AN ACT relating to school finance; an omnibus bill addressing education funding though revisions of the existing education funding formula, providing additional revenue and transferring existing revenues; establishing a joint select committee on education funding; requiring reports; providing appropriations; providing sunset dates; and providing for effective dates.

If any 5 school approved alternative is under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(B) prior to the effective date of this act 6 but the school facilities for that alternative school have 7 8 not been constructed prior to the effective date of this 9 act, no design or construction funds shall be expended by the school facilities division of the state construction 10 11 department to construct the facilities for that alternative 12 school until July 1, 2019 or thereafter. 3 direct the formation of three (3) subcommittees of the
4 select committee to consider the issues specified in
5 subsection (d) of this section and report findings and
6 recommendations back to the full committee. The cochairmen
7 shall designate a chairman of each subcommittee formed
8 under this subsection.

10 (q) The select committee shall solicit input and 11 recommendations from the school finance data advisory 12 committee established under W.S. 21-2-203(d) related to the issues specified in this section. 13 legislative service office. The department of education,

14 the department of revenue, the department of workforce

15 services, the school facilities division of the state

16 construction department, the school facilities commission

17 and the state budget office shall serve in an advisory

18 capacity to the select committee and shall provide

19 technical and other information to the select committee

20 upon request.

21

22 (k) The select committee shall introduce legislation

23 consistent with its recommendations to the legislature for

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1 consideration during the 2019 general session of the

2 legislature.

4 (m) The select committee may seek out expert opinions related to the issues specified in subsections (c), (d) and 5 (e) of this section and may hire consultants as necessary 6 to complete the study and recommendations required under 7 8 this section.
