A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to school finance; implementing
2 modifications to the Wyoming education resource block grant
3 model and other school finance components; providing for
4 funding adjustments as specified; codifying previously
5 uncodified law; amending related provisions; repealing
6 conflicting provisions; requiring a report; requiring a
7 study; and providing for effective dates.

8

9 *Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:*

10

11 **Section 1.** W.S. 21-13-309.1 is created to read:

12

13 **21-13-309.1. Education resource block grant model**
14 **components.**

15

1 (a) This section is intended to specify the education
2 resource block grant model components and computations
3 necessary to execute the 2020 cost of education study as
4 required by W.S. 21-13-309(t) and as adopted and modified
5 by the legislature.

6

7 (b) As used in this section:

8

9 (i) "Block grant model components" includes the
10 following categories:

11

12 (A) The educational materials category of
13 model components which includes the following:

14

15 (I) The books and instructional
16 materials component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxi) of
17 this section;

18

19 (II) The gifted and talented students
20 component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxiii) of this
21 section;

22

1 (III) The career and technical
2 education equipment and materials component resourced under
3 paragraph (c)(xxiv) of this section;

4

5 (IV) The student activities component
6 resourced under paragraph (c)(xxv) of this section;

7

8 (V) The professional development
9 component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxvi) of this
10 section;

11

12 (VI) The central office nonpersonnel
13 resources component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxviii)
14 of this section;

15

16 (VII) The operations and maintenance
17 supplies component resourced under paragraph (c)(xxx) of
18 this section.

19

20 (B) The energy category of model components
21 which includes the utilities component resourced under
22 paragraph (c)(xxxii) of this section;

23

1 (C) The nonprofessional labor category of
2 model components which includes supervisory aides, central
3 office classified staff, school secretaries, school
4 clerical staff, maintenance workers, groundskeepers and
5 custodians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this
6 section;

7
8 (D) The professional labor category of
9 model components which includes teachers, principals,
10 assistant principals, superintendents, assistant
11 superintendents, business managers and school computer
12 technicians resourced under paragraph (c)(xxxiii) of this
13 section.

14
15 (ii) "FTE" means the full-time equivalency basis
16 as computed in accordance with guidelines prescribed by
17 rule of the department of education;

18
19 (iii) "Grade band" means a school grade
20 configuration that falls within one (1) of the following
21 configurations:

22

1 (A) An elementary school grade band that
2 includes grades kindergarten (K) through grade six (6) or
3 any combination of those grades;

4

5 (B) A middle school grade band that
6 includes grade five (5) through eight (8) or grade six (6)
7 through grade nine (9) or any combination of grades within
8 those ranges;

9

10 (C) A high school grade band that includes
11 grade eight (8) through grade twelve (12) or any
12 combination of those grades.

13

14 (c) Except as provided in subsection (d) of this
15 section, the Wyoming education resource block grant model
16 components and the resourcing for those components shall be
17 as follows:

18

19 (i) Full day kindergarten. Funded for all
20 elementary schools;

21

1 (ii) Core teachers for schools with ADM greater
2 than forty-nine (49) and schools not designated as
3 alternative schools:

4

5 (A) Elementary school. Calculated as ADM
6 divided by twenty (20);

7

8 (B) Middle school. Calculated as ADM
9 divided by twenty-three (23);

10

11 (C) High school. Calculated as ADM divided
12 by twenty-three (23).

13

14 (iii) Specialist teachers for schools with more
15 than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
16 alternative schools:

17

18 (A) Elementary school specialist teachers
19 shall be calculated as twenty percent (20%) of the core
20 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(A) of this subsection;

21

1 (B) Middle school specialist teachers shall
2 be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core
3 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(B) of this subsection;

4

5 (C) High school specialist teachers shall
6 be calculated as thirty-three percent (33%) of the core
7 teachers in subparagraph (ii)(C) of this subsection.

