" does not include protective actions taken by a party in good faith for the legitimate and lawful purpose of protecting themselves or children from the risk of harm posed by the other party.

(5) "Commercial sexual exploitation" means commercial sexualabuse of a minor and sex trafficking.

(6) "Consent" in the context of sexual acts means that at the 30 31 time of sexual contact, there are actual words or conduct indicating 32 freely given agreement to that sexual contact. Consent must be ongoing and may be revoked at any time. Conduct short of voluntary 33 agreement does not constitute consent as a matter of law. Consent 34 cannot be freely given when a person does not have capacity due to 35 disability, intoxication, or age. Consent cannot be freely given when 36 the other party has authority or control over the care or custody of 37 a person incarcerated or detained. 38

39 (7) (a) "Course of conduct" means a pattern of conduct composed of40 a series of acts over a period of time, however short, evidencing a

1 continuity of purpose. "Course of conduct" includes any form of 2 communication, contact, or conduct, including the sending of an 3 electronic communication, but does not include constitutionally 4 protected free speech. Constitutionally protected activity is not 5 included within the meaning of "course of conduct."

6 (b) In determining whether the course of conduct serves any 7 legitimate or lawful purpose, a court should consider whether:

8 (i) Any current contact between the parties was initiated by the 9 respondent only or was initiated by both parties;

10 (ii) The respondent has been given clear notice that all further 11 contact with the petitioner is unwanted;

12 (iii) The respondent's course of conduct appears designed to 13 alarm, annoy, or harass the petitioner;

14 (iv) The respondent is acting pursuant to any statutory authority 15 including, but not limited to, acts which are reasonably necessary 16 to:

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(A) Protect property or liberty interests;

18 (B) Enforce the law; or

19 (C) Meet specific statutory duties or requirements;

20 (v) The respondent's course of conduct has the purpose or effect 21 of unreasonably interfering with the petitioner's privacy or the 22 purpose or effect of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive 23 living environment for the petitioner; or

(vi) Contact by the respondent with the petitioner or the petitioner's family has been limited in any manner by any previous court order.

(8) "Court clerk" means court administrators in courts of limitedjurisdiction and elected court clerks.

(9) "Dating relationship" means a social relationship of a romantic nature. Factors that the court may consider in making this determination include: (a) The length of time the relationship has existed; (b) the nature of the relationship; and (c) the frequency of interaction between the parties.

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(10) "Domestic violence" means:

(a) Physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or the infliction of
 fear of physical harm, bodily injury, or assault; nonconsensual
 sexual conduct or nonconsensual sexual penetration; coercive control;
 unlawful harassment; or stalking of one intimate partner by another
 intimate partner; or

(b) Physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or the infliction of fear of physical harm, bodily injury, or assault; nonconsensual sexual conduct or nonconsensual sexual penetration; coercive control; unlawful harassment; or stalking of one family or household member by another family or household member.

6 (11) "Electronic monitoring" has the same meaning as in RCW 7 9.94A.030.

8 (12) "Essential personal effects" means those items necessary for 9 a person's immediate health, welfare, and livelihood. "Essential 10 personal effects" includes, but is not limited to, clothing, cribs, 11 bedding, medications, personal hygiene items, cellular phones and 12 other electronic devices, and documents, including immigration, 13 health care, financial, travel, and identity documents.

14 (13) "Facility" means a residence licensed or required to be 15 licensed under chapter 18.20 RCW, assisted living facilities; chapter 16 18.51 RCW, nursing homes; chapter 70.128 RCW, adult family homes; 17 chapter 72.36 RCW, soldiers' homes; chapter 71A.20 RCW, residential 18 habilitation centers; or any other facility licensed or certified by 19 the department of social and health services.

(14) "Family or household members" means: (a) Persons related by blood, marriage, domestic partnership, or adoption; (b) persons who currently or formerly resided together; (c) persons who have a biological or legal parent-child relationship, including stepparents and stepchildren and grandparents and grandchildren, or a parent's intimate partner and children; and (d) a person who is acting or has acted as a legal guardian.

