Federal suspension and orders on oil and gas production.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

for

- 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION requesting Congress and the federal
- 2 government to reverse federal orders and actions that inhibit
- 3 the safe development of oil and gas in Wyoming and that
- 4 negatively and disproportionately impact Wyoming citizens and
- 5 industries.

- 7 WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming contains abundant and vast
- 8 natural resources that are and can be used for the production
- 9 of energy throughout the United States and world; and

10

- 11 WHEREAS, Wyoming produces energy that benefits consumers and
- 12 industries throughout the United States; and

- 1 WHEREAS, the energy industry in Wyoming provides millions of
- 2 dollars in taxes and other revenues annually to the state of
- 3 Wyoming; and

- 5 WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming and the energy industry have
- 6 worked together for years to develop Wyoming's energy
- 7 resources in a safe and environmentally responsible manner,
- 8 including the development of technologies to promote the
- 9 responsible development and use of Wyoming energy; and

10

- 11 WHEREAS, the federal government owns almost one-half (1/2) of
- 12 the surface acreage within the state of Wyoming and more than
- 13 forty-two million (42,000,000) acres of mineral estate in
- 14 Wyoming; and

15

- 16 WHEREAS, federal decisions and actions banning, pausing or
- 17 significantly reducing the production of energy negatively
- 18 impact the economy of Wyoming and the livelihoods and well-
- 19 being of Wyoming's residents; and

- 21 WHEREAS, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. signed Executive
- 22 Order No. 13,990 on January 20, 2021, which requires the

- 1 federal Secretary of the Interior to unilaterally stop all
- 2 federal leasing of oil and gas resources in Wyoming; and

- 4 WHEREAS, President Biden signed Executive Order No. 14,008 on
- 5 January 27, 2021, which indefinitely pauses oil and natural
- 6 gas leasing and calls for a comprehensive review of federal
- 7 oil and gas permitting and leasing practices to evaluate
- 8 potential climate impacts; and

9

- 10 WHEREAS, the President and various federal agencies have,
- 11 since January 20, 2021, taken actions and issued orders to
- 12 limit actions, permits and leases for oil and gas production,
- 13 including a Department of the Interior order that revoked
- 14 authority for issuing fossil-fuel authorizations, leases,
- 15 permits to drill and the affirmative extension of leases and
- 16 contracts; and

- 18 WHEREAS, these executive actions will lead companies to
- 19 pursue energy development in other parts of the world where
- 20 energy resources are not as environmentally responsible and
- 21 where responsible energy regulations are lacking to where a
- 22 net negative impact on climate emissions may likely result;
- 23 and

- 2 WHEREAS, these executive actions severely and negatively
- 3 affect the value of property held by the state and citizens
- 4 of Wyoming in areas affected by these orders due to the fact
- 5 that federal property is intermingled with private and state
- 6 lands and oil and gas development often involves lateral
- 7 drilling techniques which cross several classes of property;
- 8 and

- 10 WHEREAS, these executive actions will adversely impact and
- 11 jeopardize the employment of at least twenty thousand
- 12 (20,000) Wyoming citizens who directly or indirectly work in
- 13 oil, gas and related industries; and

14

- 15 WHEREAS, these executive actions may result in negative
- 16 impacts to Wyoming's diverse wildlife and habitat, including
- 17 a decreased ability to mitigate wildlife impacts, increased
- 18 development on currently undisturbed lands and a decrease in
- 19 quality habitat reclamation work; and

- 21 WHEREAS, these executive actions are causing immediate,
- 22 disproportionate and extensive harm to the state of Wyoming
- 23 and will inflict lasting damage on Wyoming residents,

- industries and the critical services upon which Wyoming 1
- 2 residents depend.

- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE 4
- 5 LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WYOMING:

- 7 Section 1. That the President of the United States
- rescind, reverse or repeal the executive orders that were 8
- 9 issued in January 2021 that suspend or pause leasing,
- permitting, extensions and authorizations of oil and gas 10
- 11 development in Wyoming and that will have an adverse impact
- 12 on climate change and Wyoming's wildlife and habitat
- 13 resources while inflicting irreparable and disproportionate
- 14 harm on the state of Wyoming.

- Section 2. That the President of the United States 16
- direct all federal agencies to rescind, reverse or repeal any 17
- 18 secretarial orders or actions that negatively impact
- 19 responsible energy and energy technology development in
- 20 Wyoming, including Department of the Interior Secretarial
- 21 Order No. 3395.

1 the Wyoming Legislature strongly Section 3. That 2 opposes actions by or that direct federal agencies, including

- 3 the federal Environmental Protection Agency, to unilaterally
- 4 increase the burden on existing oil and gas companies in
- 5 Wyoming and to increase the burden on those companies'
- 6 facilities in Wyoming in an attempt to achieve climate-
- 7 related goals that are unrealistic and that
- 8 disproportionately impact the people of Wyoming.

10 Section 4. That the Wyoming Legislature strongly 11 supports the efforts of the Wyoming congressional delegation 12 to prevent the President and the federal executive branch from unilaterally issuing suspensions and moratoriums on 13 energy development in Wyoming, including the Protecting Our 14 15 Wealth of Energy Resources (POWER) Act of 2021 and the

Safeguarding Oil and Gas Leasing and Permitting Act.

18 Section 5. That the Wyoming Legislature strongly 19 further congressional encourages action to 20 responsible leasing and permitting of oil and gas in Wyoming 21 and to protect Wyoming's residents, energy industry and other 22 industries that are negatively impacted by these executive 23 actions.

2 Section 6. That the Secretary of State of Wyoming 3 transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the United States, to the Acting Secretary of the Department of 4 5 the Interior, to the Acting Administrator of the federal Environmental Protection Agency, to the President of the 6 7 Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress and to the Wyoming Congressional 8 9 Delegation.
