relating to early childhood education 1 ACT 2 development programs; providing for coordination of state early childhood education programs within the department of 3 education and accordingly granting authority and imposing 4 responsibilities; providing resources to supplement local 5 6 and private funds for the development and extension of early childhood education programs; establishing a grant 7 program for high quality programs provided by school 8 9 districts and nonprofit service providers; specifying conditions for resource assistance and grants; imposing 10 reporting requirements; granting rulemaking authority; 11 providing appropriations; and providing for effective 12 dates. 13

Notice of 14 the grant program together with necessary application forms 15 and program information shall be provided to school 16 17 districts and existing nonprofit service providers operating in the state not later than May 1, 2014. 18 Evaluation of applications shall be based upon criteria 19 specified in subsection (a) of this section and no district 20 21 or nonprofit service provider shall be awarded more than 22 one (1) grant under this section. (a) Notwithstanding subsections 8(a) and 9(a) of this act, up to five percent (5%) of the general fund appropriation for assistance and grants under sections 8 and 9 of this act, as authorized under section 7 of this act, may be appropriated on the effective date of this act.

(b) On or before December 1, 2014, and each December 8 9 1 thereafter through December 1, 2017, the department of 10 education shall report expenditures of amounts appropriated 11 under subsection 8 of this act, together with a compilation of reports collected under subsection 9(c) of this act, to 12 13 the joint education and the joint labor, health and social 14 services interim committees. The department recommend any modification to the supplemental assistance 15 and grant programs funded under this act, together with any 16 17 future funding sources.

21 (a) Sections 1 through 5 of this act are effective 22 immediately upon completion of all acts necessary for a 23 bill to become law as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of 24 the Wyoming Constitution, only if sections 6 through 10 of

1 this act are not effective as provided by subsection (b) of

2 this section.

(b) If a final order by the district court of Laramie 4 5 County, Wyoming, is issued implementing without change the final ruling of the Wyoming Supreme Court issued January 6 28, 2014, in the case of Kerry and Clara Powers, on behalf 7 of themselves and the citizens of Wyoming, and Cindy Hill, 8 9 on behalf of herself and as the Superintendent of Public 10 Instruction v. State of Wyoming and Matthew H. Mead, 11 Governor, in his official capacity [Docket No. S-13-0052], then upon expiration of time for appeal of that order, or 12 13 if appealed, upon issuance of a final order or mandate of 14 the Wyoming Supreme Court confirming the district court final order, the Governor shall certify the entry of the 15 district court final order. The Governor shall immediately 16 17 file any certification under this section together with the final order with the secretary of state. Upon filing the 18 certification with the secretary of state, sections 6 19 through 10 of this act are effective and shall supersede 20 21 sections 1 through 5 of this act.