(15) "Financial exploitation" means the illegal or improper use of, control over, or withholding of, the property, income, resources, or trust funds of the vulnerable adult by any person or entity for any person's or entity's profit or advantage other than for the vulnerable adult's profit or advantage. "Financial exploitation" includes, but is not limited to:

(a) The use of deception, intimidation, or undue influence by a person or entity in a position of trust and confidence with a vulnerable adult to obtain or use the property, income, resources, government benefits, health insurance benefits, or trust funds of the vulnerable adult for the benefit of a person or entity other than the vulnerable adult;

(b) The breach of a fiduciary duty, including, but not limitedto, the misuse of a power of attorney, trust, or a guardianship or

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1 conservatorship appointment, that results in the unauthorized 2 appropriation, sale, or transfer of the property, income, resources, 3 or trust funds of the vulnerable adult for the benefit of a person or 4 entity other than the vulnerable adult; or

5 (c) Obtaining or using a vulnerable adult's property, income, 6 resources, or trust funds without lawful authority, by a person or 7 entity who knows or clearly should know that the vulnerable adult 8 lacks the capacity to consent to the release or use of the vulnerable 9 adult's property, income, resources, or trust funds.

10 (16) "Firearm" means a weapon or device from which a projectile 11 or projectiles may be fired by an explosive such as gunpowder. 12 "Firearm" does not include a flare gun or other pyrotechnic visual 13 distress signaling device, or a powder-actuated tool or other device 14 designed solely to be used for construction purposes. "Firearm" also 15 includes parts that can be assembled to make a firearm.

16 (17) "Full hearing" means a hearing where the court determines 17 whether to issue a full protection order.

(18) "Full protection order" means a protection order that is issued by the court after notice to the respondent and where the parties had the opportunity for a full hearing by the court. "Full protection order" includes a protection order entered by the court by agreement of the parties to resolve the petition for a protection order without a full hearing.

(19) "Hospital" means a facility licensed under chapter 70.41 or 71.12 RCW or a state hospital defined in chapter 72.23 RCW and any employee, agent, officer, director, or independent contractor thereof.

28 (20) <u>"Ignition interlock device" has the same meaning as in RCW</u>
29 <u>46.04.215.</u>

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(21) "Interested person" means:

31 (a) For protection orders other than impaired driving protection 32 orders, a person who demonstrates to the court's satisfaction that 33 the person is interested in the welfare of a vulnerable adult, that 34 the person has a good faith belief that the court's intervention is 35 necessary, and that the vulnerable adult is unable, due to 36 incapacity, undue influence, or duress at the time the petition is 37 filed, to protect his or her own interests; or

38 (b) For impaired driving protection orders, a person who 39 demonstrates to the court's satisfaction that the person can provide 40 credible testimony regarding the respondent's history of driving 1 under the influence of intoxicating liquor and that the person has a

2 good faith belief that the court's intervention is necessary.

3 ((<del>(21)</del>)) <u>(22)</u> "Intimate partner" means: (a) Spouses or domestic 4 partners; (b) former spouses or former domestic partners; (c) persons 5 who have a child in common regardless of whether they have been 6 married or have lived together at any time, unless the child is 7 conceived through sexual assault; or (d) persons who have or have had 8 a dating relationship where both persons are at least 13 years of age 9 or older.

10 ((<del>(22)</del>)) <u>(23)</u>(a) "Isolate" or "isolation" means to restrict a 11 person's ability to communicate, visit, interact, or otherwise 12 associate with persons of his or her choosing. Isolation may be 13 evidenced by acts including, but not limited to:

(i) Acts that prevent a person from sending, making, or receiving his or her personal mail, electronic communications, or telephone calls; or

(ii) Acts that prevent or obstruct a person from meeting with others, such as telling a prospective visitor or caller that the person is not present or does not wish contact, where the statement is contrary to the express wishes of the person.

(b) The term "isolate" or "isolation" may not be construed in a manner that prevents a guardian or limited guardian from performing his or her fiduciary obligations under chapter 11.92 RCW or prevents a hospital or facility from providing treatment consistent with the standard of care for delivery of health services.

26 ((<del>(23)</del>)) <u>(24)</u> "Judicial day" means days of the week other than 27 Saturdays, Sundays, or legal holidays.