8

9 (iv) Additional vocational education teachers.
10 For schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools
11 not designated as alternative schools, calculated as the
12 product of each high school's FTE vocational education
13 students reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(I)
14 multiplied by twenty-nine hundredths (0.29) then divided by
15 the high school class size of twenty-three (23);

16

17 (v) Small school and alternative school core
18 staff. For schools with forty-nine (49) or less ADM or
19 alternative schools, provide one (1) teacher position for
20 every seven (7) ADM, calculated as total school ADM divided
21 by seven (7). Each school shall receive a minimum of one
22 (1) teacher by increasing the sum of the core staff in this
23 paragraph to one (1) if the total is less than one (1);

2

(vi) Minimum teachers:

3

4

(A) The minimum number of teachers for any elementary school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is six (6), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection and specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to six (6). The minimum number of teachers for any middle school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is eight (8), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection and specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection to eight (8). The minimum number of teachers for any high school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM is ten (10), as calculated by increasing the sum of the core teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection and additional vocational education teachers in paragraph (iv) of this subsection to ten (10). The minimum number of teachers under this subparagraph shall be provided for each elementary school, middle school and high school grade band for a school that contains more

1 than one (1) grade band and the grade band is more than
2 forty-nine (49) ADM;

3

4 (B) The minimum number of teachers for any
5 school with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, more than one
6 (1) grade band and at least one (1) grade band with
7 forty-nine (49) ADM or less shall be calculated as follows:

8

9 (I) For each grade band with
10 forty-nine (49) ADM or less, the minimum number of teachers
11 shall be calculated by increasing the sum of the core
12 teachers in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, specialist
13 teachers in paragraph (iii) of this subsection and
14 additional vocational education teachers in paragraph (iv)
15 of this subsection to one (1) teacher position for every
16 seven (7) ADM;

17

18 (II) For each grade band with more
19 than forty-nine (49) ADM, the minimum number of teachers
20 shall be calculated as provided in subparagraph (A) of this
21 paragraph.

22

1 (vii) Small school district teacher adjustment.
2 For all schools within a district comprised of less than
3 two hundred forty-three (243) total ADM and notwithstanding
4 all other teacher resources in paragraphs (ii) through (vi)
5 of this subsection, resource each school with a minimum of
6 one (1) core teacher at every grade level with reported
7 ADM, plus an additional twenty percent (20%) of elementary
8 grade level core teachers to calculate elementary
9 specialist teachers and an additional thirty-three percent
10 (33%) of middle school and high school grade core teachers
11 to calculate middle school and high school specialist
12 teachers;

13

14 (viii) Instructional coaches:

15

16 (A) Elementary school instructional coaches
17 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
18 multiplied by thirty-four hundredths (0.34) divided by two
19 hundred eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than
20 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
21 alternative schools;

22

1 (B) Middle and high school instructional
2 coaches shall be calculated as the product of the school's
3 ADM multiplied by thirty-four hundredths (0.34) divided by
4 three hundred fifteen (315) for schools with more than
5 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
6 alternative schools;

7

8 (C) For schools containing more than one
9 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM,
10 instructional coaches shall be calculated as the product of
11 the school's total ADM multiplied by thirty-four hundredths
12 (0.34) divided by three hundred fifteen (315).

13

14 (ix) Tutors. Calculated as the school's at-risk
15 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by
16 one hundred eighty-five (185) for schools with more than
17 forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
18 alternative schools;

19

20 (x) Extended day and summer school teachers:

21

22 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk
23 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by

1 one hundred twenty (120) then multiplied by forty-five
2 hundredths (0.45) for schools with more than forty-nine
3 (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools;

4

5 (B) Each school district shall receive a
6 minimum of one-half (0.5) position if the total FTE
7 calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less
8 than one-half (0.5);

9

10 (C) For resources under this component,
11 school districts are encouraged to give priority to
12 evidence-based reading remediation programs in kindergarten
13 through grade three (3) and graduation credit recovery
14 programs.

15

16 (xi) Substitute teachers:

17

18 (A) Calculated as the product of five
19 percent (5%) multiplied by the sum of FTE positions
20 calculated in paragraphs (ii) through (x) of this
21 subsection;

22

1 (B) The daily substitute rate shall be
2 equal to the product of one hundred two dollars and fifteen
3 cents (\$102.15) multiplied by seven and sixty-five
4 hundredths percent (7.65%) for social security and Medicaid
5 benefits;

6
7 (C) Total substitute teacher resources
8 under this paragraph shall be equal to the product of one
9 hundred seventy-five (175) multiplied by the product
10 calculated in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph multiplied
11 by the product calculated in subparagraph (B) of this
12 paragraph.

