expending funds appropriated under this 8 (e) In 9 section and commensurate with school district efforts undertaken in facility planning required under 10 W.S. 11 21-15-116, the school facilities department shall require school district boards of trustees to 12 incorporate a 13 collaborative committee process, advisory to the board, which assists the school district with planning district 14 remedies for school buildings, ranging from site selection 15 to project planning and design. The collaborative 16 17 committee process for remedy development shall include project stakeholders comprised of students, parents, 18 teachers, principals, district administration, school board 19 of trustee members, representative legislators, at-large 20 21 members of the community and others. Although advisory to district boards, the collaborative committee shall assist 22 the boards with informing the respective community and in 23 developing community-based input into project development. 24