((<del>(24)</del>)) <u>(25)</u> "Mechanical restraint" means any device attached or 28 29 adjacent to a vulnerable adult's body that the vulnerable adult cannot easily remove that restricts freedom of movement or normal 30 31 access to the vulnerable adult's body. "Mechanical restraint" does not include the use of devices, materials, or equipment that are (a) 32 medically authorized, as required, and (b) used in a manner that is 33 consistent with federal or state licensing or certification 34 requirements for facilities, hospitals, or programs authorized under 35 36 chapter 71A.12 RCW.

37 ((((25)))) (26) "Minor" means a person who is under 18 years of 38 age.

39 ((((26)))) (27) "Neglect" means: (a) A pattern of conduct or 40 inaction by a person or entity with a duty of care that fails to

provide the goods and services that maintain the physical or mental 1 health of a vulnerable adult, or that fails to avoid or prevent 2 physical or mental harm or pain to a vulnerable adult; or (b) an act 3 or omission by a person or entity with a duty of care that 4 demonstrates a serious disregard of consequences of such a magnitude 5 6 as to constitute a clear and present danger to the vulnerable adult's 7 health, welfare, or safety including, but not limited to, conduct prohibited under RCW 9A.42.100. 8

9 ((<del>(27)</del>)) <u>(28)</u> "Nonconsensual" means a lack of freely given 10 consent.

11 (((28))) (29) "Nonphysical contact" includes, but is not limited 12 to, written notes, mail, telephone calls, email, text messages, 13 contact through social media applications, contact through other 14 technologies, or contact through third parties.

((<del>(29)</del>))<u>(30)</u> "Petitioner" means any named petitioner or any other person identified in the petition on whose behalf the petition is brought.

18 (((30))) (31) "Physical restraint" means the application of 19 physical force without the use of any device, for the purpose of 20 restraining the free movement of a vulnerable adult's body. "Physical 21 restraint" does not include (a) briefly holding, without undue force, 22 a vulnerable adult in order to calm or comfort him or her, or (b) 23 holding a vulnerable adult's hand to safely escort him or her from 24 one area to another.

(((31))) (32) "Possession" means having an item in one's custody or control. Possession may be either actual or constructive. Actual possession occurs when the item is in the actual physical custody of the person charged with possession. Constructive possession occurs when there is no actual physical possession, but there is dominion and control over the item.

31 (((32))) (33) "Respondent" means the person who is identified as 32 the respondent in a petition filed under this chapter.

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((<del>(33)</del>))<u>(34)</u> "Sexual conduct" means any of the following:

(a) Any intentional or knowing touching or fondling of the
 genitals, anus, or breasts, directly or indirectly, including through
 clothing;

37 (b) Any intentional or knowing display of the genitals, anus, or 38 breasts for the purposes of arousal or sexual gratification of the 39 respondent; 1 (c) Any intentional or knowing touching or fondling of the 2 genitals, anus, or breasts, directly or indirectly, including through 3 clothing, that the petitioner is forced to perform by another person 4 or the respondent;

5 (d) Any forced display of the petitioner's genitals, anus, or 6 breasts for the purposes of arousal or sexual gratification of the 7 respondent or others;

8 (e) Any intentional or knowing touching of the clothed or 9 unclothed body of a child under the age of 16, if done for the 10 purpose of sexual gratification or arousal of the respondent or 11 others; or

(f) Any coerced or forced touching or fondling by a child under the age of 16, directly or indirectly, including through clothing, of the genitals, anus, or breasts of the respondent or others.

(((34))) (35) "Sexual penetration" means any contact, however 15 16 slight, between the sex organ or anus of one person by an object, the 17 sex organ, mouth, or anus of another person, or any intrusion, however slight, of any part of the body of one person or of any 18 animal or object into the sex organ or anus of another person 19 20 including, but not limited to, cunnilingus, fellatio, or anal 21 penetration. Evidence of emission of semen is not required to prove 22 sexual penetration.