13

14 (xii) Supervisory aides:

15

16 (A) Elementary school supervisory aides
17 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
18 multiplied by two (2) then divided by two hundred
19 eighty-eight (288) for schools with more than forty-nine
20 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative
21 school;

22

1 (B) Middle school supervisory aides shall
2 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
3 by two (2) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for
4 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
5 designated as an alternative school;

6

7 (C) High school supervisory aides shall be
8 calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied by
9 five (5) then divided by three hundred fifteen (315) for
10 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
11 designated as an alternative school;

12

13 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine
14 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and
15 a middle school grade band but not a high school grade
16 band, supervisory aide positions shall be calculated based
17 upon the formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph
18 using the total school ADM. For schools with more than
19 forty-nine (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band
20 and either an elementary school grade band or a middle
21 school grade band or both, supervisory aide positions shall
22 be calculated based upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of
23 this paragraph using the total school ADM. This

1 subparagraph shall not apply to schools designated as an
2 alternative school.

3

4 (xiii) Pupil support positions:

5

6 (A) Calculated as the school's at-risk
7 students computed under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(A) divided by
8 one hundred (100) for schools with more than forty-nine
9 (49) ADM and schools not designated as an alternative
10 school;

11

12 (B) Minimum pupil support positions.
13 Minimum pupil support positions shall be provided for
14 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
15 designated as an alternative school based upon the
16 following:

17

18 (I) Elementary schools. If the amount
19 calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less
20 than the school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight
21 (288), then increase the amount of positions calculated
22 under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to equal the
23 school ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288);

1

2

(II) Middle and high schools. If the amount calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph is less than the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen (315), then increase the amount of positions calculated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph to equal the school ADM divided by three hundred fifteen (315);

9

10

(III) For schools containing more than one (1) grade band, the minimum number of tutors shall be calculated as provided in subdivision (II) of this paragraph using the total school ADM.

14

15

(xiv) Counselors. Calculated as total middle and high school ADM divided by two hundred fifty (250) for schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools;

19

20

(xv) Librarians. Shall be calculated for schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

23

1 (A) Elementary schools. Calculated as the
2 school's ADM divided by two hundred eighty-eight (288);

3

4 (B) Middle schools and high schools with
5 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred
6 five (105) ADM, provide librarian positions by prorating
7 one (1) librarian position for one hundred five (105) ADM
8 down to no librarian positions for forty-nine (49) ADM. For
9 middle schools and high schools with ADM of one hundred
10 five (105) or more up to six hundred thirty (630), provide
11 one (1) librarian position. For middle schools and high
12 schools with more than six hundred thirty (630) ADM,
13 calculate librarian positions by dividing the school's ADM
14 by six hundred thirty (630);

15

16 (C) For schools containing more than one
17 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM,
18 librarians shall be calculated using the formula in
19 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school
20 ADM.

21

22 (xvi) School computer technicians. For middle
23 and high schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and

1 schools not designated as alternative schools, calculated
2 as each school's ADM divided by three hundred fifteen
3 (315). For schools containing more than one (1) grade band,
4 calculated using the total school ADM divided by three
5 hundred fifteen (315);

6

7 (xvii) Principals. Shall be calculated for
8 schools with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
9 designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

10

11 (A) Elementary schools with more than
12 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM,
13 provide principal positions by prorating one (1) principal
14 position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at
15 forty-nine (49) ADM. Provide one (1) principal position for
16 elementary schools with ninety-six (96) or more ADM;

17

18 (B) Middle and high schools with more than
19 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred five (105)
20 ADM, provide principal positions by prorating one (1)
21 principal position for one hundred five (105) ADM down to
22 no position for forty-nine (49) ADM. Provide one (1)

1 principal position for middle schools and high schools with
2 one hundred five (105) or more ADM;

3

4 (C) For schools containing more than one
5 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, provide
6 principal positions based upon the formula in subparagraph
7 (B) of this paragraph.

8

9 (xviii) Assistant principals:

10

11 (A) Prorate one (1) assistant principal
12 position for every two hundred eighty-eight (288)
13 elementary school ADM over two hundred eighty-eight (288)
14 ADM;

15

16 (B) Prorate one (1) assistant principal
17 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle
18 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315)
19 ADM;

20

21 (C) For schools containing more than one
22 (1) grade band, prorate one (1) assistant principal

1 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) ADM over
2 three hundred fifteen (315) ADM using the total school ADM;

3

4 (D) Provide one (1) assistant principal
5 position for a school with a total ADM of forty-nine (49)
6 or less or for a school designated as an alternative
7 school.

