## SENATE BILL 5454

- 1 AN ACT Relating to administration of drugs by health care 2 assistants; and amending RCW 18.135.130.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

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- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 18.135.130 and 2009 c 43 s 3 are each amended to read 5 as follows:
- 6 (1) This section applies only to health care assistants certified 7 in categories C or E by the department of health.
  - (2)(a) The administration of drugs by a health care assistant is restricted to oral, topical, rectal, otic, ophthalmic, or inhaled routes administered pursuant to a written order of a supervising health care practitioner. The drugs authorized for administration under this section are limited to the following:
- (i) Over-the-counter drugs that may be administered to a patient while in the care of a health care practitioner are: Benadryl, acetaminophen, ibuprofen, aspirin, neosporin, polysporin, normal saline, colace, kenalog, and hydrocortisone cream;
- (ii) Nonover-the-counter unit dose legend drugs that may be administered to a patient while in the care of a health care practitioner are: Kenalog, hydrocortisone cream, reglan, compazine,

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zofran, bactroban, albuterol, xopenex, silvadene, gastrointestinal cocktail, fluoride, lmx cream, emla, lat, optic dyes, oral contrast, and oxygen.

- (b) ((Only health care assistants who are certified as category C or E assistants by the department of health may administer the oral drugs specified in (a) of this subsection.
- $\frac{(c)}{(c)}$ ) Health care assistants authorized to administer certain overthe-counter and legend drugs under  $(\frac{(a) of}{(c)})$  this  $(\frac{(a) of}{(c)})$  section must demonstrate initial and ongoing competency to administer specific drugs as determined by the health care practitioner.
- 11  $((\frac{(2)}{2}))$  A health care practitioner must administer a medication 12 if:
- 13 (a) A patient is unable to physically ingest or safely apply a 14 medication independently or with assistance; or
- 15 (b) A patient is unable to indicate an awareness that he or she is 16 taking a medication.
- 17  $\left(\left(\frac{3}{3}\right)\right)$  (4) This section expires July 1, 2013.

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