((<del>(35)</del>)) <u>(36)</u> "Stalking" means any of the following:

(a) Any act of stalking as defined under RCW 9A.46.110;

(b) Any act of cyber harassment as defined under RCW 9A.90.120;or

(c) Any course of conduct involving repeated or continuing contacts, attempts to contact, monitoring, tracking, surveillance, keeping under observation, disrupting activities in a harassing manner, or following of another person that:

(i) Would cause a reasonable person to feel intimidated, frightened, under duress, significantly disrupted, or threatened and that actually causes such a feeling;

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(ii) Serves no lawful purpose; and

(iii) The respondent knows, or reasonably should know, threatens, frightens, or intimidates the person, even if the respondent did not intend to intimidate, frighten, or threaten the person.

38 ((<del>(36)</del>)) <u>(37)</u> "Temporary protection order" means a protection 39 order that is issued before the court has decided whether to issue a 40 full protection order. "Temporary protection order" includes ex parte temporary protection orders, as well as temporary protection orders that are reissued by the court pending the completion of a full hearing to decide whether to issue a full protection order. An "ex parte temporary protection order" means a temporary protection order that is issued without prior notice to the respondent.

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((<del>(37)</del>)) <u>(38)</u> "Unlawful harassment" means:

7 (a) A knowing and willful course of conduct directed at a 8 specific person that seriously alarms, annoys, harasses, or is 9 detrimental to such person, and that serves no legitimate or lawful 10 purpose. The course of conduct must be such as would cause a 11 reasonable person to suffer substantial emotional distress, and must 12 actually cause substantial emotional distress to the petitioner; or

(b) A single act of violence or threat of violence directed at a 13 14 specific person that seriously alarms, annoys, harasses, or is detrimental to such person, and that serves no legitimate or lawful 15 16 purpose, which would cause a reasonable person to suffer substantial 17 emotional distress, and must actually cause substantial emotional 18 distress to the petitioner. A single threat of violence must include: 19 (i) A malicious and intentional threat as described in RCW 9A.36.080(1)(c); or (ii) the presence of a firearm or other weapon. 20

((<del>(38)</del>)) <u>(39)</u> "Vulnerable adult" includes a person:

(a) Sixty years of age or older who has the functional, mental,or physical inability to care for himself or herself; or

(b) Subject to a guardianship under RCW 11.130.265 or adult
 subject to conservatorship under RCW 11.130.360; or

26 (c) Who has a developmental disability as defined under RCW 27 71A.10.020; or

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(d) Admitted to any facility; or

(e) Receiving services from home health, hospice, or home care agencies licensed or required to be licensed under chapter 70.127 RCW; or

32 (f) Receiving services from a person under contract with the 33 department of social and health services to provide services in the 34 home under chapter 74.09 or 74.39A RCW; or

35 (g) Who self-directs his or her own care and receives services 36 from a personal aide under chapter 74.39 RCW.

37 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 7.105 38 RCW to read as follows:

1 The superior courts have jurisdiction over impaired driving protection order proceedings under this chapter. Additionally, 2 district courts have limited jurisdiction over the issuance and 3 enforcement of temporary impaired driving protection orders issued 4 under section 9 of this act. The district court shall set the full 5 6 hearing in superior court and transfer the case. If the notice and order are not served on the respondent in time for the full hearing, 7 the issuing court has concurrent jurisdiction with the superior court 8 to extend the temporary impaired driving protection order. The 9 10 superior court to which the case is being transferred shall determine 11 whether to grant any request for a continuance.

12 Sec. 3. RCW 7.105.100 and 2024 c 298 s 10 are each amended to 13 read as follows:

(1) There exists an action known as a petition for a protection order. The following types of petitions for a protection order may be filed:

(a) A petition for a domestic violence protection order, which 17 must allege the existence of domestic violence committed against the 18 petitioner or petitioners by an intimate partner or a family or 19 household member. The petitioner may petition for relief on behalf of 20 himself or herself and on behalf of family or household members who 21 22 are minors or vulnerable adults. A petition for a domestic violence protection order must specify whether the petitioner and the 23 24 respondent are intimate partners or family or household members. A petitioner who has been sexually assaulted or stalked by an intimate 25 partner or a family or household member should, but is not required 26 27 to, seek a domestic violence protection order, rather than a sexual 28 assault protection order or a stalking protection order.