8

9 (xix) Secretaries. Calculated for schools with
10 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not designated as
11 alternative schools based upon the following:

12

13 (A) Elementary schools with more than
14 forty-nine (49) ADM and less than ninety-six (96) ADM,
15 provide secretary positions by prorating one (1) secretary
16 position for ninety-six (96) ADM down to no position at
17 forty-nine (49) ADM. Elementary schools with more than
18 ninety-six (96) ADM and up to two hundred eighty-eight
19 (288) ADM, provide one (1) secretary position. Prorate one
20 (1) additional secretary position for every two hundred
21 eighty-eight (288) elementary ADM over two hundred
22 eighty-eight (288) ADM;

23

1 (B) Middle schools and high schools with
2 more than forty-nine (49) ADM and less than one hundred
3 five (105) ADM, provide secretary positions by prorating
4 one (1) secretary position for one hundred five (105) ADM
5 down to no position at forty-nine (49) ADM. Middle schools
6 and high schools with more than one hundred five (105) ADM
7 and up to three hundred fifteen (315) ADM, provide one (1)
8 secretary position. Prorate one (1) additional secretary
9 position for every three hundred fifteen (315) middle
10 school and high school ADM over three hundred fifteen (315)
11 ADM;

12

13 (C) For schools containing more than one
14 (1) grade band and more than forty-nine (49) ADM, secretary
15 positions shall be calculated using the formula in
16 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the total school
17 ADM.

18

19 (xx) Clerical positions. Calculated for schools
20 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM and schools not
21 designated as alternative schools based upon the following:

22

1 (A) Elementary schools with more than
2 forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by
3 prorating one (1) clerical position for every two hundred
4 eighty-eight (288) ADM down to no clerical positions for
5 forty-nine (49) ADM;

6
7 (B) Middle schools with more than
8 forty-nine (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by
9 prorating one (1) clerical position for every three hundred
10 fifteen (315) ADM down to no clerical positions for
11 forty-nine (49) ADM;

12
13 (C) High schools with more than forty-nine
14 (49) ADM, provide clerical positions by prorating four (4)
15 clerical positions for every six hundred thirty (630) ADM
16 down to no clerical positions for forty-nine (49) ADM;

17
18 (D) For schools with more than forty-nine
19 (49) ADM and containing an elementary school grade band and
20 middle school grade band but not a high school grade band,
21 clerical positions shall be calculated based upon the
22 formula in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the
23 total school ADM. For schools with more than forty-nine

1 (49) ADM and containing a high school grade band and either
2 an elementary school grade band or a middle school grade
3 band or both, clerical positions shall be calculated based
4 upon the formula in subparagraph (C) of this paragraph
5 using the total school ADM.

6

7 (xxi) Books and instructional materials.
8 Resources shall be calculated as the product of the
9 school's ADM multiplied by two hundred nine dollars and
10 thirty-three cents (\$209.33);

11

12 (xxii) Technology and equipment. Resources shall
13 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
14 by two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). This amount shall
15 not be subject to any external cost adjustment applicable
16 under W.S. 21-13-309(o);

17

18 (xxiii) Gifted and talented students. Resources
19 shall be calculated as the product of the school's ADM
20 multiplied by forty-four dollars and seven cents (\$44.07);

21

22 (xxiv) Career and technical education equipment
23 and materials. Resources shall be calculated as the product

1 of each high school's FTE vocational education teachers
2 reported under W.S. 21-13-309(m)(v)(D)(III) multiplied by
3 ten thousand three hundred thirteen dollars and
4 eighty-eight cents (\$10,313.88);

5

6 (xxv) Student activities shall be based upon
7 each school's ADM. A middle school with ADM in grade nine
8 (9) shall have that ADM included in the high school ADM for
9 the high school the students would normally attend. Student
10 activity funding shall be calculated in the following
11 manner:

12

13 (A) Elementary school student activity
14 resources shall be calculated as the product of the total
15 elementary school ADM multiplied by twenty-three dollars
16 and forty-two cents (\$23.42);

17

18 (B) Middle school student activity
19 resources shall be calculated as the product of the total
20 middle school ADM multiplied by:

21

22 (I) Seven hundred seventy dollars and
23 forty cents (\$770.40) for a school with one (1) ADM,

1 prorated down to five hundred twenty-six dollars and
2 eighty-seven cents (\$526.87) for a school with one hundred
3 five (105) ADM;

4

5 (II) Five hundred twenty-six dollars
6 and eighty-seven cents (\$526.87) for a school with one
7 hundred five (105) ADM, prorated down to three hundred
8 sixty-two dollars and ninety-six cents (\$362.96) for a
9 school with two hundred ten (210) ADM;