(b) A petition for a sexual assault protection order, which must 29 30 allege the existence of nonconsensual sexual conduct, nonconsensual 31 sexual penetration, or commercial sexual exploitation that was committed against the petitioner by the respondent. A petitioner who 32 has been sexually assaulted by an intimate partner or a family or 33 household member should, but is not required to, seek a domestic 34 violence protection order, rather than a sexual assault protection 35 order. A single incident of nonconsensual sexual conduct or 36 nonconsensual sexual penetration is sufficient grounds for a petition 37 38 for a sexual assault protection order. The petitioner may petition for a sexual assault protection order on behalf of: 39

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(i) Himself or herself;

2 (ii) A minor child, where the petitioner is the parent, legal 3 guardian, or custodian;

4 (iii) A vulnerable adult, where the petitioner is an interested 5 person; or

6 (iv) Any other adult for whom the petitioner demonstrates to the 7 court's satisfaction that the petitioner is interested in the adult's 8 well-being, the court's intervention is necessary, and the adult 9 cannot file the petition because of age, disability, health, or 10 inaccessibility.

11 (c) A petition for a stalking protection order, which must allege 12 the existence of stalking committed against the petitioner or 13 petitioners by the respondent. A petitioner who has been stalked by 14 an intimate partner or a family or household member should, but is 15 not required to, seek a domestic violence protection order, rather 16 than a stalking protection order. The petitioner may petition for a 17 stalking protection order on behalf of:

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(i) Himself or herself;

19 (ii) A minor child, where the petitioner is the parent, legal 20 guardian, or custodian;

21 (iii) A vulnerable adult, where the petitioner is an interested 22 person; or

(iv) Any other adult for whom the petitioner demonstrates to the court's satisfaction that the petitioner is interested in the adult's well-being, the court's intervention is necessary, and the adult cannot file the petition because of age, disability, health, or inaccessibility.

(d) A petition for a vulnerable adult protection order, which 28 29 must allege that the petitioner, or person on whose behalf the petition is brought, is a vulnerable adult and that the petitioner, 30 31 or person on whose behalf the petition is brought, has been abandoned, abused, financially exploited, or neglected, or 32 is threatened with abandonment, abuse, financial exploitation, 33 or 34 neglect, by the respondent.

35 (e) A petition for an extreme risk protection order, which must 36 allege that the respondent poses a significant danger of causing 37 personal injury to self or others by having in the respondent's 38 custody or control, purchasing, possessing, accessing, receiving, or 39 attempting to purchase or receive, a firearm. The petition must also 40 identify information the petitioner is able to provide about the firearms, such as the number, types, and locations of any firearms the petitioner believes to be in the respondent's current ownership, possession, custody, access, or control. A petition for an extreme risk protection order may be filed by (i) an intimate partner or a family or household member of the respondent; or (ii) a law enforcement agency.

7 (f) A petition for an antiharassment protection order, which must allege the existence of unlawful harassment committed against the 8 petitioner or petitioners by the respondent. If a petitioner is 9 seeking relief based on domestic violence, nonconsensual sexual 10 11 conduct, nonconsensual sexual penetration, or stalking, the 12 petitioner may, but is not required to, seek a domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking protection order, rather than 13 an 14 antiharassment order. The petitioner may petition for an antiharassment protection order on behalf of: 15

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(i) Himself or herself;

17 (ii) A minor child, where the petitioner is the parent, legal 18 guardian, or custodian;

19 (iii) A vulnerable adult, where the petitioner is an interested 20 person; or

(iv) Any other adult for whom the petitioner demonstrates to the court's satisfaction that the petitioner is interested in the adult's well-being, the court's intervention is necessary, and the adult cannot file the petition because of age, disability, health, or inaccessibility.

26 (g) (i) A petition for an impaired driving protection order, which 27 must allege that the respondent poses a significant danger of causing 28 personal injury to self or others by driving or having physical 29 control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating 30 liquor.

31 (ii) The petition must include any information known to the 32 petitioner regarding the respondent's history of driving or having 33 physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of 34 intoxicating liquor. The petition must also identify information the 35 petitioner is able to provide about vehicles driven by the 36 respondent.

37 <u>(iii) A petition for an impaired driving protection order may be</u> 38 <u>filed by:</u>

39 <u>(A) An intimate partner or a family or household member of the</u> 40 respondent; 1

(B) A law enforcement agency;

2 (C) A prosecuting attorney as defined in RCW 36.27.005 or 3 35.23.111, or any attorney authorized to prosecute cases in court of 4 limited jurisdiction; or

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(D) An interested person, as defined in RCW 7.105.010(21)(b).

6 (2) With the exception of vulnerable adult protection orders, a 7 person under 18 years of age who is 15 years of age or older may seek 8 relief under this chapter as a petitioner and is not required to seek 9 relief through a petition filed on his or her behalf. He or she may 10 also petition on behalf of a family or household member who is a 11 minor if chosen by the minor and capable of pursuing the minor's 12 stated interest in the action.

13 (3) A person under 15 years of age who is seeking relief under 14 this chapter is required to seek relief by a person authorized as a 15 petitioner under this section.

An ex parte 14 temporary protection order shall be effective for a fixed period of 15 16 time and shall be issued initially for a period not to exceed 14 17 days, which may be extended for good cause.

Developing additional methods to inform 4 the public about protection orders in understandable terms and in 5 6 languages other than English through videos and social media should also be considered. The instructions, brochures, forms, and handbook 7 must be prepared in consultation with civil legal aid, culturally 8 specific advocacy programs, and domestic violence and sexual assault 9 10 advocacy programs. The instructions must be designed to assist petitioners in completing the petition, and must include a sample of 11 12 standard petition and protection order forms. (e) Create a new confidential party information form to satisfy 37 the purposes of the confidential information form and the law 38 39 enforcement information sheet that will serve both the court's and 40 law enforcement's data entry needs without requiring a redundant

1 effort for the petitioner, and ensure the petitioner's confidential information is protected for the purpose of safety. The form should 2 be created with the presumption that it will also be used by the 3 respondent to provide all current contact information needed by the 4 court and law enforcement, and full identifying information for 5 6 improved data entry. Nothing in this section prohibits the petitioner from 36 utilizing other civil or criminal remedies to restrain conduct or 37 communications not otherwise constitutionally protected.

38 (4) The court shall not take any of the following actions in 39 issuing a protection order.

(a) The court may not order the petitioner to obtain services
 including, but not limited to, drug testing, victim support services,
 a mental health assessment, or a psychological evaluation.

(b) The court shall not issue a full protection order to any 4 party except upon notice to the respondent and the opportunity for a 5 6 hearing pursuant to a petition or counter-petition filed and served 7 by the party seeking relief in accordance with this chapter. Except as provided in RCW 7.105.210, the court shall not issue a temporary 8 protection order to any party unless the party has filed a petition 9 or counter-petition for a protection order seeking relief in 10 11 accordance with this chapter.

12 (c) Under no circumstances shall the court deny the petitioner 13 the type of protection order sought in the petition on the grounds 14 that the court finds that a different type of protection order would 15 have a less severe impact on the respondent.

The order shall also state whether the court 19 issued the protection order following personal service, service by 20 electronic means, service by mail, or service by publication, and 21 whether the court has approved service by mail or publication of an 22 order issued under this section.

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. A new section is added to chapter 7.105 24 RCW to read as follows:

25 (1) Where it appears from the petition and any additional evidence that the respondent has engaged in conduct that serves as a 26 27 basis for an impaired driving protection order under this chapter, and the petitioner alleges that serious immediate harm or irreparable 28 injury could result if an order is not issued immediately without 29 30 prior notice to the respondent, the court may grant an ex parte temporary impaired driving protection order, pending a full hearing. 31 32 In considering whether to issue a temporary impaired driving protection order, the court shall consider all relevant evidence, 33 including the evidence described in section 5 of this act. 34

35 (2) The court has broad discretion to grant such relief as the 36 court deems proper, including the forms of relief listed in section 37 11 of this act. 6 (6) The court shall not deny a motion to renew a protection order 7 for any of the following reasons:

8 (a) The respondent has not violated the protection order 9 previously issued by the court;

(c) The petitioner did not report the conduct giving rise to the protection order, or subsequent violations of the protection order, to law enforcement;

Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, courts may not 27 charge petitioners any fees or surcharges the payment of which is a 28 condition precedent to the petitioner's ability to secure access to 29 relief under this chapter. Petitioners shall be provided the 30 31 necessary number of certified copies, forms, and instructional 32 brochures free of charge, including a copy of the service packet that consists of all documents that are being served on the respondent. A 33 respondent who is served electronically with a protection order shall 34 35 be provided a certified copy of the order free of charge upon 36 request.