10

11 (III) Three hundred sixty-two dollars
12 and ninety-six cents (\$362.96) for a school with two
13 hundred ten (210) ADM, prorated down to two hundred
14 ninety-two dollars and seventy-one cents (\$292.71) for a
15 school with three hundred fifteen (315) ADM;

16

17 (IV) Two hundred ninety-two dollars
18 and seventy-one cents (\$292.71) for a school with three
19 hundred fifteen (315) ADM, prorated down to two hundred
20 fifty-seven dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$257.58) for a
21 school with six hundred thirty (630) ADM;

22

1 (V) Two hundred fifty-seven dollars
2 and fifty-eight cents (\$257.58) for a school with six
3 hundred thirty (630) ADM, prorated down to one hundred
4 ninety-nine dollars and four cents (\$199.04) for a school
5 with one thousand two hundred sixty (1,260) or more ADM.

6

7 (C) High school student activity resources
8 shall be calculated as the product of the total high school
9 ADM multiplied by:

10

11 (I) One thousand nine hundred
12 eighty-five dollars and ninety-three cents (\$1,985.93) for
13 a school with one (1) ADM, prorated down to one thousand
14 five hundred twenty-two dollars and six cents (\$1,522.06)
15 for a school with one hundred five (105) ADM;

16

17 (II) One thousand five hundred
18 twenty-two dollars and six cents (\$1,522.06) for a school
19 with one hundred five (105) ADM, prorated down to one
20 thousand two hundred twenty-nine dollars and thirty-six
21 cents (\$1,229.36) for a school with two hundred ten (210)
22 ADM;

23

1 (III) One thousand two hundred
2 twenty-nine dollars and thirty-six cents (\$1,229.36) for a
3 school with two hundred ten (210) ADM, prorated down to
4 nine hundred ninety-five dollars and nineteen cents
5 (\$995.19) for a school with three hundred fifteen (315)
6 ADM;

7
8 (IV) Nine hundred ninety-five dollars
9 and nineteen cents (\$995.19) for a school with three
10 hundred fifteen (315) ADM, prorated down to seven hundred
11 two dollars and forty-nine cents (\$702.49) for a school
12 with six hundred thirty (630) ADM;

13
14 (V) Seven hundred two dollars and
15 forty-nine cents (\$702.49) for a school with six hundred
16 thirty (630) ADM, prorated down to five hundred eighty-five
17 dollars and forty-one cents (\$585.41) for a school with one
18 thousand two hundred sixty (1,260) or more ADM.

19
20 (xxvi) Professional development. Resources shall
21 be calculated as the product of the school's ADM multiplied
22 by one hundred thirty-seven dollars and seventy-two cents
23 (\$137.72);

1

2

(xxvii) Central office staff:

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23

(A) For school district ADM of five hundred (500) or less, three (3) administrative positions and three (3) classified positions;

(B) For school district ADM from five hundred (500) to one thousand (1,000), provide four (4) administrative positions and four (4) classified positions at one thousand (1,000) ADM, prorated down to three (3) administrative positions and three (3) classified positions at five hundred (500) ADM;

(C) For school district ADM from one thousand (1,000) to three thousand five hundred (3,500), provide eight (8) administrative positions and ten (10) classified positions at three thousand five hundred (3,500) ADM, prorated down to four (4) administrative positions and four (4) classified positions at one thousand (1,000) ADM;

(D) For a school district with ADM greater than three thousand five hundred (3,500), prorate eight (8)

1 administrative positions for every three thousand five
2 hundred (3,500) ADM and prorate ten (10) classified
3 positions for every three thousand five hundred (3,500)
4 ADM.

5

6 (xxviii) Central office nonpersonnel resources.
7 Resources shall be calculated as the product of the school
8 district ADM multiplied by four hundred dollars and twenty
9 cents (\$400.20);

10

11 (xxix) Maintenance and operations. Resourced as
12 follows:

13

14 (A) For school buildings containing more
15 than one (1) grade band or school, the resources shall be
16 generated at the highest grade band level using the total
17 ADM in the building;

18

19 (B) School custodians. For school buildings
20 with more than forty-nine (49) ADM, resources shall be
21 calculated using the average of the following four (4)
22 factors specified under subdivisions (I) through (IV) of

1 this subparagraph, plus an additional one-half (0.5) FTE
2 for middle or high schools:

3

4 (I) One (1) custodian multiplied by
5 the total of the number of teachers resourced under
6 paragraphs (i) through (v) of this subsection divided by
7 thirteen (13);

8