37 (b) A filing fee may be charged for a petition for an 38 antiharassment protection order except as follows:

39 (i) No filing fee may be charged to a petitioner seeking an 40 antiharassment protection order against a person who has engaged in

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acts of stalking as defined in RCW 9A.46.110, a hate crime under RCW 9A.36.080(1)(c), or a single act of violence or threat of violence under RCW 7.105.010((<del>(36)</del>)) <u>(38)</u>(b), or from a person who has engaged in nonconsensual sexual conduct or penetration or conduct that would constitute a sex offense as defined in RCW 9A.44.128, or from a person who is a family or household member or intimate partner who has engaged in conduct that would constitute domestic violence; and

8 (ii) The court shall waive the filing fee if the court determines 9 the petitioner is not able to pay the costs of filing.

(10) If the petition states that disclosure of the petitioner's address or other identifying location information would risk harm to the petitioner or any member of the petitioner's family or household, that address may be omitted from all documents filed with the court. If the petitioner has not disclosed an address under this subsection, the petitioner shall designate an alternative address or email address at which the respondent may serve the petitioner.

17 (11) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 18 specific purpose, or as provided through alternative sources 19 including, but not limited to, grants, local funding, or pro bono means, if the court deems it necessary, the court may appoint a 20 21 guardian ad litem for a petitioner or a respondent who is under 18 22 years of age and who is not represented by counsel. If a guardian ad litem is appointed by the court for either or both parties, neither 23 the petitioner nor the respondent shall be required by the court to 24 25 pay any costs associated with the appointment.

26 (12) If a petitioner has requested an ex parte temporary protection order, because these are often emergent situations, the 27 28 court shall prioritize review, either entering an order without a 29 hearing or scheduling and holding an ex parte hearing in person, by telephone, by video, or by other electronic means on the day the 30 31 petition is filed if possible. Otherwise, it must be heard no later 32 than the following judicial day. The clerk shall ensure that the request for an ex parte temporary protection order is presented 33 timely to a judicial officer, and signed orders will be returned 34 promptly to the clerk for entry and to the petitioner as specified in 35 36 this section.

37 (13) Courts shall not require a petitioner to file duplicative 38 forms.

39 (14) The Indian child welfare act applies in the following 40 manner.

1 (a) In a proceeding under this chapter where the petitioner seeks to protect a minor and the petitioner is not the minor's parent as 2 defined by RCW 13.38.040, the petition must contain a statement 3 alleging whether the minor is or may be an Indian child as defined in 4 RCW 13.38.040. If the minor is an Indian child, chapter 13.38 RCW and 5 6 the federal Indian child welfare act, 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1901 et seq., 7 shall apply. A party should allege in the petition if these laws have been satisfied in a prior proceeding and identify the proceeding. 8

(b) Every order entered in any proceeding under this chapter 9 where the petitioner is not a parent of the minor or minors protected 10 11 by the order must contain a finding that the federal Indian child welfare act or chapter 13.38 RCW does or does not apply, or if there 12 is insufficient information to make a determination, the court must 13 make a finding that a determination must be made before a full 14 protection order may be entered. If there is reason to know the child 15 16 is an Indian child, but the court does not have sufficient evidence 17 to determine that the child is or is not an Indian child, 25 C.F.R. 18 Sec. 23.107(b) applies. Where there is a finding that the federal Indian child welfare act or chapter 13.38 RCW does apply, the order 19 20 must also contain a finding that all notice, evidentiary 21 requirements, and placement preferences under the federal Indian 22 child welfare act and chapter 13.38 RCW have been satisfied, or a finding that removal or placement of the child is necessary to 23 prevent imminent physical damage or harm to the child pursuant to 25 24 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1922 and RCW 13.38.140. Where there is a finding that the 26 federal Indian child welfare act or chapter 13.38 RCW does not apply, 27 the order must also contain a finding as to why there is no reason to 28 know the child may be an Indian child.
